

If all persons do their part, Mills County again will establish a record when the Bloodmobile unit of the American Red Cross comes to Goldthwaite on October 9.

Already, many persons voluntarily have registered as blood donors so as to help to meet military needs for whole blood and plasma and so as to make certain that the necessary supplies also will be available for civilian emergencies.

We happened to be present last Thursday night at a meeting of the North Bennett-Caradan Community Club at the Midway schoolhouse when blood donor registration cards were offered by President Clyde Kerby and when they were distributed by Mrs. H. C. McNeil. At that one meeting a score of persons signed the cards and they will have appointments on October 9 when the Red Cross Bloodmobile unit will be stationed at the First Baptist Church of Goldthwaite.

The Eagle already has reported that after a recent morning Service of Worship at the Church of Christ in Goldthwaite a number of persons wrote their signatures on the registration cards.

Early registrations will greatly assist the corps of volunteer recruiters who are working in every Mills County community under the over-all leadership of Mrs. Warren P. Duren. An additional list of community workers is published in this week's Eagle. All that anybody has to do is to ask any one of these workers for a registration card. After signing, those who volunteer as donors need merely to await receipt of a postcard that will notify them of the time of the appointments that will be made for October 9.

The recruiters have made it as simple as possible for blood donors to register. Registration cards will be available at Churches during the coming weekend. They may be signed at Club meetings. And, if you are on the Square in Goldthwaite, you may recruit yourself by seeing Brian Smith at the Fire House, Glynn Collier at the Mills County State Bank, any member of the staff at the Post Office, at Clements' or Hudson Drug, at the office of the County Judge in the Court House, or at the T. M. Glass insurance agency opposite the bank.

The "creeping war" goes on in Korea with its long weekly list of maimed men whose chance for recovery depends upon the blood that is given voluntarily. Every day in every hospital lives are saved because of the availability of whole blood or plasma.

We have written before but we think it is important to repeat that Mills County now is affiliated with the Central Texas Regional Blood Center at Waco. Either now or soon any hospital in this area to which you or someone dear to you might be admitted as a patient will be able to draw upon the Central Texas Regional Blood Center at Waco. The program adds up to the fact that the blood you give here on October 9 could be the means of saving your own life or the life of someone very near and dear to you.

The last time the American Red Cross Bloodmobile unit came to Goldthwaite, Mills County, on the basis of population proportion, did establish a record over many other Counties. We did it before and we shall do it again.
