Telephone Co-op Lets Construction Contracts For Near Million Dollars

Construction contracts covering inside and outside plant facilities were let by the board of directors of the Central Texas Telephone Co-operative at a special meeting on Tuesday of this week at the central office in Goldthwaite, according to announcement to the Eagle Wednesday morning.

Outside plant construction bids were accepted in two sections—1) Brady area, and, 2) Goldthwaite and San Saba area. Bid from Midwest Construction Company of Dallas was accepted for section one and McKenzie Construction Company of San Antonio was awarded the

contract for section two. Each of these projects will cost approximately \$350,000.00, or \$700,000.00 for the two jobs.

North Electric Company of Gideon, Ohio was awarded the contract for central office equipment, costing \$195,000.00.

These actions followed a recent trip to Washington by Ernest Wilson, secretary, and C. C. Sanders, manager of the Co-operative, where they spent a week transacting business for the firm, which included getting construction contracts approved and funds released for construction of outside and inside plant facilities.

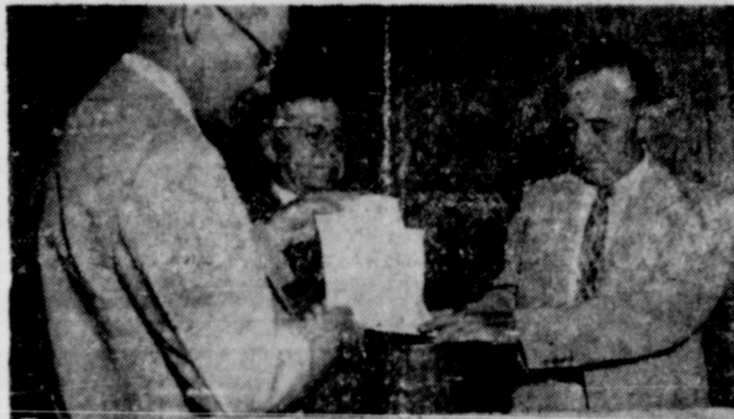
This was a well played game being played in record time. You fans who missed this game missed a good game. Very few errors were made on either side.

Local Baptists And Friends Have Note Burning-Dedication Services Last Sunday

A report given at the special service shows that members of the local congregation and their friends contributed \$70,000.00 to build a new church which was destroyed by fire soon after it was completed. Then members of the congregation rallied to the cause and another new church was constructed at a cost of \$93,000.00 and paid for with the exception of \$23,000.00, and this amount was retired by the church during the past three and one-half years.

County Commissioners To Sit As Equalization Board July 1-2

According to notice published last week the Commissioners Court of Mills County will sit as a board of equalization for tax purposes on Wednesday and

Thursday of next week, July 1 and 2.

Members of the board worked for approximately a week on checking the tax roll and as a result something over four hundred notices have been sent out to tax payers on the tax equalization program for the county.

All persons desiring to appear before the equalization board are notified to do so at the time set forth in the announcement when the board will meet in the commissioners court room in Mills County courthouse.

Reports indicate the county was faced with a tax rendition decline this year and in order to meet operating expenses it was found necessary to undertake some form of equalization program.

Result of the work done by the commissioners will increase the tax rendition rolls by \$100,000.00 and with present tax levy it will bring in about \$800.00 additional revenue for the county.

According to announcement to the Eagle this week there is a total of ten bids submitted for the job. According to specifications, the contractor who's bid is accepted will have two weeks in which to get started on the job with a 120 day deadline for completion.

Since the Post Office is to have possession of their new quarters by October 1st, it is expected that work on the building will get underway shortly after contract is let.

Plans call for the gang to get together again this morning, (Thursday) to give the floor the second coat of blue paint and then the pool will be completed on the inside.

The swimming pool committee has announced that it is too early to set a definite date for the official opening, although it is expected to be announced by the time the Eagle goes to press next week.

Actual construction will be completed by the end of next week, according to W. C. Barnett, of City Utilities, who has been in charge of the job.

Due to being in the middle of the summer season it will be necessary to fill the pool with water from the old abandoned city well at the highway Y at the south edge of the city. It is expected to take several days for the pool to be filled from this source. No water will be used from the regular city water supply, it was announced.

SCHOOL BUSINESS IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

Tonight the Board of Education of Goldthwaite Independent School District, and a group of citizens who are serving in an advisory capacity, will again meet to further discuss the proposed school building program which was given the go ahead signal by the voters at the recent special election when \$190,000.00 in building bonds were approved.

It has been pointed out to patrons of the district that members of the school board are tackling the problem of providing the best possible school facilities, to take care of the needs of the district over a long period of years, with an open mind and that they are interested in patrons passing along to them ideas and suggestions.

The responsibility, of spending a large sum of money for new school building and improving existing buildings, which rests on the shoulders of school officials is a great one, and, we feel that they are acting wisely when they try to analyse the problems involved from every possible angle before taking final action.

We would like to remind all residents of the school district that they also have a big stake in our educational system. School business is big business, and, it is the business of everyone, living and paying taxes or having children going to school, in the district.

The school building program which is about to be undertaken is a program that will last for a long time and will have to serve the needs of the district for a good many years. It deserves every consideration from as many school patrons as possible.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

See Taxpayer Deciding Fate of Tax Program Solons Are Likely to Nix Own \$10,000 Pay Boost

WASHINGTON--The next step in President Eisenhower's tax program is up to Rep. Daniel Reed (R), New York--and the taxpayer. There is no question as to what Reed will do. He has already promised to fight vigorously against extension of the excess profits tax and the delay in cutting income taxes.

However, whether or not his fight is successful really depends on the American taxpayer--the kind who writes to his congressman. That's why the President told the nation of his tax plans over the radio, instead of merely submitting them to Congress.

Mr. Eisenhower knew he needed popular support to get his way. He had to take his budget and tax case to the people, to convince them it would be best to put off tax relief.

If they respond as the administration hopes by writing to their congressmen backing up the President, then Reed, for all his power as chairman of the House ways and means committee, will be defeated.

However, if the letter and telegram writers back home insist on tax reduction now, in spite of Mr. Eisenhower, then Reed's hand will be considerably strengthened, and he may even get his way, at least as far as income taxes are concerned.

As for the President, losing to Reed this way would be the severest blow his political career has yet suffered. For by going to the people with the tax plans, Mr. Eisenhower was staking his administration's financial success on his personal popularity and leadership.

SAIING "NO" TO \$10,000--Despite the fact they have President Eisenhower's blessing to do it, members of Congress are likely to turn down the \$10,000 pay raise for themselves recommended by a Senate committee. Lawmakers are still sensitive about the "Bundles for Congress" cry raised a few years ago when they approved a pension plan for themselves.

Also, a good many senators were rather flabbergasted when they heard that the recommended raise ran up to \$10,000. Their off-the-record comments were mostly that it was too big an increase.

A reporter who cornered several senators in the Senate dining room right after the raise was approved in committee, got some strange reactions. One said, "We are not worth that much." However, he was silenced by his colleagues who cried, "Oh, don't say that!"

Actually, the Senate judiciary committee which approved the raise, said that the new proposed salaries of \$25,000 would bring a lawmaker's income to the purchasing level his salary gave him in 1937.

Some of the other recommended increases--such as a \$10,000 pay boost for federal judges and varying raises for district attorneys--have a better chance of getting through the economy-minded 83rd Congress.

ALPHONSE AND GASTON--The Republican congressional campaign committee reports this bit of by-play as solid evidence that the Eisenhower administration is reversing what they characterize as the power-grasping attitudes and surfeits of the executive branch during the past 20 years.

Seems a group of farm leaders urged Agriculture Secretary Ezra Taft Benson to try to have the Office of Farm Labor returned from the Labor department to the Agriculture department. It had been transferred several years ago.

Benson brought the matter up at a Cabinet meeting but told the Eisenhower he had no desire to take back the office. Not to be outdone in gallantry, Labor Secretary Martin Durkin--a Democrat, in-cidentally--volunteered to return the office to Benson's department.

In the end, it was decided to keep it where it is. According to the Republican committee, President Eisenhower said, "This is the most encouraging thing I have seen since I returned to Washington."

Facts About Draft Regulations

It is a local draft board's responsibility, under law and regulations, to decide, subject to appeal, the class in which each man registered with it shall be placed.

Each registrant is considered as available for military service until his eligibility for deferment or exemption from military service is clearly established to the satisfaction of the local board.

The board is obligated to receive all pertinent information on classification presented to it, say Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state draft director.

Mailing by the local board of a classification questionnaire to the latest address furnished by a registrant is notice to the registrant that he will be classified in I-A, unless information is presented to the local board, within the time specified for return of the questionnaire, which will justify his deferment or exemption.

Unless the local board gives him added time, the registrant must return the questionnaire filled out within ten days from the date it was mailed.

The state draft director points to this paragraph in the Selective Service Regulations which the board must always keep in mind:

"In classifying a registrant there shall be no discrimination for or against him because of his race, creed or color, or because of his membership or activity in any labor, political, religious or other organization. Each such registrant shall receive equal justice."

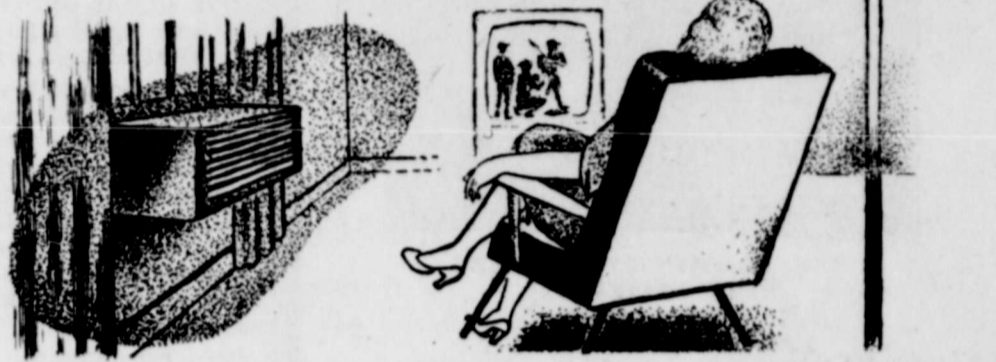

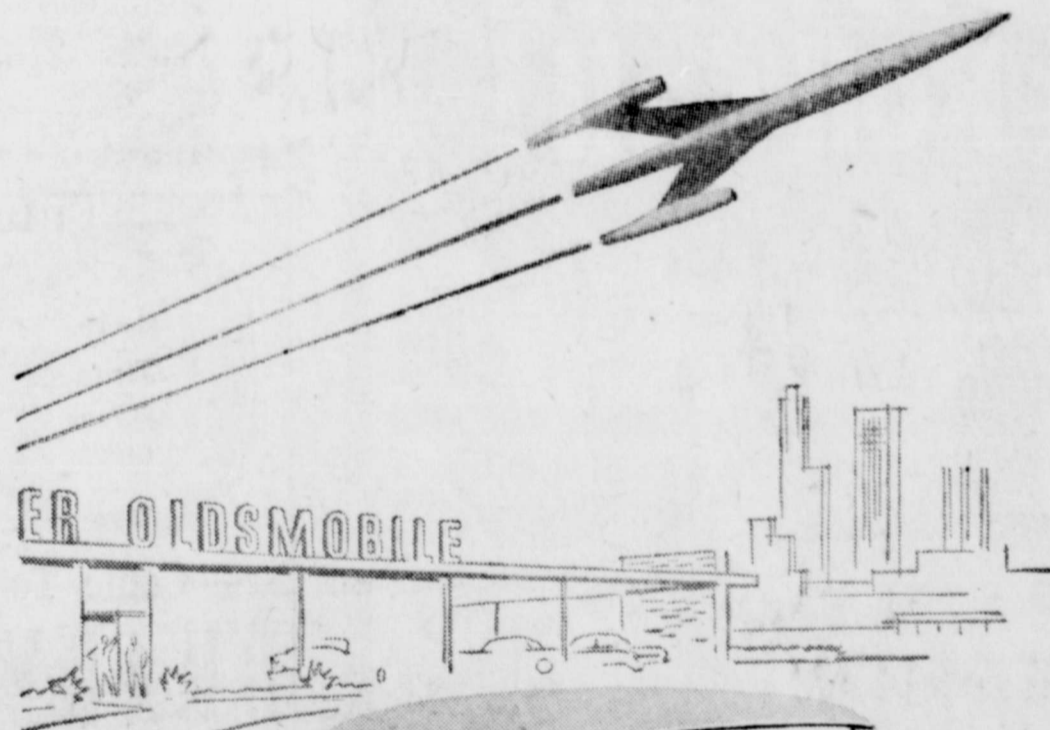

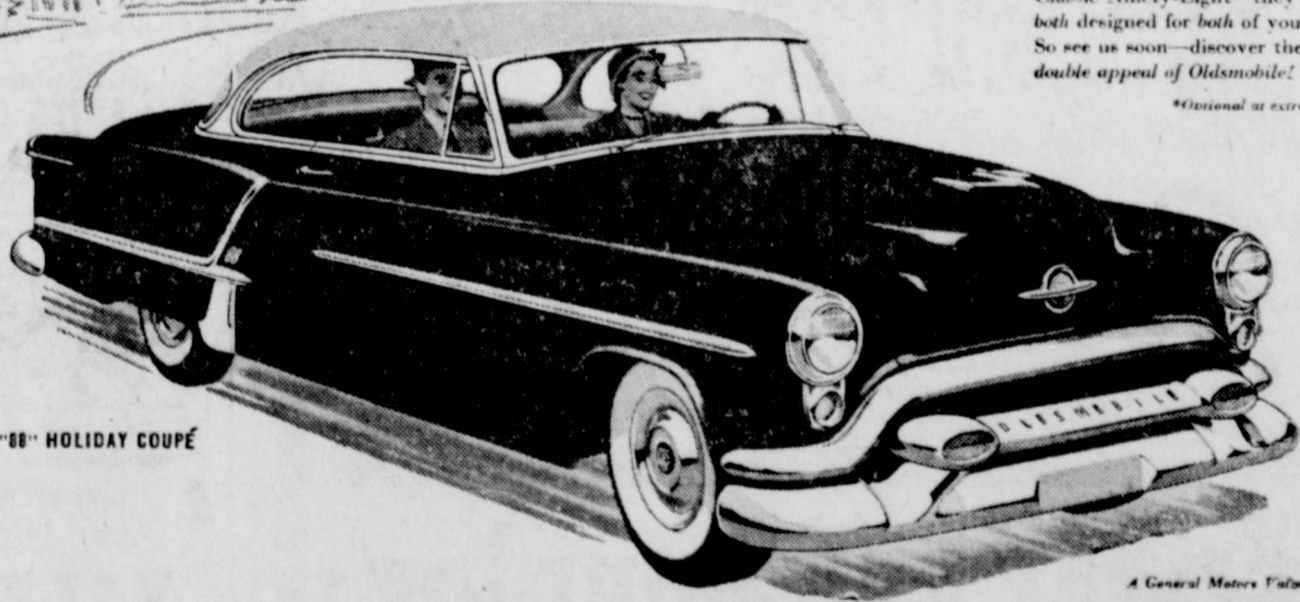

Mrs. Marvin S. Murphy Gets Medal Honoring Husband Killed In Korea

Mrs. Marvin S. Murphy of 125 Culver Street, Macon, Georgia, whose husband was killed in Korea June 21, 1952, received the posthumous award of the Distinguished Flying Cross during a special parade of the Mercer University ROTC regiment at Noon May 11, 1953.

Mrs. Murphy held her young son, Marvin S. Murphy Jr. while Col. Wiley S. Tonnar pinned the medal on him. Capt. Charles G. Payne Jr., senior unit instructor of Officer Reserve Corps headquarters, read the citation which reads as follows:

The President of the United States of America, authorized by Act of Congress, July 2, 1926, has awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, posthumously, to First Lieutenant Marvin S. Murphy, U. S. A. for heroism while participating in Aerial flight:

Lt. Murphy, Artillery, 7th Infantry Div., distinguished himself by heroism while participating in an Aerial flight over enemy-held territory near Nar-chon, Korea, on 21st June 1952.

Voluntarily acting as observer in an unarmed plane, he transmitted vital information by radio on enemy positions during attack on Kuy Turim. Flying at low altitudes within range of enemy anti-aircraft and machine gun fire and frequently operating in the trajectory of artillery, he adjusted fire power in support of friendly troops engaged in hand to hand combat with the enemy.

Disregarding his own safety he continued to direct fire power until the mission was successfully accomplished but while covering the withdrawal of friendly forces, he lost his life when the plane was hit by a projectile and crashed to the ground.

His action enabled the battalion to fulfill its mission and inflict heavy casualties on the enemy.

Lt. Murphy's outstanding courage and consummate devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and uphold the highest tradition of the military service.

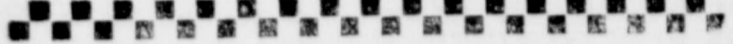

The second six weeks of summer school at Tarleton will start July 20.

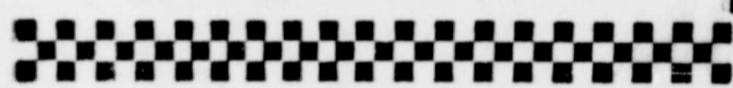

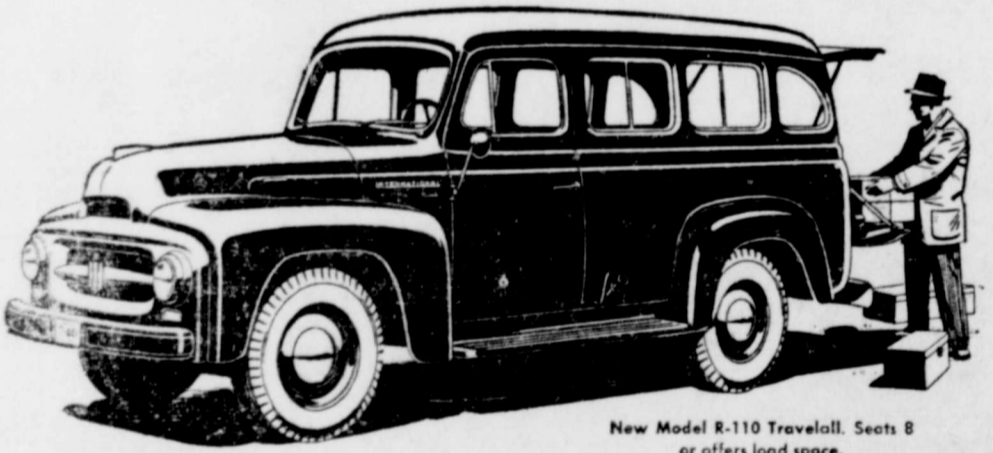

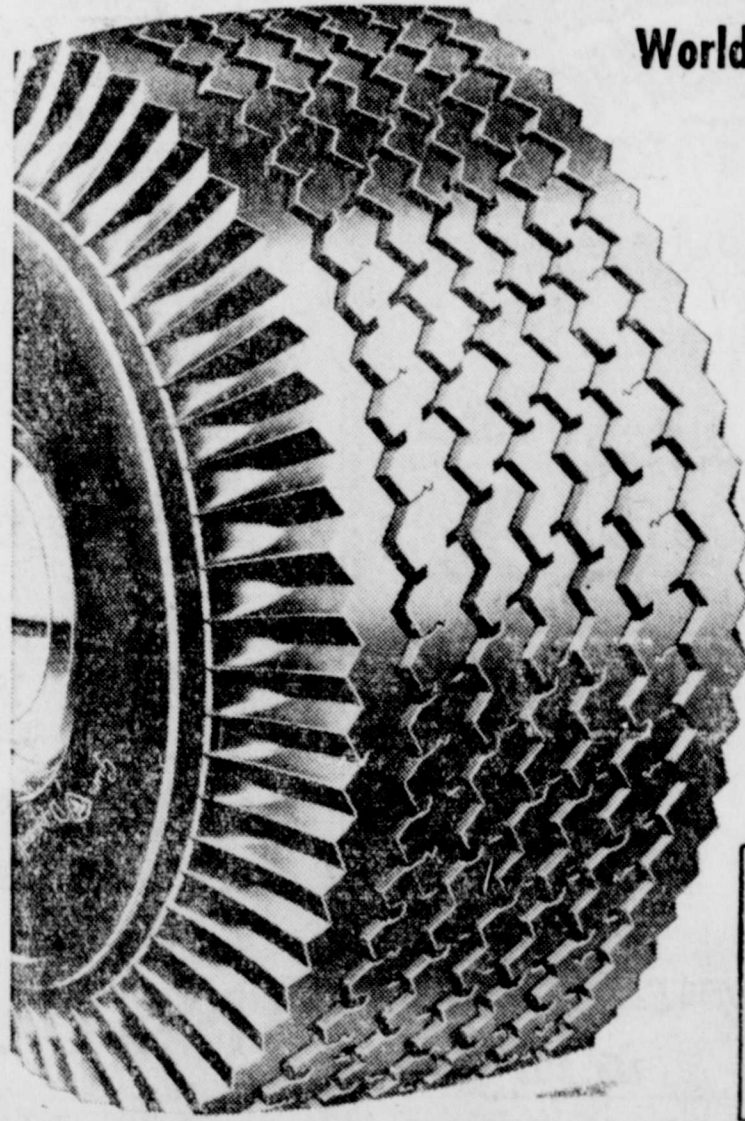

SHORT-TERM FARM DEBTS

Each year, farmers and ranchmen use a large amount of short-term credit to good advantage.

Such credit is usually not secured by a lien on real estate, but is largely repaid within one year, although some runs for a longer period. A quick look at this situation shows that these short term debts increased for 2.9 billion dollars on January 1, 1946, to about 7.6 billion dollars on January 1, 1953.

In the past few years, farm production costs jumped and labor became scarce. This fact encouraged farmers to do more and more of their work with labor-saving machines and to spend more money for fertilizer, farm improvements, and other measures that promote larger output per man-hour of labor.

All this requires money. With incomes favorable, farmers haven't hesitated to borrow to

supply their needs. Many have found it necessary to increase their short-term debt. The total short-term debt for the country as a whole has increased until it is now higher than the farm mortgage debt.

There are signs, however, that the upward trend has been halted. Economists point out that short-term debts did not increase as much as in recent years and suggest that farmers may be tightening their debt belts.

This may be a wise move. The outlook points to a lower farm income, in general, than in recent years, and many farmers and ranchers are more careful in assuming the risks of debt. The well-equipped condition of many farms, also, is making the use of short-term credit less necessary in some instances.

Perhaps it doesn't pay to get too nervous about the present slide in farm prices. We can hope that most of the shake-down has already taken place. But a big debt load is dangerous. If you already have it, then refinancing on a long term basis may be in order, depending upon your present situation.

But keep your debt burden light.

Shivers' success still mystifies Texans who have seen him almost completely ignore the tried-and-true techniques of vote-getting in Texas, Perry writes in an article entitled "He's Got Texas in the Palm of His Hand."

"Despite his hesitancy to buddy-up to the man in the street or the furrow, he has become the top dog on the Texas political scene and an enigma with highly provocative potentialities on the national scene," the author finds.

"Not only has he won his own political wars by wide margins and become the titular head of the Democratic Party in Texas, but he was, as of November 4, 1952, the de facto head of the Texas Republicans as well," Perry continues. "Beyond question, it was he, more than any other person, who delivered Texas's twenty-four highly skittish electoral votes to the Eisenhower-Nixon ticket."

What matter of man can it be who rides the obliging Democratic donkey as he airily packs the elephant's trunk with Texas goobers? Perry says this question becomes one of national interest, for soon Shivers will have graduated from the highest of purely Texas political jobs, when he completes his present term of governor, having served in that office longer than any other man in Texas history.

"As politics is his profession, and one he has mastered cum laude, it's not likely that he'll want to confine himself to local affairs in the future," Perry says.

It is reported that such neighboring nabobs as Governor Robert F. Kennon, of Louisiana, are already touting Shivers as the next President of the United States. And Perry points out that Shivers has never yet met his match at the polls.
