## Text Of Mayor's Apology

The apology that was read to the Goldthwaite City Council last Monday night by Charlie T. Wilson was entitled, "MAYOR'S SHORT TALK." Under the title and in parenthesis was this notation: "(Read before and file with Minutes of Goldthwaite City Council Regular Meeting at City Hall, Goldthwaite, Texas on Monday night May 5, 1952)." The text of the document is as follows:

"Gentlemen:

"I am no politician—neither am I a public speaker, but I have a few words which I would like to say at this time.

"I have been told-and I realize-that I've taken this Mayor's job too seriously. Considering the unfavorable publicity I have received lately, I now realize I should never have consented for my name to be entered on the ticket. Nevertheless, having been elected by a majority of the taxpayers of our town, I feel it my duty to serve them to the best of my ability. I did not solicit a vote during the campaign. I deeply appreciate the confidence placed in me by the people of Goldthwaite. I am quite sure each of you feel the same.

"Naturally I regret the unpleasant trend of events at our last meeting. Please accept my sincere apologies for any or all acts or deeds on my part in that connection. As far as I am concerned that is a closed issue.

"I am obligated to no individual or group-have made no promises-and my only desire is that we may work together harmoniously for the betterment of our City and Community. I hope the old adage, 'A bad beginning makes a good ending, holds true for this city administration. Thank you.

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As a result of the political developments of the past week the voters in Texas will have in the first primary election on July 26 an opportunity to register at the ballot boxes their preference either for Democrats who respect the traditions of their party and the high principles of Thomas Jefferson, or for the Fair Deal-New Deal-Queer Deal exponents of keeping the brass collar on the necks of the citizens.

Votes for Ralph Yarborough for Governor and for Lindley Beckworth for the United States Senate will mean that the brass collar has been worn for so long that apathetic citizens, not fully aware of how far they have been taken along the road toward socialism and eventual dictatorship, are content to maintain the Queer Deal with all of its waste, its bureaucratic centralization and its callous disregard for the wish of the American people to pass on to their children the freedoms for which our forebears

The issues in the voting next July 26 will be as simple as that.

Governor Shivers and Attorney General Price Daniel have been courageous in giving both leadership and a voice to those who abhor the brass collar and who want to see the Democratic Party return to the principles of Thomas Jefferson and to be rid of the architects of the Welfare State and their "Papa knows best" attitude-which holds that the citizens are just a bunch of clunks who will, in the end, do whatever they are told to do if they are pushed around long enough.

It is obvious and not merely a matter of opinion that Ralph Yarborough, in his candidacy for Governor of the great State of Texas, and Lindley Beckworth in his campaign for election to the United States Senate, are instruments in the hands of the Queer Deal which, in Texas, has chosen to wear the label, "Loyal Democrats," which is a travesty on our language if ever there was one.

From where we sit and on the basis of having been devoted to true Democratic principles ever since we cast our first ballot, the true Democrats in the election that will be on us before we realize how quickly time marches on are men such as Allan Shivers, Price Daniel and Congressman O. C. Fisherwho have had the courage to speak out for their convictions and against the dangerous trend toward regimentation in our national life that has marked the past 20 years.

We believe it to be good, indeed, that on July 26 the voters will have a choice on issues that are clear and sharply defined. In the Precinct Conventions throughout most of Texas last Saturday a majority of the citizens who participated made it clear that they have responded to the leadership that has been provided by Governor Shivers. Also in the Pre-cinct Conventions the so-called "Loyal Democrats" made it certain that they are as ready as Joe Stalin to distort the meaning of words when, instead of abiding by the will of the majority, they formed rump conventions and talked long and loud of continued bolting right up to the Democratic National Convention at Chicago, where, they hope, the Queer Deal and all of its minions will be waiting to play the role of a

The attitude of the so-called "Loyal Democrats" has been that they can disregard the wishes of the majority of the voters of Texas and, by hanging on long enough, fly into the arms of the protecting Queer Deal personification at Chicago.

It is good, too, that in deciding the issues at the ballot box the voters will have the fresh, forthright and reasoned arguments in behalf of freedom and true democracy as spoken repeatedly by Governor Allan Shivers and Price Daniel as against the willingness to continue to submit to the brass collar by Ralph Yarborough and Lindley Beckworth

The fact that the latter two are in the campaign has made welcome news because when July 26 rolls around the voters in Texas will be able to go on record as to precisely where they stand. The election of July 26 can be decided on the basis of issues and not merely as a matter of personalities. Governor Shivers and Price Daniel have been making the issues clear. They are the survival of freedom under a new government by law rather than by men.

We are proud that from the very start this newspaper has been for Governor Shivers for reelection and for Price Daniel as a candidate for the U. S. Senate. We now have more reason than ever to stay with them.

The Pink boll worm has shown up in many Texas counties. It spread to 17 new counties last year. Annual losses on cotton alone due to insects and diseases exceed \$1 billion.

The annual loss from insects to timber and to crops is in the billions. Since colonial days, insects and fire have destroyed 6,750,000,000,000 board feet of timber, which is nearly equal to our original stand.

On agricultural research which results in new methods to cope with pestilence and disease - we actually spend each year only a little more than the cost of one destroyer or the cost of 12 B-36 bombers. of 12 B-36 bombers.

Through research, for example, the Department of Agriculture has developed an entirely new poultry industry. The annual cost of this scientific discovery has been equal to only 12 per cent of the cost of a medium sized tank. The Bureau of Animal Industry has found by adding vitamin B-12 to poultry feeds we can produce 9-1 pound broilers in 9 weeks on 9 pounds of feed. This represents a saving of at least 800,000 tons

of feed worth \$80,000,000. Other items for which funds were appropriated or loan authorizations provided included 4-H club work, vocational agriculture, forest service, soil and water conservation, Federal crop mental basis, Farmers Home Administration, school lunch, rural electrification and rural teleinsurance-now on an experiphone loans, etc.

A recent letter from a friend in Junction referred to the cost of the support program as applied to potatoes, eggs and but-ter. Actually, there has been no ter. Actually, there has been no price support program of any kind on potatoes since such sup-ports were prohibited by Congress in 1950. In the case of butter, there has been no price support on that commodity within the past twelve months, and the same is true of eggs.

The egg and potato programs were scandalously expensive in the past, both being perishable in character. The cost of the two amounted to 63 per cent of the total cost of the government support program. In the case of potatoes the Secretary of Agriculture designated potatoes as a basic war commodity several years ago which enabled the extravagant price support program to be applied. 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


