Mr. Jones and Coach Akins have established records so splendid that Goldthwaite must be glad over the prospect that soon they will be establishing residence here with their families. The Eagle hopes to publish in the near future interviews with both Mr. Jones and Mr. Akins. Until then, we would like to have them know that a cordial and hearty welcome awaits them and their families here. Challenges await both of them but the members of the School Board who selected them for their important posts are confident that they are equipped to enrich our community life and to help to give our youngsters the sort of school system that all of us want them to have. May those of us who are here and who want so much to have the finest school possible with the resources available go all the way out in extending encouragement and understanding as Mr. Jones and Mr. Akins come to work with us in behalf of our most precious asset - our children.

THE CONSTITUTION SURVIVES

On the basis of remarks that were made by callers at the Eagle office this week, there was as much interest here as anywhere else in last Monday's decision by the Supreme Court of the United States holding that President Truman violated the Constitution when he seized the steel industry.

Comments ranged all the way from wonder as to whether Supreme Court Justices finally had been reading the Constitution to speculation as to whether they had been measuring a public opinion that little by little has become fed-up with the trend toward complete centralization of bureaucratic control in

Among the many thousands of words in the majority ruling by the Supreme Court, two paragraphs stand out. They are:

1- "In the framework of our Constitution, the President's power to see that the laws are faithfully executed refutes the idea that he is to be a law maker. The Constitution limits his functions in the law making process to the recommending of laws he thinks wise and the vetoing of laws he thinks bad—."

2- "Even though 'Theater of War' be an expanding concept, we cannot with faithfulness to our constitutional system hold that the commander in chief of the armed forces has the ultimate power as such to take possession of private property in order to keep labor disputes from stopping production. This is a job for the nation's law makers, not for its military authorities."

Even though the Supreme Court ruling precipitated a steel strike with all of the ominous implications of such a stoppage of vital production in a time of continuing crisis, the American people are bound to be reassured by the decision that not even the President of the United States can go beyond the law and claim justification for whatever he might do on the grounds of "inherent powers."

The powers of the Chief Executive stem from the Constitution and if they are not there or are not provided by the Congress, in which sit the elected representatives of the people, then the President cannot pluck them out of thin air. That, in effect, is what the Supreme Court said last Monday, and it ought to make the citizens feel a whole lot better.


