Local School Census Taking Continues A Week

The annual task of census ed. taking remains a problem in every school district in the State of Texas but is much lessened in the Goldthwaite district by the proper cooperation of all the parents within the district. Most every child who was born on or before September 1, 1935 and not later than September 1, 1947 must be enumerated. Any child missed carries a penalty of the State apportionment which this year amounts to \$68.00 to the district. If you are a parent of our district and have a child falling within this bracket, please call at the school building or in the County Judge's office and render the child's name for the school census.

It is to be a modern brick and tile structure with front facing East. Plans at this time are not certain whether entrance will be from Parker Street on the east or whether the building will have a corner entrance. According to plans the building will be completely modern with automatic thermostatically controlled heating and air-conditioning. It will have proper loading dock facilities along with parking space at the rear of the building.

After you have done that and things aren't going to suit you you can speak up and let the officials know how you feel. If you don't vote you still have the right, but, really haven't any good reason for popping off steam if things don't go right.


