Santa Claus Comes To Goldthwaite Saturday, Dec. 6

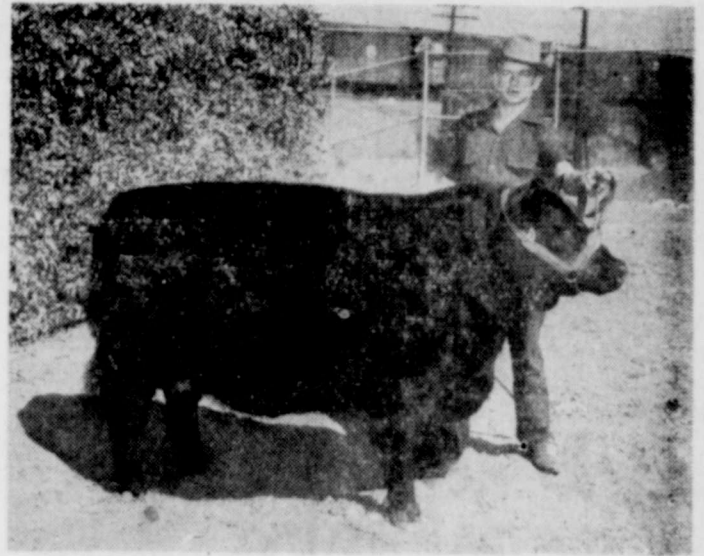

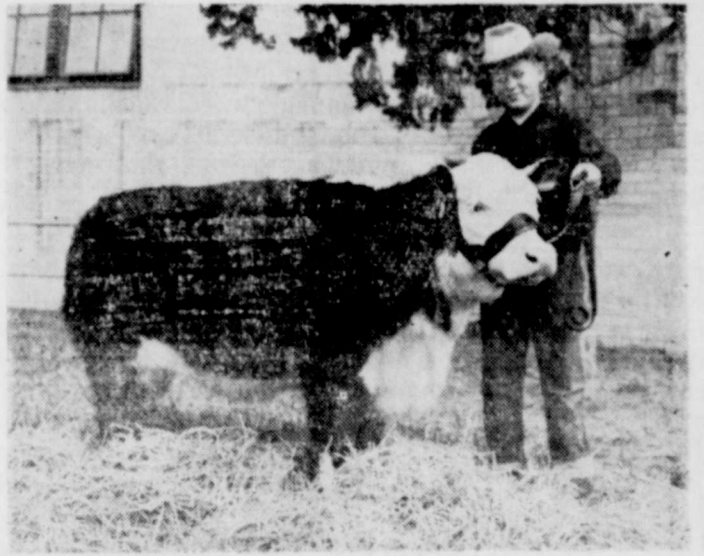

John Howard, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sherwood Owens, and Johnny, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Fisher Wigley, are 4-H Club members and have the distinction of being the first Mills County youths to exhibit calves at Chicago. They will leave Saturday, November 22, and return Tuesday, December 9.

Johnny, a lad of 13, will exhibit Prince, a Hereford calved March 1, 1951. Prince, who is widely known as "Bob," took first place in the Lightweight Steer Division at the 1952 Mills County Livestock Show and first place in the Lightweight Hereford Steer Junior Division at Houston. John Howard has proven himself an expert showman by exhibiting the Reserve Champion Steer of the Mills County Livestock Show in 1951 and the Reserve Champion Angus of the Junior Division at Houston the same year. He has been feeding winners for several years.

Grand Champion of the Chicago International Livestock Exposition will be picked on Tuesday, December 2. Winning calves will be sold at the Exposition and the others will be returned to their homes in the feed lots.

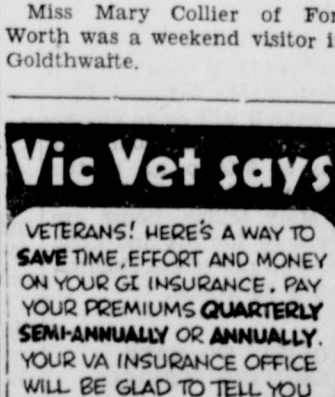

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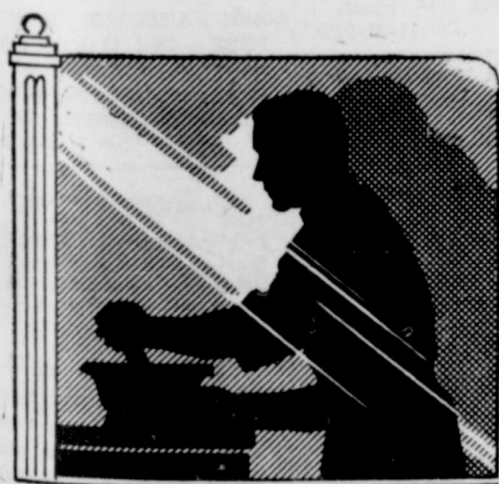

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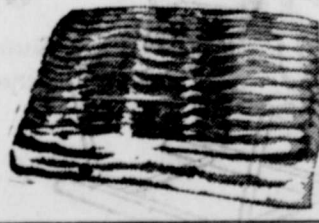

Rain is the happy note in our theme this week. On the night of November 4 I could hear it gently dripping from the house. Wednesday morning the rain gauge registered 5 inch. Sunday it poured. The gauge said 1.5 inches. The creek got up about four feet, and was still running Monday.

The peanut thresher moved into Charlie Griffin's field last week. Charlie decided some of his peanuts would do to thresh. He found Mr. Collier of Goldthwaite with a thresher that picks up the peanuts from the windrow, eliminating most of the hands usually required for threshing. There is also a baler to bale the peanuts not fit to be threshed.

Eugene Egger and Hubert Reeves will not start up their threshers this year, but will avail themselves of Mr. Collier's new type Thresher to gather their peanuts. Cecil Egger and Clayton Egger will follow suit.

We could see autumn on the hills as we went to town Friday. The sumachs were ablaze. The Clementine chrysanthemums have defied the drouth, and are more numerous than usual. We see them blooming in abundance along the rocky roadsides.

There is a lavender-blue fringed aster now hanging their blooms over the water's edge at our creek crossing. We first discovered these flowers when my Sister Nell (then of Ballinger), the late Mrs. Nellie Malone, well-known to this community, was making her first visit here in October, 1894. We children had to get out of the buggy and get our laps full of the lovely flowers. That night we played wedding. Clara Malone was the bride. Jim Wilmeth was the groom. My sister, Edna, and my niece, Nell Millar, were the flower girls. I performed the ceremony by saying, "Up the hill and down the hollow; Kiss your wife and give me a dollar." Still today, right in the same place, those same flowers are hanging their blooms over the water's edge.

We are happy over the way things seem to be going since the election. If only Fulton Lewis, Jr., and Morgan Beaty could let those little recording machines alone and quit trying to bring up naughty things said in the election. I wonder if they know nothing of forgetting and forgiving.

I had a birthday last week. Mrs. Lee Meek of Brownwood and I have the same birthday. As we were going to town that day (Friday), I asked of John that we go by and see her. I sent her a birthday card and wrote her to that effect. John and I had both known and loved Viola when she was a child. And Lee was my tall, handsome pupil when I taught my first school at Lane's Chapel. For more than six years Viola, a victim of paralysis, has not walked a step nor spoken a word. Yet by means of gestures and facial expressions she is able to communicate with her loved ones, and she is a very happy little person. She has a pretty home, a devoted husband, and a trained nurse to take care of her and her home. I did not know I was inviting myself to a birthday party, but that was just it. When we got there the house and yard were full of friends showering her with gifts. I took flowers, but she had scads of them. Almost as soon as I got in the house that dear Lee handed me a lovely gift of sachet powder for my birthday. We saw old friends: Aubrey Lyon (half brother to Viola), long ago of Indian Creek; Gussie and Tom Beard, old Kansas friends; and

Mrs. Adams, daughter of the late Doug Woods. How our memories raced back to the time when Elkins teemed with young folk. The Doug Woods family

was the largest and most prominent one there. A plate with punch, mints, and iced angel food squares was served to each guest. It was a lovely party.
