County Committee Approves 200 Applications For Drouth Feed

Two hundred applications for feed under the USDA drouth disaster feed program were received by the local PMA Office the early part of this week, according to announcement by A. C. Henderson, manager.

In making the announcement Henderson stated that in addition to those turned in, a number of applications were probably on file at the various places where the blanks are available, to be reviewed by the committee.

The 200 applications that are in the hands of the PMA office have been approved by the county committee and feed has been ordered to cover them. Feed ordered to date is as follows: 50 tons cotton seed meal; 150 tons pellets and 25 tons corn. No oats or wheat have been ordered to date. All orders for feed must be on carload basis.

Of the applications received by the committee only two have been turned down according to the announcement. One application was for hog feed and the other specified a certain type of feed.

Latest information from the state office is that feed for hogs and poultry is not covered in the program as set up.

"Best Ball Game In 20 Years" -- Red Sox Defeat Comfort 5 To 4

Old Settlers say that the "Best Ball Game in Twenty Years" was unreeled in Goldthwaite Saturday night as Goldthwaite Red Sox beat Comfort 5-4. It was a pitchers' battle all the way, with both pitchers going the entire route.

Burton, lefthander, for Comfort, struck out 13 Red Sox hitters while giving up eight hits and five runs. He also batted in one run and scored two runs himself. One of his hits being a home run and one of the hardest hit balls in Red Sox Park this year.

New Type Hospitalization Policy Being Offered Mills County Residents

A new type hospitalization policy, paying up to \$3,385.00 in hospital and accident benefits, available in the Goldthwaite area for the first time this week, according to Mrs. Hulon Fletcher, Mills County Agent Mutual Benefit Health and Accident Association.

This new hospital protection policy includes payment of up to \$2,000.00 for hospital room, and up to \$100.00 per day for any member of the family. Other benefits covered by the policy pay up to \$300.00 for operations by the policyholder's own surgeon, and coverages of dislocations or fractures. Accident benefits of up to \$1,000.00 are paid for accidental death, or accidental loss of both hands, or feet, or legs, or eyes or one eye and one foot, according to announcement by the company appearing on another page of this issue.

Accident benefits paying up to \$3,385.00 have been added. This has not been previously available. Special features cover age groups from 3 months to 75 years; no reduction in benefits on account of age, as is the case in policies of similar nature; and both individuals and family groups are eligible.

Mrs. Fletcher points out that the policyholder may select his own private hospital anywhere in the U. S., Canada, Alaska, Hawaii or Mexico, and that the Mutual of Omaha identification card usually gains immediate admittance to any of these hospitals for the policyholder.

A well-qualified health and accident underwriter, and businesswoman, Mrs. Fletcher formerly taught school at Bend, Texas. For the past three years she has been also associated with Mrs. Kate Page in the operation of the Goldthwaite Inn.

While discussing the new hospital protection plan Mrs. Fletcher stated that more than \$6,000.00 in cash benefits have been paid to policyholders and their beneficiaries within this area since 1948.

Civil Rights May Prove Headache for GOP, Too See No Hope for Major Legislation This Session

WASHINGTON—Civil rights, which bedeviled the Democrats when they were in power, threaten to do the same to the Republicans.

Which means that the die will be cast next year when the crucial 1954 congressional elections are held. The Democrats, of course, will leave no stone unturned in the search for issues and civil rights may be one of them.

Civil rights advocates look to the GOP to make good on its campaign promises. So far the Republican record in this regard is more dismal than that of the Truman administration.

The issue is a tremendously important one as concerns GOP hopes for retention of power. Many Democrats are fully aware that they have an opportunity to recapture votes of Negroes and other minorities which swung behind President Eisenhower in 1952 and may swing back again.

LEAD TIME—The President's recent statement that his administration will try to cut down "lead time" in armaments production has brought joy to the armed services but pain to manufacturers.

LEAD TIME—The interval needed from the inception of an idea for a weapon to actual production of the item. It involves the basic manufacturer, his suppliers, and his sub-contractors.

GERMAN MISSILES—If plans now afoot materialize, the Germans soon may be back in the business of making guided missiles—an enterprise they so grimly pioneered during World War II.

REDS IN THE WEST—American officials are deeply concerned over the inroads Communism is making in the Western Hemisphere while the United States is busy fighting the Reds in Europe and Asia.

The danger in all this lies in the fact that the three Latin American countries lie only short flight-distances away from the Panama canal.
