Ike Finds It Difficult

Filling Major Positions

Highly Qualified Leaders Reluctant to Swap Jobs

Special to Central Press WASHINGTON-President Eisenhower is disappointed-and very much surprised over the difficulty he is meeting in filling many government posts. He had promised to bring the "best brains" to

Washington and he is earnestly trying to carry out that campaign pledge. However, it is not easy. For one thing, there is still that fight over patronage between Sena-

tor Robert A. Taft and Atty-Gen. Herbert Brownell. More prevalent, is the reluctance with which many of those "best brains" who guided the Eisenhower "crusade" face the prospect of leaving private jobs for government posts, which are certainly not very high-

One result is that many agencies are trying to get along with a skeletonized high command. Another is that many Democrats still hold important posts in the Republican administration.

The President is annoyed by the situation-part of which arose because of the Senate armed services committee's decision that the "conflict of interests" law could not be stretched for the Pentagon "team." A lot of the "best brains," it seems, holds a lot of stock it will not or cannot afford to

• FARM BLOC-The economic philosophy of the Eisenhower administration is already undergoing an acid test on the issue of a free: market versus federal price supports to farmers.

The drop in prices on most crops has brought a cry from midwestern Republicans as well as Democrats that Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson is doing nothing to stem the decline. Several congressmen want the price support program strengthened, while Benson, supported by the President, favors a gradual return to the open, unregulated market-without price supports or price controls.

Mr. Eisenhower drew heavy support at the ballot box in the rural areas. The question now is whether the farmers will demand continued and expanded subsidies to meet the "price squeeze," which finds their net income dropping or whether they will agree to return to market-

ing without government aid or regulation.

The administration believes the latter course is the best way to assure farmers of profits and keep the rest of the economy in balance. Farm state senators indicate disagreement with this program but the voters in rural areas will have the decisive voice.

• BUSY TYCOON—Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson has demonstrated that as a former president of General Motors he knows how to put a fellow tycoon on the spot.

David Sarnoff, chairman of Radio Corporation of America, had just disbanded his "Citizens Committee" with a one-paragraph recommendation that the Pentagon should reduce the military establishment by 500,000 men and \$5 billion a year.

The next day Wilson added Sarnoff as a last-minute member to

another committee which has the job of reorganizing the Defense department. The point was that Sarnoff gave no indication how 500,000 men could be eliminated when the UN forces in Korea are crying for more troops, more planes and more ships. In his new job; which he couldn't refuse, Sarnoff will have to be specific.

#### Social Security Benefits From Self Employment

At least three million selfemployed Americans are now fully incured under the Social Security Act, it was stated today by James B. Marley of the Austin office of the Social Security Administration. Many retired workers, or families of self-employed people who have died, are already receiving cash monthly payments.

All self-employed persons, in order to be certain that they are credited with enough coverage to be fully insured, should make certain that they file a complete and correct report on their self-employment income for 1952 at the time they file their income tax returns.

The Social Security Act provides that any person who has net income from elf-employment of at least \$400 in a taxable year be credited with four calendar quarters of coverage. An individual who has eight such quarters of coverage is fully insured through June 1955. This means that both the workdaughter, Mrs. Mary Margaret er and his family may become entitled to benefits in case he reaches retirement, or his survivors may become entitled in case of his death, during this
