Harry Allen Says 2 Rain So Far 7.98 Inches

A heavy thunder shower on Wednesday night of this week wiped-up last week's drought-soaker. Harry Allen says with some figures that the total rainfall in Goldthwaite for the first four months of 1952 to have been 7.98 inches. That was a department normal of minus 1.43

Harry Allen, who makes official station measurements in Goldthwaite for the United States Weather Bureau, entered the rainfall for 1952 to date in the records as follows:

January, 22 of an inch, decrease from normal of minus 1.28 inches; February, .79 of an inch, departure from normal of minus .72 of an inch; March, .43 inches, which was .37 of an inch better than normal; and April, 1.13 inches, which was .53 inch better than normal.
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A careful and official record, Mr. Allen says that total precipitation measured in Goldthwaite in 1952 was 20.09 inches or a decrease from normal of minus 1.11 inches. Every month last year was on the minus side in departure from normal except May and June, which were .21 and plus 3.64 inches, respectively.

Allen pointed out that his measurements in Goldthwaite, for last year or for the four months of this year, do not coincide precisely with measurements elsewhere in the county because sometimes in Goldthwaite the precipitation is more or less than the normal.

"Ray" Thornton Enters Contest For Prosecutor

Raymond Thornton, at present Belton City Attorney, this week announced his candidacy for nomination as District Attorney for the 27th Judicial District of Texas, which includes Mills, Lampasas and Bell Counties.

Mr. Thornton's announcement puts him in competition with Henry Taylor, Jr., who announced his candidacy some time ago. Both Mr. Thornton and Mr. Taylor are seeking the post that is being vacated by Jim Everts who is running for election against District Judge Wesley Dice.

A native of Hill County, Mr. Thornton was graduated from the Blum High School. He received a bachelor's degree in business administration from Baylor University and he received his law degree from the Baylor University of Law. He is a member of the 36th Infantry Division, Texas National Guard, with the rank of Second Lieutenant.

Mrs. Thornton is the former Barbara Jean Reed of Temple. Mr. Thornton, who is beginning his second year as Belton City Attorney, also is in the private practice of law. In announcing his candidacy he said:

"The office of District Attorney demands nothing less than the very best of effort and the utmost of sincerity in carrying out the duties and responsibilities of the office. These things I will give. Uncompromising and impartial enforcement of the laws of the State are vital to the fulfillment of the duties of your District Attorney. Such enforcement I shall uphold.

"It would be a privilege to me to become personally acquainted with each of you. Since this District is composed of three Counties, that may not be possible. However, I will attempt to meet as many citizens of this District as I can. Until I can contact you personally, I take this opportunity to earnestly solicit your vote, your confidence and your support."

Eli Edmondson Is Latest Entry In Precinct 3 Race

Eli Edmondson of Mullin, who two years ago lost to K. B. Henry by only 25 votes in his try for election as County Commissioner, Precinct 3, returned to the political arena again this week.

Mr. Edmondson, who operates an automobile service station in Mullin, filed for County Commissioner, Precinct 3, on Wednesday afternoon with Joe A. Palmer, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Mills County Democratic Party. R. T. Ratliff and A. A. Downey previously had filed for County Commissioner, Precinct 3, subject to the July 26 primary election. W. T. "Son" Lee and A. A. Downey, who also had announced for the post some time ago, had not filed with Mr. Palmer as the Eagle went to press this week.

A native of Coryell County, Mr. Edmondson moved to Mills County when he was only two years of age. He has lived in Precinct 3 since 1939. One of his sons, H. J., is in the Army and now is on duty in Louisiana. A daughter, Mrs. Dovie Hurley, lives in Oklahoma City.

Four of Mr. Edmondson's children live at home. They are Della Lee, 12; Wilma Parker, 9; Tom Martin, 7; and Charlie E., 5.

Mr. Edmondson said this week that he hoped for the same support that his fellow citizens gave him when he ran for County Commissioner in Precinct 3 in 1950. Mr. Henry, who was victorious two years ago, is not seeking renomination this year.

Mr. Edmondson was a visitor in Goldthwaite on Wednesday of this week, when he filed his candidacy.

Craig C. Wesson and L. R. "Bally" Rudd announced this week that they are candidates for the Post of County Commissioner, Precinct 1, for which Jess Y. Tullos is seeking renomination.

The announcements by Mr. Rudd and Mr. Wesson constituted the major local political news of the week. Both of them, along with Mr. Tullos, have filed their candidacies with Joe A. Palmer, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Mills County Democratic Party. The deadline for the filing of names to go on the ballot for the July 26 primary election is next Monday night at midnight.

Mr. Wesson is a native of Lee County but he will have lived in Mills County for 50 years come next October—except for a period of two years during which he served in the Navy during World War I. Mrs. Wesson is the former Lillie May Goodwin, who lived in Mullin prior to her marriage. Mr. and Mrs. Wesson have six children. They are:

Mrs. R. C. (Ovella) Sperry, who lives in Los Angeles; J. C. Wesson, who is employed at Bradford's Western Auto Associate Store on the east side of the Square in Goldthwaite; Mrs. Hawley (Barbara June) Jernigan of Jones Valley (Rattler); James W. Wesson of the United States Navy, whose most recent station was at Corpus Christi; Kenneth David Wesson, a student at Texas A. & M. College; and Wanda Lou Wesson, who is a student at the Goldthwaite High School.

Mr. Rudd is a native of Goldthwaite, where he has lived "all of his life." Mrs. Rudd is the former Leta Petsick. She and Mr. Rudd have two children, Don, who is 12; and John Pat, who is 8. The Rudds are members of the First Baptist Church and Mr. Rudd is President of the Men's Downtown Bible Class of Goldthwaite.

They conveyed not only the information they had obtained at Lubbock but also pointed out that a priority would have to be obtained for steel to be used in the construction of the proposed swimming pool. GUEST EDITORIAL

(Editor's Note: In an article that is being published throughout the United States David Lawrence, veteran and competent observer of the Washington scene, writes that the truth about reckless statements on the steel dispute is slowly coming out.

The truth about what has been happening behind the scenes in the steel controversy is slowly coming out.

For one thing, it turns out that the steel companies never have requested a price increase of \$12 a ton.

This will come as a surprise to the public. The explanation offered by steel industry spokesmen for their silence is that they were in the midst of negotiations in a rapidly changing situation.

When the President's Wage Stabilization Board, however, reported a definite recommendation, the industry experts estimated that the full cost of the proposals would be approximately \$12 a ton.

This was because the administration took the position that a price increase of around \$3 a ton was due the steel companies under the Capehart amendment.

At this writing, the President has not said he would order the Wage Stabilization Board's full proposals put into effect.

Congressman Fisher's Secretary Tells Why She Likes Her Work

Note: Last week's article in the office of Representative O. C. Fisher of the 21st Congressional District was written by Miss Patricia of Brownwood, a Secretary in Congressman Fisher's office. Since space limitations made it impossible for the Eagle to publish Miss Capps' article last week, it follows below — in belief that "people back home" will be interested in what goes on in the office of their elected representative — in Washington.

By PAT CAPPS

This is about my first experience in newspaper reporting. Congressman Fisher is in Texas this week while the Congress is in recess. Ever year during the Easter period the Congress takes a 10 day recess. Mr. Fisher asked me if I would like to fill-in for him on his weekly column while he is away. So this is my chance.

Perhaps it would be of interest to report to you something about what it is like to work in a Congressman's office in Washington. I like it very much. It being the seat of the government, there is a lot going on all the time. Because Mrs. Fisher did not arrive here until about the middle of January, I was able to use the pass issued for her to listen to the President when he delivered his annual State of the Union message to a joint session of the Congress. It was very impressive, sitting in the gallery and watching the Senators march in, then the Diplomats, Supreme Court Justices, and others. The gallery was packed, as I understand it always is on occasions like that. Cameras, radio microphones, television machines, etc. are grinding away, as the spotlight is directed at the President, the Speaker and the Vice President.

In the office we are kept very busy. A good many visitors from Texas come in to see us, and that is always a special pleasure to all of us. It gives us a chance to talk with our friends, and many times Mr. Fisher is able to make appointments for them and often accompanies them when they have engagements to talk with various people connected with the government.

Some of our work is routine, but what I think I enjoy most is opening the mail in the mornings. Every letter is different, and they are all very interesting. After the mail is opened it is placed on the Congressman's desk, and then he goes to work answering, obtaining information requested, or other things. We are able to help constituent solve his problem. We get a good many letters from veterans or their families regarding rights, problems and other things. We are able to help out in many of these, send copies of laws, rulings, find out about the status of bills the letters refer to, and check with the Veterans Administration on appeals, etc. We also get a good many letters regarding farm and ranch problems.

Mr. Fisher spends about two hours each day in committee hearings. He is on the Armed Services committee, and has done a lot of work the past year on a subcommittee known as a Procurement Watchdog Committee, of which he is vice-Chairman. That committee investigates reports of waste and improper methods of contracting. I think the committee has been able to save the Taxpayers many millions of dollars. It has received a lot of praise in the press here in Washington.

Then, when the House meets, usually at 12 o'clock noon, the Congressman attends, where he often takes part in debates on subjects in which he has an interest. That has been particularly true this year when most of the sessions have dealt with appropriations. And, as everyone knows, Mr. Fisher is a strong believer in strict economy. He spends quite a bit of time working with other Members in obtaining cuts on unnecessary spending that are proposed.

This spring we sent lists of Farmers bulletins. The Department of Agriculture has for many years been making these lists available. They are very helpful to many farmers and ranchmen because on many subjects they give the best information that science has discovered. Already we have received about 2,000 requests for these publications. We try to send these lists out every few years, while some of the Members I know of send them each year. Many County Agents, Home Demonstrators, and schools make use of them also.

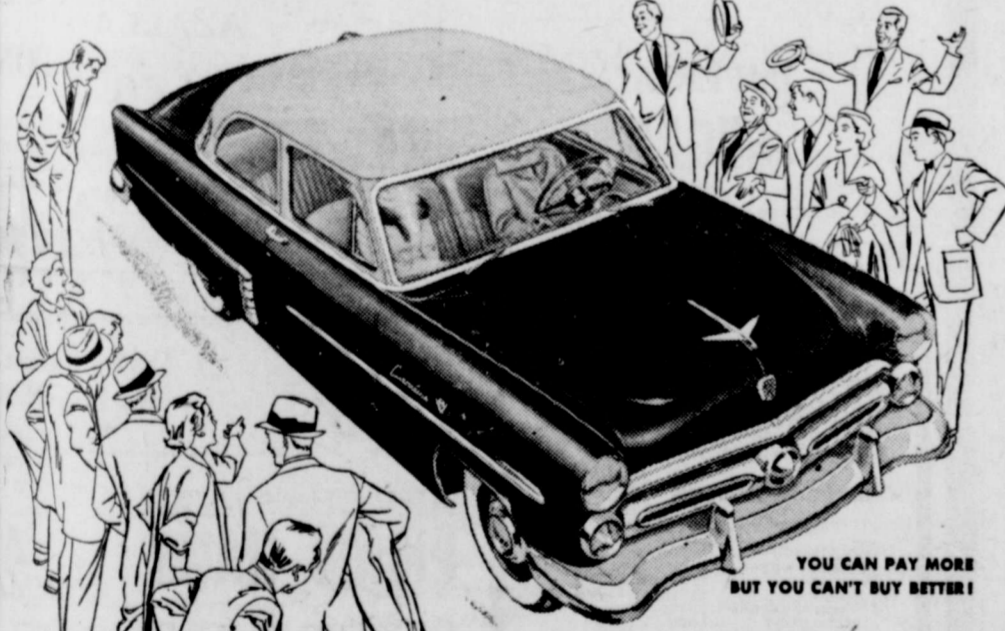

Rep. O. C. Fisher Aids In Settling Maneuver Damage

Representative O. C. Fisher of the 21st Texas Congressional District this week issued a press statement from his office in Washington regarding his efforts to see to it that damage resulting from Exercise Longhorn will be paid for or repaired.

Congressman Fisher said that since his recent visit to Mills County he had been in communication with the Department of the Army regarding damage claims arising from Exercise Longhorn. In his press statement he said:

"It is the obligation of the government to restore damaged property in the maneuver area of Exercise Longhorn, and where it cannot be restored to compensate the property owners for the damages caused. Congressman Fisher has reminded the Department of the Army.

"Fisher, who just returned to Washington from a 10-day visit to Texas during the Easter recess, said he had inspected much of the maneuver area in Mills and Lampasas counties and observed considerable damage in places. Upon returning to the Capitol he conferred with General Miles Reber, in the office of the Army Chief of Staff, and by telephone with Major General Bruce C. Clark's office at Fort Hood.

"He was told that 4,000 men are now working out of Fort Hood in restoring damaged property and that the work is due to be completed this week. This includes fence and, road repairs.

"Congressman Fisher emphasized that much of this repair work is unsatisfactory, and that the principal claims are for damage that only nature can restore — some of it requiring years in cantonment areas.

"Lt. Col. Edgar M. Lewis, Real Estate and Claim Officer, at Ft. Hood, has charge of handling claims for the Fourth Army. Congressman Fisher suggested that it would be proper for every claimant to call or write Col. Lewis, and describe the nature of his damage. A man from Col. Lewis' office will then be sent to the claimant for an inspection and interview, Fisher has been told."

Soft Molasses Cookies

Broadcast: May 3, 1952

1/2 cup Fat Milk 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon vinegar 1/2 teaspoon ginger
1/4 cup cooking molasses 1/2 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups sifted, all-purpose flour 1/2 cup soft shortening
1 teaspoon soda 1 egg

Mix milk and vinegar in bowl. Stir in molasses and mix well. Sift flour, soda, cinnamon, ginger and salt on piece of paper. Put shortening into quart bowl. Add sugar gradually, mixing until light and fluffy. Add egg and beat hard. Stir in about 1/2 of flour mixture. Then stir in about 1/2 of milk mixture. Stir in rest of milk. Add the flour mixture that is left and mix well. Drop by heaping teaspoons 2 inches apart onto greased cookie pan. Bake in moderate oven (375) about 10 minutes, or until brown. Remove from cookie pan at once. Makes 3 dozen.

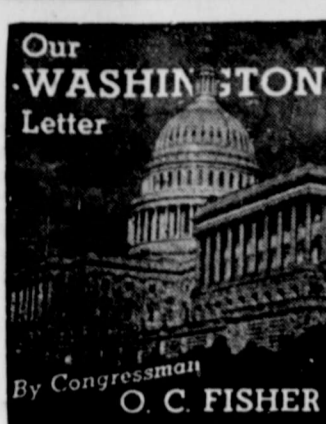

The seizure of the steel mills continued to be top news on Capitol Hill last week. The House got its first chance to speak on the subject when by a vote of 255-to-88 it adopted a resolution calling for an investigation of the Wage Stabilization Board. I voted for the investigation. The findings should be very revealing. There is a lot of evidence that will show the majority of the so-called "public" members of the WSB were previously on the payrolls of the Big Unions. George Taylor, former chairman of the public members on the board, recently resigned to take a \$20,000 a year job with the CIO.

In another action last week, the House passed a new immigration law, mainly to re-educify all the hodge-podge of immigration laws that have been put on the books during the past 30 years. The new law retains our present basic quota systems, and does not liberalize the total number who can enter from year to year. That number totals 154,000 per annum, with most of it allotted to Great Britain and Northern Ireland, whose quota continues to be 65,000. Ireland gets 17,700; Germany 25,800. These quotas are based upon the percentage of "national origin" in this country as of 1920.

This same bill also dealt with the exclusion of undesirable aliens, broadening and tightening the laws in that respect, and improved existing statutes with respect to deporting aliens already here and screening out security risks and subversives. I voted for this bill.

Before long the Congress will tackle the job of deciding whether to continue OPS for another year. The present law expires at the end of June. Actually, most of the items purchased in the stores now are below the OPS ceilings. Yet the vast army of OPS employees and enforcement officers is continued with a continuing demand for the addition of more and more federal employees.

OPS methods of grading lamb meat at the packing houses has cost the growers large amounts in many instances. This has to do with the decision of whether a lamb is a lamb or has advanced to the status of mutton. The consumers naturally prefer "lamb", yet because of a technical method of deciding, OPS has forced many butcher shops to label meat "mutton" which traditionally is sold as "lamb" and the grower are thus unfairly penalized.

Another example of how unnecessary ceilings on pork is costing consumers vast sums is the report from Chicago, the meat capitol of America. There last week pork was selling at from 15% to 25% below ceiling, and yet one packer alone (Armour & Co.) is paying as much as \$200,000 per month in overtime to 300 fulltime employees simply to keep the records and reports required by OPS. When you multiply this by the number of people all over the country who must incur extra expenses to keep OPS records where selling prices are below ceiling prices, you get some idea of the load the American people are carrying in keeping OPS in business.

Wool is another example. With the present ceiling around twice as much as wool is selling for, and with a government loan at 96% of parity going into effect, OPS continues a large force to keep records on wool sales and prices! All of this simply results in higher, not lower, living costs. The people pay the cost of keeping OPS going, the high salaries, magazine advertisements, bill boards, radiocasts,

etc. This adds up to \$69,000,000 a year, and the people pay the bill in taxes. A year ago I voted against continuing OPS and the WSB cost-raising procedure, which has actually added to rather than reduced costs. The fact that throughout the year most prices have been under ceilings, with prices of many basic items being on the decline, indicates that OPS has not justified the vast expense that it has cost the taxpayers.

Another misrepresentation has been the careless statement in congress that the steel companies are building steel plants "tax free" and with money furnished by the taxpayers. The truth is that every company in certain lines of business can deduct each year one twentieth of the cost of a plant, so that at the end of 20 years a fund can be built up to replace the factory or mill. The government here, since the Korean war broke out, has been anxious to stimulate the building of new steel plants and has allowed the deductions for depreciation to be accelerated so that they can be taken within five years. But if there are no profits against which to apply the deductions, there is no benefit to the companies from the five-year rule. Likewise these deductions on taxes do not start until after the plants are built.

The steel industry has to dig up more than a billion dollars a year of its own money to build the plants. The government does not grant the money. Nothing is "free." The total net profit of the steel industry after taxes last year was \$667,000,000, so it is to be noted that the companies had to put up out of previous years' earnings a substantial sum in order to build new plants. Any large increase in costs, such as the new wage scale, has a bearing not only on how much profit will be available after taxes but what sums will be available after paying the wages of investors.

A lot of loose talk about the economics of the steel industry has been heard lately, and it is regrettable that the issue has been permitted in congress to

descend to the levels of demagoguery. It is a pretty serious business and can bring on a serious depression for America—indeed, the future of the American economic system is at stake in the handling of the steel controversy, apart from the fact that steelworkers' wages should be raised or that certain increases must be allowed to cover real costs. Government intrusion in management, operation and planning activities of the steel industry is dangerous. Already some companies are beginning to cancel expansion plans as too risky.

If the dog does not die within two weeks, Dr. Childress said, the absence of rabies could be assumed. If death should occur within two weeks, the head of the animal ought to be examined by the State Department of Health at Austin.

"By all means, have your dogs vaccinated and confine but do not destroy an animal suspected of being rabid," Dr. Childress emphasized.
