Eagle Poll Gives Ike 202 Votes—Only 8 For Adlai

For all practical purposes the Eagle's straw poll for the Associated Press, which is seeking the answer to the question, "Who Is Going To Win—Eisenhower or Stevenson?" is just about over with 202 votes for Eisenhower and eight for Stevenson.

Written on one of the last of the ballots to come in and which cast two votes for General Eisenhower were the words:

"We dislike both the foreign and domestic policy of the present administration."

Two other partisans of General Eisenhower wrote as follows:

"Things are getting pretty corrupt when people refuse to place principals and morals above party."

Another ballot on which two votes were cast for General Eisenhower came from some highly respected Eagle readers in Mullin but they refrained from recording any remarks.

One Mills County citizen who went on record as favoring Eisenhower wrote: "I prefer men instead of polished political machines. Also, why do we 'grievously complain, then vote for the cause of the complaints?" Another ballot that was marked for General Eisenhower came from Mr. and Mrs. Liss Walker of Austin and there was a further report about that one in The Eagle's Aery on page two of last week's Eagle.

Another ballot, the signature on which can be published without any violation of confidence, came from Mr. and Mrs. Lyman H. Saylor. It, of course, was marked FOR General Eisenhower. That was no surprise because, more than a year ago, Mr. Saylor accepted appointment as Chairman in Mills County of "Texas Republicans for Eisenhower." At that time, it looked as though Ike did not have a chance of getting the nomination.

PMA In Rush As Farmers Ask For Emergency Hay

The Mills County P. M. A. Committee was in a whirl of activity this week as farmers filed applications for emergency hay—ten carloads of which have been ordered to help to offset the effects of drought in Mills County.

As the Eagle went to press Harry Welch of the P. M. A. County Committee said that already 36 farmers had ordered more than 135 tons of the hay, which is expected to arrive in a week or ten days.

Charlie E. Jones, Mills County administrative officer of the Production and Marketing Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, said that the emergency hay would be available to approved applicants at approximately \$32.00 per ton. The hay that has been ordered is two-thirds grass and one-third legumes.

Farmers in need of it must use it only for feeding foundation herds of cattle, dairy cows and sheep. Simple application forms that are available at the P. M. A. office in the Court House ask for the name and address of the farmer, who also is requested to state the quantity of emergency hay he needs and the number of livestock he is running. He must agree, also, not to sell any of the hay that might be made available to him by the P. M. A. County Committee without the Committee's approval.

Applications are passed upon by the P. M. A. Committee, of which Luther H. Soules is Chairman. The other member, in addition to Mr. Welch, is Bruce Burnett.

Upon making application, farmers are requested to deposit \$5.00. The balance due upon the emergency hay provided for them as part of the drought relief program is payable upon delivery.

Orders that are being screened by the P. M. A. County Committee are limited to a 30-day supply until all eligible producers have had their needs met.

The emergency hay program, designed to help to keep farmers and ranchers from liquidating herds, was made applicable to Texas after Governor Allan Shivers, in repeated telegram to Washington, had demanded action. The emergency hay is being purchased by the Commodity Credit Corporation in areas where fodder is plentiful. The hay then is shipped into regions that have suffered so severely from drought.

Each carload lot that comes into Mills County can be figured at about 20 tons to the car, Mr. Welch said this week.

SCHOOLS HERE AND ELSEWHERE

In last week's Eagle there was not sufficient space to report in full the important speech that was made on September 2 by Goldthwaite School Superintendent J. T. Jones before the Goldthwaite Lions Club.

1— With the preponderant aid of State funds, the Goldthwaite Independent School District is spending an average of approximately \$200.00 per year per pupil while the average for Texas generally is approximately \$296.00 per year per pupil.

2— So long as the tax rate of the Goldthwaite Independent School District remains at only \$1.00 per \$100.00 of rendition and so long as so much of what little money is raised locally must go for servicing bonded indebtedness at relatively high rates of interest, an enrichment fund of any consequence is not in prospect for the local schools.

In the course of his address Mr. Jones reminded the Lions that school administrators and teachers remain deplorably under-paid and that they work not for the financial return but because of their devotion to higher educational standards.

Mr. Jones deplored any operation that would make it necessary for any teacher to have to work in a classroom containing 50, 60 or more pupils.

As we reported last week, the budget for the school year in Goldthwaite is approximately \$120,000.00 with only about \$15,000.00 of that amount coming from local funds if ALL local school taxes are collected.

The facts of the address by Mr. Jones, including those that are printed here and those that were printed in last week's Eagle, speak for themselves. We know that they were eloquent so far as a number of the Lions and their guests were concerned.

While we are on the subject of schools, there is something else of major importance to every parent, not only in the Goldthwaite Independent School District but in the Star, Priddy and Mullin school districts.

By maintaining a top level of attendance, day in and day out throughout the school year, our parents can be helping everybody who has a child in school. By maintaining a high Average Daily Attendance and by increasing the ADA some, but not all, of our school problems can be solved.

GUEST EDITORIAL

(Editor's Note: Amidst all of the discussion over the Texas tidelands and the theft of them by the Queer Deal, it is time to emphasize that the issue is whether the states own the tidelands and the minerals under them or whether the federal government has "paramount rights".

Texas claims its tidelands on two basic points. First, it claims that the federal constitution grants to the federal government only those powers expressly given to it by the states, that the states have never granted the tidelands to the federal government, and instead, have held established title to them for more than 100 years.

Second, Texas has a special claim, more powerful than the first. This is that the congress of the United States in its joint resolution setting up the conditions under which Texas would be annexed to the United States expressly stated that Texas would keep title to its public lands.

Both claims involve fundamental principles. The first involves the encroachment of the federal government on the rights of states and individuals; some refer to it as a step toward national socialism. The second one, peculiar to Texas, involves the question whether the federal government will honor agreements solemnly made by previous congresses and administrations, through regular constitutional processes.

President Truman, in his recent message to congress vetoing the bill passed by congress to quit-claim title to the tidelands to the states, even recognized the special claim of Texas. Here is the story of how Texas came (Continued on Page 7)

Man Lists Musts For Legume Planting

By ROGER POWELL
Now is the time for farmers and ranchers who are interested in sowing legumes this fall to begin locating legume grass seed and fertilizer. Due to the scarcity of seed and fertilizer, they should be taken in sowing legumes this year to insure a

better stand from the seed planted.
The supervisors of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District point out that the success or failure of the legumes that will be planted this fall will largely depend upon the precautions that are taken when sowing. Some of the more important precautions emphasized by the supervisors are as follows:
1—Select the type of legumes best adapted to your soil condition. Farmers and ranchers who have experienced good results in legume plantings are contin-

uing to plant Madrid Sweetclover, Evergreen Sweetclover, Hubam Sweetclover, Hairy Vetch, Austrian Winterpeas, and Dixie Wonder peas. Many failures in legume plantings have been due to the soil not being adapted to the legume planted.
2—Select the seed that has the highest germination. Good clean seed with a high germination is the most desirable seed to plant.
3—Many of the legume failures are due to improper inoculation of the seed. Fresh inoculant of the proper culture

should be used. Better results have been obtained by using sweet milk or a mixture of syrup and water to make the inoculant stick to the seed. The use of inoculant is good insurance any time a legume is planted, but is always essential when a legume is planted for the first time.
4—Legumes should be planted on a well prepared but firm seed bed. Approximately two hundred pounds of 0-20-0 fertilizer should be drilled when the seeds are planted. Best results have been obtained by

sowing the legume seed and fertilizer with a combination grain and fertilizer drill. This piece of equipment puts the fertilizer in bands under the legume seed.
When these precautions are taken, you will have taken the first steps toward growing a successful legume crop.

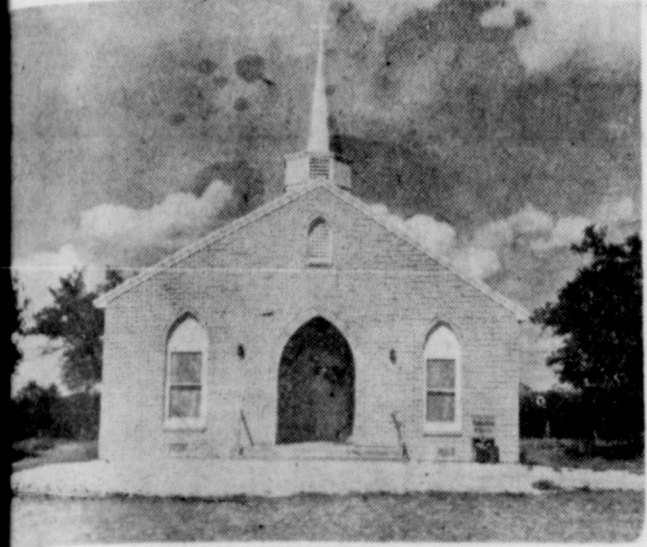
SUNDAY TO BE GREAT DAY AT CENTER CITY NEW METHODIST CHURCH IS DEDICATED

to retain its public lands and to have boundaries specifically including the tidelands.
The first session of the congress of the Republic of Texas fixed the boundaries of the republic. Its southern boundaries began three marine leagues (1 1/2 miles) south of the mouth of the Sabine River and extended a like distance into the Gulf from shore to a point three leagues out from the mouth of the Rio Grande. The western and northern boundaries extended into parts of what is now New Mexico, Colorado and Wyoming.
When the United States in 1838 recognized the Republic of Texas, it technically recognized its boundaries.

On March 1, 1845, a joint resolution of both houses of congress, approved by the president, set up the conditions under which Texas could be annexed. Texas had asked the United States to assume the republic's \$10,000,000 debt in return for taking over its public lands. This congress refused to do it. Specifically stated that Texas would keep its public lands—and its public debt. These public lands, under the boundaries set up by the congress of the republic and recognized by the United States, extended 10 1/2 miles to sea.

Further recognition of Texas' boundaries came when the United States paid Texas \$10,000,000 to relinquish its title to territory extending north of the Panhandle.

Then, after the war between the United States and Mexico over the annexation of Texas, in 1848, both Mexico and the United States recognized in the treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo the Texas boundaries extending 10 1/2 miles to sea.
Thus, the Texas claim to its public lands, including the tidelands was well recognized and specifically established. Hence Texas today owns the public lands within its borders and has a land office to administer them. In all the other 47 states the public lands are owned by the federal government and administered by the Department of the Interior. The whole controversy comes down to the simple question: Will the federal government live up to the contract it entered into with Texas?

After that, the editor personally took the bat through the Court House, showed it to Sheriff C. F. Stubbfield and County Clerk Earl Summy, and then arranged with Jimmy Leonhard to place

it gently but firmly on the Postmaster's desk.

Unhappily, that was NOT the end of the story, as it was supposed to have been. The Postmaster tried to deliver the bat to Mr. Gilliam who took one look at the box containing it and, attorney-at-law that he is, declined to accept delivery on the grounds that there was no postage stamp on it. The next thing the editor knew there was a notice of postage due in his mail box and so he had to fork over three cents to Winell Page who, by that time had the box containing the bat and on which the following words had been written: "NOT FOR POSTMASTER; TRY E. B. GILLIAM, JR."

Having paid the three cents postage due, the editor went back to work, blissfully believing that Mr. Gilliam was going to find the packaged bat in his mail box. But fate intervened. The bat died. And the longer the bat stayed dead with Mr. Gilliam not collecting his mail, the more it became necessary for Postmaster Fairman and her staff to consult Postal Laws and Regulations which state clearly that in the case of the demise of a critter sent through the mails, it must be disposed of expeditiously and in a manner not endangering the public health. Presumably, that is what happened. The Eagle hopes that the Postmaster used

either the Brownwood Rendering Company or the Dead Animal Service at Hamilton, both of which favor this newspaper with their advertising.

An attempt was made to interview Mr. Gilliam on the whole subject but instead of tossing out quotes for publication, he backed into a coffee shop with City Utilities Manager W. C. Barnett. But another attempt will be made to interview Mr. Gilliam if any more bats come over to the Eagle from the Post Office in U. S. Mail sacks. There still are many very live and quite healthy bats at the Goldthwaite Post Office and if Postmaster Fairman continues to refuse to recognize them as government property then, ipso facto, they belong to Mr. Gilliam.
