DEDICATION OF THE YOUTH CENTER

The Mills County Youth Center of the First Baptist Church of Goldthwaite was dedicated at appropriate ceremonies last Sunday afternoon. The enlarged physical facilities, which represent an asset to the community as a whole, resulted from a generous gift by Walter Fairman. We believe that the finest comment that could be made on Mr. Fairman's gift was made in the acceptance of it by the Rev. J. T. Ayers, Pastor of the Baptist Church here. Here is what Brother Avers said in accepting Mr. Fairman's gift last Sunday afternoon:

"They say that in a small town there isn't much to see or do, but what you will hear makes up for the lack. We would like for it to be said of Goldthwaite that there also are some things to do and see.

"We do not claim that a Youth Center will solve all of the problems of our young people concerning a place to go and something to do, but certainly it will help. It seems that some of our young people feel that their problem of inactivity is almost as serious as that faced by the little boy who received an air gun and a diary for Christmas.

"The day he received his gun he wrote in his diary, "Dear Diary, it rained today. I couldn't go hunting.' Again on the second day he wrote, 'It rained again today; I couldn't go hunting.' And on the third day was the same, 'Rained again today; I shot Ball, was given a shower Thurs- Mr. Fitzgerald is a noted nur-Grandmother!'

"All of us would no doubt agree that a great need has been met in that a place for fun and fellowship in a Christian atmosphere has been provided. As we receive this Youth Center, we promise you that it shall be dedicated to the development of the youth of Mills County. We have an obligation to meet in the realm of the physical, mental, social and spiritual. If any of these is neglected, we are failing to do our job well. Mr. Fairman, this Youth Center will make it possible for us to do a better job in meeting this obligation and we shall pledge ourselves anew to provide an environment in this community that will make possible a well-rounded Christian life.

'Mills County has won great acclaim because of her Angus and whitefaced cattle. We take great pride in this fact, and justly so. But it seems that we should give as much time and thought to the matter of developing fine citizens as we do to the developing of fine cattle.

"As a result of what has become to be ours in the Mills County Youth Center, we shall wage a more successful warfare against the forces of evil. It may be that Mr. Wilcox was not far from right when he said in his 'American City' that 'the difference between virtue and vice as characteristic of a community (which means the success or failure of democracy) lies principally in the use that people make of their leisure time. This building shall be made available to the Church, school and civic groups of Mills County. A calendar of activities shall be kept to facilitate arrangements concerning the use of the building. As I look down through the years, I see many and varied groups expressing gratitude for this Youth Center. If there were only some way of lifting the veil of the future to see the many hours of pleasure that will come because of this gift, we would possess an even greater appreciation.
