

"The rain falls upon the just and the unjust," says the Scripture.

It also falls upon those who don't want is as well as upon those who do. This happens even when nature regulates rainfall without interference from man. Now that rainmakers have taken a hand, jurisdiction may pass from nature to the federal government.

Folks interested in the Michigan tourist business already are complaining to Washington about rainmaking activities in New Mexico. They say that clouds seeded in the arid Southwestern state early in the week arrive over Michigan just in time to dump their moisture on week-end vacationists. It seems that the Defense Department is in charge of the New Mexico rainmaking and Michiganders think something ought to be done about it.

The new science of rainmaking has almost endless complications. For instance, a famous rainmaker predicted the downpour which drenched the outdoor scene of General Eisenhower's speech at Abilene, Kan .- and that in the face of official Weather Bureau forecasts of fair weather.

Apparently there is no suspicion that Taft suporters did a bit of cloud seeding, but the possibilities of using man-made rain as a political weapon are obvious. Maybe there will have to be a law against raining out your opponent's political rally.

All joking aside, here is a matter upon which the march of science seems certainly destined to push forward the frontiers of law. Legislative regulation of artificial rainmaking is bound to run into the traditional conflict between state and federal sovereignty. Does a state have the right to regulate rain within its own borders, or shall clouds be considered interstate carriers?

Nobody needs to guess how the Michigan resort owners would answer that question.

"The immense importance of this in California can be shown by a comparison with Warren's victory of more than a million votes over James Roosthan evelt in 1950.

This is not only proof that Knowland is a tremendous vote getter but that the issue of administration blundering in Asia is a bitter, vital matter to peo-ple on the West Coast. No Republican can carry California this year who attempts to be lukewarm on the Acheson policy in Asia Marshall-
