



Civil Rights May Prove Headache for GOP, Too

See No Hope for Major Legislation This Session

Special to Central Press WASHINGTON-Civil rights, which bedevilled the Democrats when they were in power, threaten to do the same to the



Which means that the die will be cast next year when the crucial 1954 congressional elections are held. The Democrats, of course, will leave no stone unturned in the search for issues and civil rights may be one of them. Civil rights advocates look to the GOP to make

good on its campaign promises. So far the Republican record in this regard is more dismal than that of the Truman administration.

The issue is a tremendously important one as oncerns GOP hopes for retention of power. Many Democrats are fully aware that they have an opportunity to recapture votes of Negroes and other minorities which swung behind President Eisenhower in 1952 and may swing back again.

· "LEAD TIME"-The President's recent statement that his administration will try to cut down "lead time" in armaments production has brought joy to the armed services but pain to manufacturers.

"Lead time" is the interval needed from the inception of an idea for a weapon to actual production of the item. It involves the basic manufacturer, his suppliers, and his sub-contractors.

It is a headache, because the manufacturer of military materiel, unlike the producer of such civilian items as automobiles, must work against a deadline and not pursue a process of gradual change.

The "lead time" for a new-type aircraft now runs from five to seven years. There's a four-year period between the drawing board and the first flight, and another couple of years before full production

If the administration can reduce the interval, billions of dollars will be saved by the military, but producers will be under terrific pressures. . GERMAN MISSILES-If plans now afoot materialize, the Germans

soon may be back in the business of making guided missiles-an

enterprise they so grimly pioneered during World War II. Under European defense arrangements, the United States expects to back several West German firms in production of such devices for

the free world's weapons stockpile. Defense department experts point out that the Germans have extraordinary know-how in the development and manufacture of the modern-day successors to the dreaded "buzz bembs" of 1944 and 1945.

If and when it comes about, the German guided-missile production

will, of course, be subjected to rigid safeguards approved not only by the United States, but by France and Britain. Assignment of such a mission to West Germany would free several
