### Swimming Pool Park Committee Agrees On Site

The location committee for  
the proposed swimming pool  
and park for Goldthwaite and  
Mills County met in special  
session on Tuesday afternoon of  
this week to discuss possible  
sites and came out being in full  
accord as favoring the tract  
located in the Y of the San  
Saba and Lampasas highways  
at the south edge of the city.

All members of the commit-  
tee were present when Ray Dur-  
en, chairman, called on W. C.  
Barnett to give the committee  
a brief outline of what has  
transpired up to date regarding  
the project from the time it  
was first considered several  
years ago.

The location selected by the  
committee by unanimous agree-  
ment consists of thirteen acres  
providing ample ground for  
swimming pool and park de-  
velopment. It also has good soil  
with many native trees and  
shrubs, all of which, came up  
for consideration during the  
discussion.

The committee went on re-  
cord to express their apprecia-  
tion to Sam P. Rahl for making  
the site available and also to  
E. B. Gilliam and Raymond  
Little for their public spirit in  
acquiring the site and making  
it available to the committee  
at actual cost—providing the  
committee decided in favor of  
the location—without obliga-  
tion.

Organizations represented on  
the location committee are:  
City Council; Lions Club; Amer-  
ican Legion; Veterans of For-  
eign Wars; Art and Civic Club;  
Tuesday Study Club; Garden  
Club; and Self Culture Club.

The committees representing  
the city council and the Lions  
Club were scheduled to meet  
with a consulting engineer on  
Wednesday afternoon to hear  
recommendations from him on  
possible location of pool on the  
site and other details with re-  
ference to layout of a park  
and construction of the project.

On the county basis the drive  
is in full swing. Preliminary  
reports from the various work-  
ers are very encouraging and figures  
for the amount of contributions  
made will be announced next  
week, fund chairman, Warren  
P. Duren, announced. He also  
requested that the chairmen  
send in their reports of the  
amount raised by the end of  
this week.

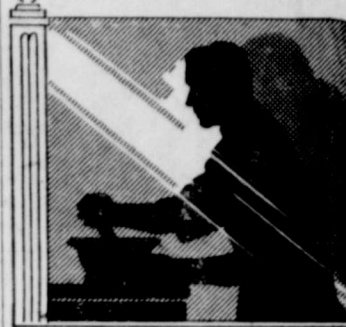
### Mrs. W. T. Wilkey Joins Her Husband At Camp Rucker

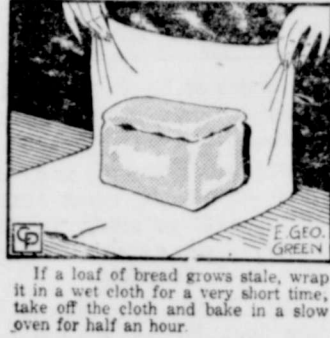

For Cheese Cake Fanciers

By ALICE DENHOF. NOT for waistline-watcher or for busy cooks is this Pineapple Cheese Cake. But it's good! For the crust, crush a 6-oz. package of zwieback with a rolling pin into fine crumbs; thoroughly blend with 2 tbsp sugar and 1/2 c. softened butter. Firmly press mixture on bottom and sides of a 9-in. spring-form pan. Pineapple Filling: For the filling, carefully place well drained contents of a No. 2 can crushed pineapple on top of zwieback crumb crust. Combine 1/2 c. sugar, 2 tbsp. flour and 1/4 tsp. salt. Add to 1 lb. cream cheese, softened (or 1/2 pound each cream and cottage cheeses); blend well. Add tsp. vanilla; stir in 4 egg yolks, one at a time. Add one c. light cream, blend well. Beat 4 egg whites stiff but not dry; fold into cheese mixture. Carefully pour over pineapple. Bake in moderately slow oven (325° F.) for 80 minutes. Cool before removing from pan. (If desired, an 8-in. spring-form pan may be used. If so, increase bak-

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Ike Finds It Difficult Filling Major Positions. Highly Qualified Leaders Reluctant to Swap Jobs. Special to Central Press. WASHINGTON—President Eisenhower is disappointed—and very much surprised over the difficulty he is meeting in filling many government posts. He had promised to bring the "best brains" to Washington and he is earnestly trying to carry out that campaign pledge. However, it is not easy. For one thing, there is still that fight over patronage between Senator Robert A. Taft and Atty. Gen. Herbert Brownell. More prevalent, is the reluctance with which many of those "best brains" who guided the Eisenhower "crusade" face the prospect of leaving private jobs for government posts, which are certainly not very high-paying. One result is that many agencies are trying to get along with a skeletonized high command. Another is that many Democrats still hold important posts in the Republican administration. The President is annoyed by the situation—part of which arose because of the Senate armed services committee's decision that the "conflict of interests" law could not be stretched for the Pentagon "team." A lot of the "best brains," it seems, holds a lot of stock it will not or cannot afford to sell.

Never again put her on trial or ask her to testify against herself. She knows that at almost any time you look at her you recall her theft. When instead you can smile at her with a heart full of love and hope, picturing her as the lovely girl she will be, she will grow to be just that. When she can feel your love as you listen to what she has to tell you about her fun and work, and hear your tender tones, often causing her to want to come and chat with you, her stealing will disappear. When she feels right toward everyone in the family, she just can't steal.

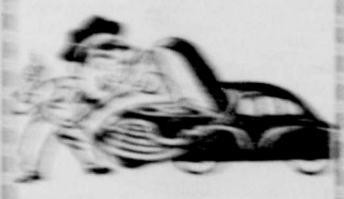

WHEREAS the Red Cross, as the national coordinating agency for the procurement of blood for defense, is collecting the vast quantities required for military and civilian use and, in addition, is expanding its program to make gamma globulin available for the prevention of paralysis from poliomyelitis; and

WHEREAS the Red Cross is appealing for \$93,000,000 in voluntary contributions as the minimum amount required to help those in need of special assistance throughout the Nation in the year ahead;

**Local FHA Chapter Joins State-Wide Save-The-Children Clothing Crusade**

The Goldthwaite F. H. A. Chapter will take part in a state-wide Children's Clothing Crusade to collect serviceable used clothing during the week of March 23rd, School Superintendent J. T. Jones, F. H. A. Advisor and Miss Louise Irvine, Sponsor, announced today.

Known as Save-The-Children Bundle Week, the five day clothing collection is part of the Eleventh National Children's Clothing Crusade under auspices of a national committee of school superintendents. Leland D. Carmack, Associate Production Director of Save The Children Federation, has announced a goal of 300,000 pounds for Texas Schools.

Clothing obtained will be distributed by Save The Children Federation in its program of assistance to children in isolated rural areas of the United States, on Indian Reservations, in Western Europe, the Far East, and the Near East.

Child war victims in Korea, Finland, France, Greece, Austria, Germany, Italy and Lebanon will be overseas beneficiaries. In America, clothing is distributed in a carefully planned self-help program in needy rural areas of eight

Southern states in which the Federation operates its school sponsorship program.

Many children in the American areas served come from families with cash incomes of less than \$400 a year. If it were not for Save-The-Children Bundle Week clothing collections, many of these children would not be able to attend school in bad weather. Clothing is distributed to needy families on Indian reservations and to children both in and out of school. Clothing in Korea will be distributed through the Unified Command.

Superintendent Jones reported that Save The Children Federation has shipped by air 30,000 pounds of specially selected warm clothing to Holland, France and England to aid victims of the ocean storms. Additional shipments are being prepared, Federation officials advised. "Part of the local collection will aid these storm devastated areas," Superintendent Jones stated.

**Social Security Benefits From Self Employment**

At least three million self-employed Americans are now fully insured under the Social Security Act, it was stated today by James B. Marley of the Austin office of the Social Security Administration. Many retired workers, or families of self-employed people who have died, are already receiving cash monthly payments.

All self-employed persons, in order to be certain that they are credited with enough coverage to be fully insured, should make certain that they file a complete and correct report on their self-employment income for 1952 at the time they file their income tax returns.

The Social Security Act provides that any person who has net income from self-employment of at least \$400 in a taxable year be credited with four calendar quarters of coverage. An individual who has eight such quarters of coverage is fully insured through June 1955. This means that both the worker and his family may become entitled to benefits in case he reaches retirement, or his survivors may become entitled in case of his death, during this period.

Each self-employed person should make sure that he files a complete report of his self-employment income, if it is over \$400 for the taxable year. This must be done if no other tax is paid. Care should be taken to make sure the description of the trade or business is an accurate one, he stated. Each self-employed person must show his social security number on his tax return if he is to be given credit.

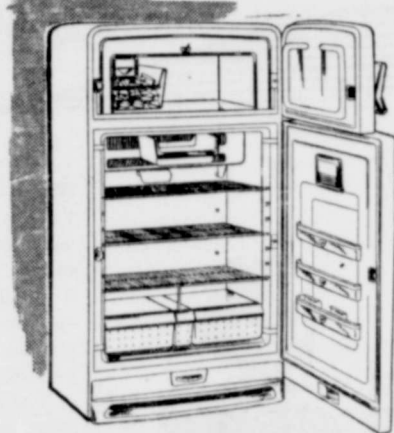

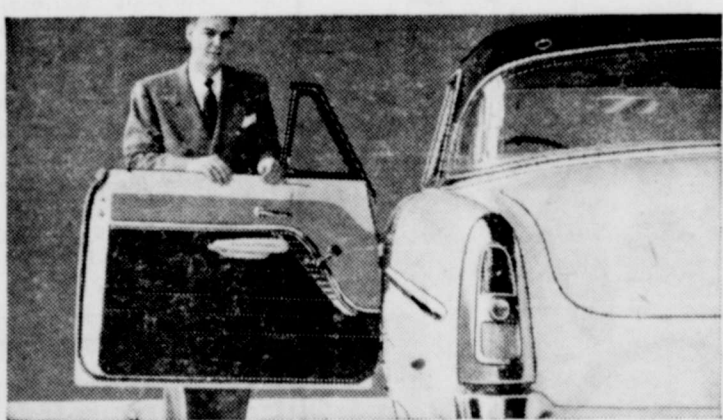
