Vote as certified by the council is 170 for the bonds and 39 against. Six ballots were discarded by the council because they were incorrectly marked.

While in special session the council also instructed Attorney E. B. Gilliam to take charge of and proceed with necessary legal matters pertaining to the printing and selling of the Revenue Bond Issue.

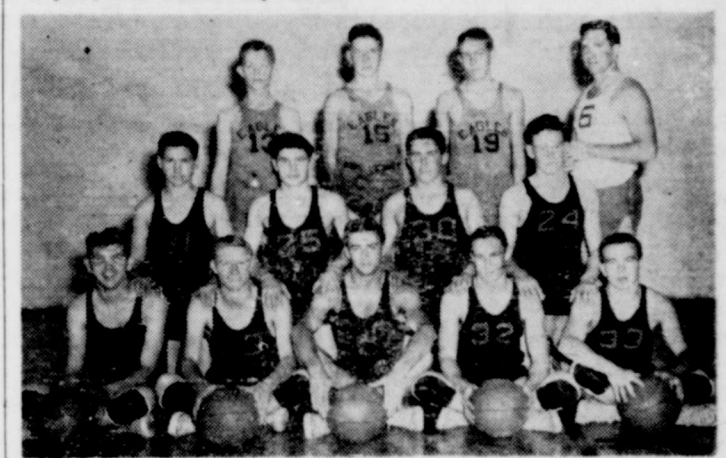

Elections For County And District School Trustees Scheduled April 4

Elections for County Trustee and District Trustee for each school district in Mills County will be held Saturday, April 4, 1953.

Voters of Mills County Commissioners Precinct No. 3 will elect one County Trustee for that Precinct, Mr. J. H. Priddy is now County Trustee from Precinct No. 3.

All voters of Mills County will elect one County School Trustee-at-Large. The present incumbent in this office is W. H. Wasserman.

Any five voters residing in a school district may petition for names to be printed on ballots for district trustees. In independent school district where there were over 500 scholastics for 1952-1953, this petition should be filed with the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of that District. (Goldthwaite is the only district in Mills County having over 500 scholastics). In common school districts, (Priddy is the only common school district in Mills County) and in independent school districts with less than 500 scholastics this petition should be signed by five or more voters and be filed with the County Judge. All petitions for names to be printed on ballots must be filed with the proper official at least 10 day before the Trustee election, or by March 24.

In a like manner, five or more voters living in Mills County may petition the County Judge to have names printed on ballots for County Trustee or for County Trustee-at-Large and any five voters living in Precinct No. 3 may petition the County Judge for names to be printed on ballots for County

Trustee for Precinct No. 3.

Before any person's name can legally be printed on a ballot for either County Trustee or School-District Trustee, he must sign the Candidate's Oath before a notary public or some other person authorized to administer oaths and file such oath with the person who is to have the names printed on ballots.

Blank oath forms for this purpose may be obtained at the County Judge's office.
