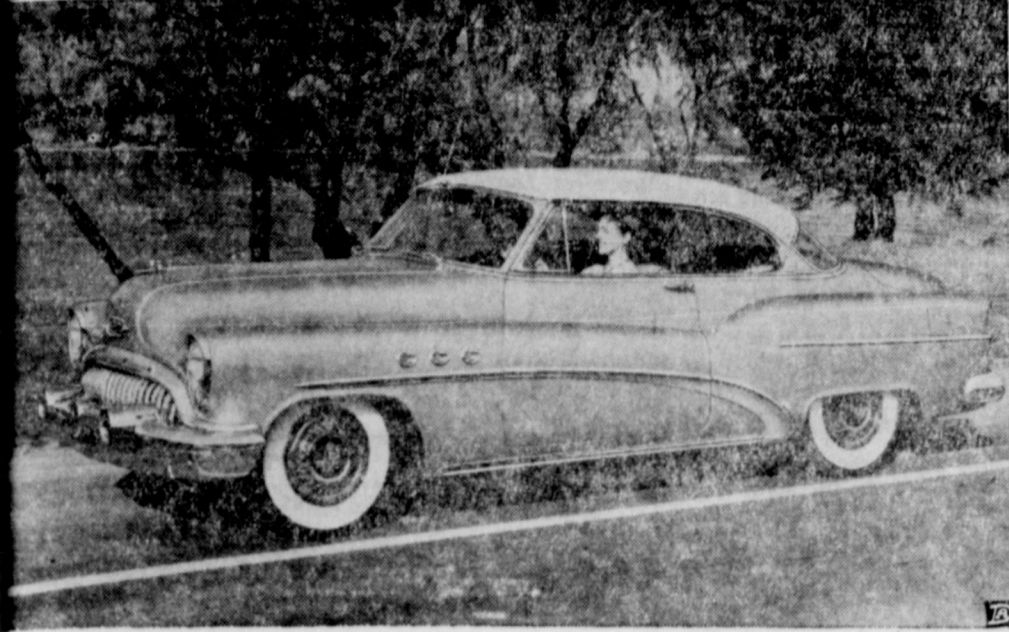

**Flax Shows Flax Takes Less Work**  
 Farmers faced with the problem of finding competent help in the coming year can find the answer by putting in a share of their land to flax.  
 Studies by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station show that flax requires an average of 17 minutes per acre, compared to 120 minutes for cotton. It takes twelve times as long to raise an acre of cotton as an acre of flax, which is not a high-profit crop, and requires more work than flax.  
 Equipment already found in Mills County is no great task for one man to prepare the land, plant, and harvest 300 acres of flax. He can thus keep a portion of land in a turn crop without depending on hired help.  
 Flax growers all over the state are glad to hear that the crop is not hurt by disease or insect stands drouth unusal.  
 Copies of a 16-page book on flax may be secured from the Texas Flax Improvement Association, Kenedy, Texas.

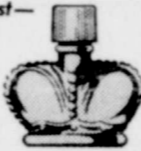

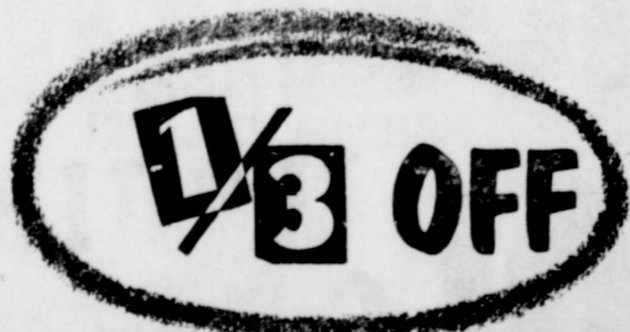

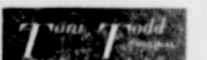
