





Shall the Board of Trustees of Goldthwaite Independent School District have the power to levy and collect an ad valorem tax on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollar valuation of all taxable property in said district, for the maintenance of the public free schools in said Goldthwaite Independent School District of and at the rate of not to exceed \$1.50 on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollar valuation of taxable property in said district, such tax, if voted to be levied and collected for the year 1953, and annually thereafter unless it be discontinued as provided by law.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR MAINTENANCE TAX"

"AGAINST MAINTENANCE TAX"

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black peneil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote.

None but resident qualified property taxpayin voters of said School District who own taxable property in said School District who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote at said election.
