What happened in the General Election last week on Tuesday should by no means be taken lightly by either political party. The fact that approximately sixty million people turned out to vote shows that the people are still ready, willing and able to take a hand in the affairs of their government. For in this election THE PEOPLE HAVE SPOKEN.

The record turnout in voters and their voting results shows that the people are still doing some thinking for themselves, or have started to do so again.

The fact that Eisenhower carried by such a majority points out one fact without the slightest question. That fact is people voted not for party but for the man they believed best for the job under the circumstances and conditions confronting the nation.

What happened in this election is concrete evidence that the two party system in our country is by no means dead but a real living thing - for this everyone of us should be thankful, for when the day comes in this or any country when there is a weakening in the party system and a trend toward a one party rule or government, that is the day when the country has started to weaken, the day when there is real danger of a dictatorship. For that is how dictatorships are born, history proves that and we can make no mistake about it.

The fact that out of a record vote cast, over 31 million for Eisenhower, with a change in party for the leadership of the nation during the next four years not only in the White House but also in both houses of Congress makes several things clear.

There was a tremendous change in the farm vote of the nation Farmers have profited to a great degree during the past number of years under the Democratic administration and there is little question about the strides made in farm areas during that time. Yet enough has happened that was not pleasing to the farm belt people during the later years of Democratic rule so they changed their support to the other party - or party's candidate.

The heavily populated industrial area States where labor delivers the ruling vote went for the Republican party. This trend is not exactly new, since it was fairly well demonstrated during the last Senatorial election two years ago in Ohio. At that time, according to records of History, Labor Union leaders went all out to defeat Senator Taft by their endorsement of the other candidate and by spending several million dollars during the campaign. Yet, with all that the laboring man casting the vote gave Senator Taft a majority of over four hundred thousand votes in the race. So during this election the laboring man again used his own judgment in casting his ballot and didn't follow the endorsement or dictates of his LABOR BOSS.

Then there are Texas and the South. And, that includes Mills County. The most surprising thing ever (or almost ever) to happen for folks to see this great State of Texas, above all, and so many Southern states to vote for and elect a Republican candidate to the office of President of the United States. Well, after all Eisenhower is a native Texan. This again proves that a lot of people considered principal and personalities above party politics, and while a good many of us may feel deeply hurt over such a situation, this should also spell a healthy sign for our democratic form of government. It shows clearly and without a doubt that a lot of southern - Democrats, mind you, from 'way back - folks were fed up to the gills with what has been going on in the administration and party ranks. It shows that people had lost faith in their administration leaders and decided to do something about it - and they did.

From this historical election there can come some

The Republican Party has had plenty of time during the past twenty years to see from the sidelines what has been done which was received in a favorable light by the public and what wasn't. They have also had time to do a lot of checking up on their own shortcomings. This should help the party in carrying out their duty as the Leader during their adminis-

The Democratic party leaders have been too busy for the past several years "ruling" the people they didn't seem to have, or take, time to keep check on their own house. Now they will have time and an opportunity to take stock and see where they stand in the eyes of the Nation.

The voting public has come to life and if that spirit is maintained in the future this country shall have little to fear. A healthy domestic picture is assurance of a safe and sound democracy.

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Reading and Lighting and 'Rithmetic

Look what some figure-happy statistician just found out. From kindergarten through high school, school kids have to plow through a pile of books 18 feet high. A photograph taken of this pile of books would make your eyes ache.

Close visual work is hard on the eyes. A New York State survey of 83,000 students showed only one in 20 kids had vision defects at kindergarten age. By senior high, eye troubles affected six students in 20.

Good lighting is one readily available means of making seeing easier for these students. Lighting engineers find that over half the schools still use old, globe-type fixtures that give only one-sixth the light that ought to be on the

In those schools that have installed modern lighting, teachers report that students are more eager to study, are happier and require less discipline. The teachers find their jobs easier.

To help schools analyze what light is needed, General Electric engineers work out various lighting systems in model classrooms where effects can be demonstrated and compared. A booklet is offered, "Making Schoolwork Easier on the Eyes," in which current practices are summed up. (Write the Lamp Division, Nela Park, Cleveland, Ohio.)

Farmers interested in using these drills should contact the managers nearest them.

During the clover harvest a windrower was purchased to assist in the harvest. Since that Mrs. Fred Barton left Sunday time various uses have been made of it. Many farmers have used it to windrow feed crops to be baled for hay. Oats have been windrowed and later combined from the windrow. Recently the Cockrell Brothers near Big Valley, have used the machine in harvesting their crop of Buffle grass. This machine, with a few adjustments has enabled them to increase the amount of seed harvested per day from fifty pounds to one hundred an fifty pounds.


