## City Council Employs Engineer For Swimming Pool-Park Construction Job

The city council, meeting in special session last Wednesday, employed A. E. Stein, of New Braunfels, as engineer for the proposed swimming pool-park and instructed him to proceed in drawing up plans and specifications for the pool and to assist the pool committee in selecting pool location on the site and in actual construction of the project.

This action was taken after Mr. Stein, who was here Wednesday afternoon and Thursday morning, met with the pool committee, composed of members from the council and the Lions Club, when they went

over the grounds and made a recommendation to the council as to actual location for the pool. The site recommended by the committee was approved by the council and they also went on record and approved the purchase of land which was selected by the location committee in a meeting a day earlier, after recommendation from the finance committee which was appointed to see about the matter.

The land purchased for the swimming pool-park project is located in the Y between the San Saba and Lampasas highways at the south edge of the city. The site where the pool and bathhouse will be located is directly across the San Saba highway from the Claude Eacott home—about 150 feet back from the highway. The site has been staked out and folks who are interested in seeing the location are invited to drive out and have a look.

Plans and specifications are now in the process of being made up by the engineer and formal approval of the bonds is in the hands of the State of Texas Attorney General and the Comptroller of Currency.

It is assumed that this approval is a matter of formality only and plans are going forward for sale of the Revenue Bonds as soon as approval is received. Actual construction will get underway as soon as legal details can be ironed out. The committee is doing all that can be done until all legal matters are taken care of.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Van Fleet Seen Serving In Civilian Capacity Ex-Eighth Army Leader May Become Ambassador

WASHINGTON—Administration circles predict that President Eisenhower will continue to make use of the services of Gen. James A. Van Fleet, who has relinquished command of the Eighth Army in Korea. Gen. Van Fleet is retiring from active duty in the Army, but is reported willing and eager to serve Ike in a civilian capacity.

The general is said to be under consideration for appointment as United States ambassador to Russia, which has been a vacant post since the Soviets demanded recall of George F. Kennan.

Some observers believe, however, that Charles (Chip) Bohlen, one of the State department's top experts on the Kremlin, will be assigned to Moscow and that Van Fleet will be given a job as a roving trouble-shooter, with ambassadorial rank.

In Greece, before he undertook his Korean task, Van Fleet proved himself to be an accomplished diplomat as well as a formidable military strategist.

He is highly regarded in the Middle East, and the increasingly unhappy situation there, heightened by Russia's break-off of diplomatic relations with Israel, may result in his assignment to that area.

STABLE DOLLAR—President Eisenhower's initial moves on the economic front give encouragement to the proponents of a "sound" stable dollar. In his State of the Union message, Mr. Eisenhower went out of his way to stress that the Treasury and the Federal Reserve Board would work within a unified policy framework to control governmental policy on interest rates and the volume of money available to banks for lending purposes.

In the past, divergent policies of these two agencies have brought about a "cheap money policy" which has stimulated bank borrowings for business purposes. One result of this trend has been to increase the "velocity" of the economy, while at the same time bringing the charge of "planned" inflation.

The new administration's order curtailing government hiring, and an apparent determination to reduce government spending, will contribute greatly to the establishment of a stable dollar.

Government deficit spending is the largest single contributor to inflation, as it increases the number of dollars in the hands of Americans and results in lessened value to each dollar.

Taken altogether, the impact of these projected Eisenhower economic moves will be to bring about a gentle "deflation" which might shrink the overall national income slightly, but which would virtually guarantee that a dollar a year from now will be equal to its current purchasing power.

UNEMPLOYED ATOM EXPERT—The only man who ever made atomic energy seem simple is about to start looking for a job. This would be Navy Capt. H. G. Rickover, in charge of the atomic submarine project. Navy selection boards, which choose who shall be admirals, twice have decided Rickover should not be promoted.

According to law, Rickover must now retire unless the Navy changes its mind shortly. The latest rejection of Rickover's promotion came only a few days after the secretary of the Navy pinned a medal on the captain for his part in the development of atomic energy.

Rickover's approach has admittedly speeded the submarine's construction and he has convinced the Atomic Energy Commission's top experts that his ideas will work. Since he built a model and proved his points, the Navy is having a hard time explaining why Rickover was not promoted. The only answer is that he has been on the atomic project only two years, and that the promotion boards, which can select only so many, have to consider fitness records going back 30 years.

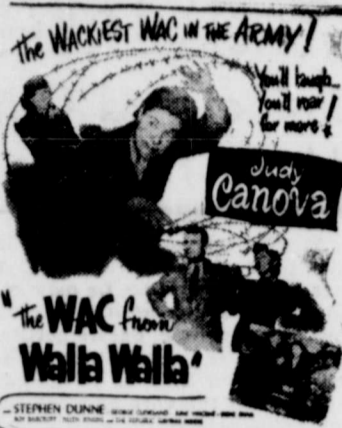

**Include Citrus In Your Meals**

By ALICE DENHOFF

ORANGE juice, delicious navel  
oranges now in our markets and  
lemons, plus healthful grapefruit,  
served often, will keep the family  
health up to par and prevent that  
dragged-out late-winter feeling.

There are many ways to work  
citrus into the family meals. For  
instance, here's a fine recipe for  
Ham with Orange Sauce.

Fry 6 servings of ham (1 1/2 lbs.).  
Add 2 tbsp. flour to 2 tbsp. of fat  
from frying ham; cook until  
lightly browned. Add 2 c. orange  
juice, stirring well to avoid lumps.  
Cook 5 minutes, or until sauce is  
thick. Pour sauce around ham on  
serving dish; garnish with pars-  
ley and orange slices.

**Chops with Orange**  
If it's lamb, veal or pork chops,  
try this one, the recipe for 6.  
Trim fat from 6 thick chops and  
dip them in melted butter. Oil  
broiler well and broil chops 8  
minutes. Turn and place a thick  
slice of peeled orange on each  
chop. Broil 8 to 10 minutes longer.  
Sprinkle generously with salt,  
pepper and paprika. Serve hot.

Canned salmon is a lifesaver  
when a quickly prepared main  
course is needed.

To serve 6, chill a 1-lb. can of  
salmon. Remove fish from can  
and cut in four parts with a sharp  
knife. Arrange in shallow baking  
dish and sprinkle with tsp. le-  
mon juice and 4 tsp. sharp  
French dressing. Place a bay leaf  
on each serving of salmon. Bake  
at 400°F. about 20 minutes, or  
until heated through. Remove  
bay leaves. Sprinkle with paprika  
and serve with lemon quarters.

**Healthful Sweet**

Baked-Orange Marie is a deli-  
cious and healthful sweet, a good  
choice for a company meal.

With a sharp knife, cut off tops  
and remove meat from 4 oranges,  
leaving shells clean. Combine  
orange meat with 8 stoned and  
shredded dates, 4 tsp. each chop-  
ped walnuts, grated coconut and  
seeded raisins. Sweeten to taste.  
Fill orange shells. Bake in dish  
with 1/2 in. of water in bottom in  
a slow oven for 45 minutes. Take  
out of oven and top oranges with  
meringue made with an egg white  
stiffly beaten with 2 tsp. honey.  
Sprinkle meringue with coconut;  
return oranges to oven to brown.  
A marshmallow may be used to  
top each orange in place of  
meringue, if desired.

**PARENT PROBLEMS**

**Inside And Out, A Car Holds Many Hazards For Children**

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

THERE are many dangers to the little child in or around a car. If he can toddle, he may get in the car's way as it is backed out of the garage. Before getting into your car, know where the child is. See that he is indoors then, or in the care of some responsible person.

Always when you park your car in the garage, the driveway, or street by your house, take the keys with you. Although no child may be around, one may be later. And if you leave the key in the car when no child is near, you are more likely to do so when one is. In order to cultivate a safe habit, allow no exceptions. There have been some serious accidents when little children have started a car or been in it alone while the engine was running.

**Rule To Enforce**

It's also a good rule not to allow young children to be in a parked car alone, even without keys. This rule can easily be enforced by parents who have taught the child the meaning of "No." (How Teach Tot Meaning of "No" may be had in a stamped envelope sent me in care of this paper.)

Don't allow your tot to stand up in the front or back seat, as the danger to him from falling is

very great. While he naturally is eager to be high enough to see ahead, an older person should guard him or he should be strapped into the back of the car.

It's when the youngster is big enough to want to manhandle the handles of the door that the greatest hazards can arise. Parents who have taught the meaning of "No" in regular situations about the home may be telling this youngster just to keep him from fooling with the door handles once and for all.

**May Still Do It**

But even though this youngster is pretty well trained, he is venturing to touch or move the handles, especially after a long period of traveling; and with two or more young children in the car, or more is likely to tamper with the handles. Many parents have a two-door car, and the child has the inside handles from the back doors.

A good many accidents occur when the driver is distracted by quarreling children. If this can be settled by other means, should drive the car off the road and paddle the young wanderer thus settling this problem permanently. Severe as such a measure seems to be, it is in comparison with possible

Services were under direction of Roy Wilkins Funeral Home, with Chester Frazier having charge of the choir.

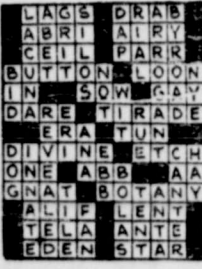
