



#### MONEY MAKER FOR GOVERNMENT

By anybody's yardstick, General Motors is big business with a capital B. Its 1952 sales amounted to \$7,549,154,419. The story of what happened to this money gives a cross section view of America's social and economic life. It demonstrates the malicious in-accuracy of the common charge that big business is necessarily bad.

In the first place, the company provided jobs for 458,680 workers to whom it paid \$2,020,536,713 in salaries and wages. Government took a huge chunk of GM income - a total of \$1,107,000,000 in taxes, which was over half the amount paid to employees.

Thousands of large and small companies supplying materials of all kinds received 48 1-2 cents of each GM dollar. With 487,624 stockholder-owners General Motors is in the truest sense a publicly owned enterprise. In return for the use of their savings, which made the business possible, these stockholders received 4 3-4 cents of each income dollar, or a total of \$361,969,352; one third of the government's tax profit.

It would be a sad day for the American people and the United States treasury if such companies as this were ever forced from the roles of free competitive enterprise.

But the significance of the shift still remains a mystery. Most educated guessing centers around the belief that the move has some connection with the spreading revolt against Communism in the

Some sources go so far as to speculate any new Soviet envoys will bring to their posts a changed diplomatic "line" designed to ease East-West ten-

sions, liberalize life in the iron curtain countries and slow down mounting free world pressures against Communismall moves to quell anti-Communist riots that have made headlines.

• GIANT "WHIRLYBIRD"-The civil aviation world is waiting expectantly for the flight of the first commercially feasible passenger helicopter, expected to hop into the air at the Piasecki factory in the fall

The giant 41-passenger "whirlybird" is being readied now for its first flight tests. Late this summer it will undergo static ground tests.

Designed the XH-16 for the Air Force, for whom it will be produced, the rotary-winged craft is equal in size to a DC-4 and is expected to be used primarily as a troop carrier.

However, civil aviation experts predict that when it comes up for civilian use it will find a great market in replacing regular airplanes on flights of less than 300 miles. Such a craft could cut actual flying times between comparatively close metropolitan areas by at least one-third.

• FOOD WEAPON-It may prove futile, but the administration intends to plump hard for President Eisenhower's request that he be given sweeping authority to send surplus food overseas when famine threatens.

The humanitarian aspects of the request are obvious. The administration will stress the political factors involved.

The idea is more cold war strategy than anything else. Mr. Eisenhower would like to have a free hand in rushing food wherever necessary, not only to feed hungry people but to keep them from turning Communist.
