U. S. Air Force Seeking Lightweight Jet Fighter

Jet Aces Declare MIGs Outmaneuver U. S. Craft

Special to Central Press

WASHINGTON-The Air Force, which has been frequently criticized lately because United States jet fighters are too heavy, is working overtime on the development of a lightweight craft. It has already begun serious consultations with a major airplane manufacturer in the hopes of turning out a plane that will match the MIG-15

Criticism has been hurled at both the Air Force and at American aircraft makers for overloading speedy jets with oo many unnecessary pieces of equipment, which add to their weight and rob them of much of their naneuverability.

Jet aces back from Korea have consistently re ported that the Russian-built MIG climbs faster, urns more quickly and in general can get around with less effort than do Saberjets and Thunderjets. The aces say the MIG has these advantages because it is a "stripped down" plane without such merican "luxuries" as two separate landing-gear ystems, self-sealing fuel tanks and many other so-called "safety" features. Besides, say the pilots, the self-sealing fuel tanks turn out to be useless if

A NEW LOOK AT THE DROUTH

The Southwest-and Texas in particular-is still locked in the searing hot grip of drouth.

No one is more conscious of this fact, nor feels its effect more than our state farmers and ranchers. Every day, untold thousands more dollars in crop and beef production are paid in tribute to the merciless sun.

The drouth made its appearance over three years ago. Record high temperatures in June ushered in the threat much earlier than last year. What will be its effect on yields and dollar gains in 1953?

Although it is too early to accurately predict actual money losses, a look at the cotton and cattle situation gives an advance picture as to what we

Judging from conditions of late June, Texas farmers will be fortunate if their 1953 cotton production equals last year's 3,808,000 bales. And last year was far from being normal since the state is capable of raising nearly 6 million bales.

Without immediate additional moisture in our cotton areas, we may expect the present production outlook of some 3,800,-000 bales to fall off even more before the official U.S.D.A.

#### Parents Should Apply For School District Transfers

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
