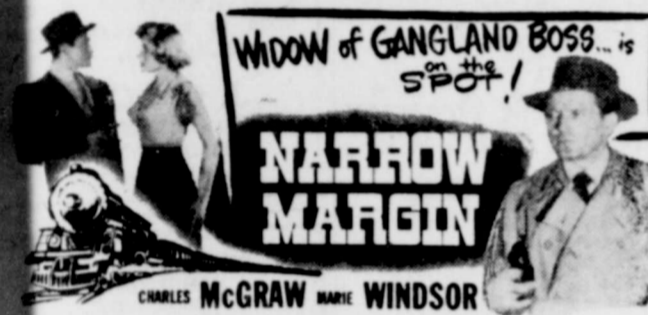

She moved with her parents to Ebony when she was eight years old, and with the exception of one year of married life at Brady, she has lived here and at Oakland the rest of her life. She grew up in the days when Ebony teemed with young people, and she entered heartily into the youthful activities of the community. To us she was Ella. She was known as the goodnatured, the kind-hearted, the one who showed herself friendly. And all her life she made friends.

On August 8, 1909 she was married to Frank Crowder. To them were born seven children. Three died in infancy. Of the four who survive she and Frank had every right to be proud. All are devoted Christians. The three sons have each answered the call of their country. C. C., is minister of the Church of Christ in Muscatine, Iowa; F. L., a graduate of A. & M., is County Agent of Fisher County. All were present when their mother passed away. Frank and they all pulled together to do everything they could to alleviate her suffering during her long illness.

For a long while Ella cared for her mother and her husband's mother. They each survive her. She is also survived by three sisters, Mrs. Myrt Ratliff of Sterling City, Mrs. Margie White of Bowser, and Mrs. Rita Mae Neal of Winchell; four brothers, Will of California, Ab of San Angelo, Floyd of McCamey, and Fred of Odessa; ten grandchildren; and a host of nieces and nephews.

She has been a faithful member of the Church of Christ 41 years. She was laid to rest Saturday in the Ebony Cemetery. London and Burton Funeral Home were in charge of arrangements. Cecil B. Douthitt of Brownwood and Henry Cleg-horn of Star were the officiating ministers.
The day was beautiful. The tabernacle bloomed with banks of beautiful flowers.
