Oxford, N. Y., Review Times: "The public will get tax reduction if it is willing to forego extravagance in city, county, state and national affairs."







Time in Autumn?

By Nixon May Coincide

ASHINGTON-The nation's "Big Two"-President Eisenhower and Vice President Richard M. Nixon-may both be out of the country at the same time this autumn, breaking an informal arrangement against just such an occurrence.

Nizzez will be on his good-will tour of the Far East and Southeast Asia in October and November, and Mr. Eisenhower may be off attenting the Big Three conference during that period.



When and where the Big Three parley is held depends, of course, on the physical condition of British Prime Minister Sir Winston Churchill. It is very possible that Churchill will not be ready to confer with the President and the premier of France until October or November.

> Should both the chief executive and the vice president be absent from the United States at the same time, the reins of government would be in the hands of Secretary of State John Foster Dulles. However, communications being as speedy as they are these days, it will not be difficult for

Secretary Dulles

Slowness of communications in the old days resulted in an informal arrangement under which either the President or the vice president would

be in the country at any one time. Presidents Roosevelt and Truman continued operating under this procedure, but now, President Eisenhower may cast tradition aside. .

• RESHUFFLE-Look for a brisk reshuffle at Democratic national headquarters, in preparation for the party's all-out drive to recapture comitrol of Congress next year.

Washington insiders expect Michael Di Salle, former price boss and popular ex-mayor of Toledo, O., to become Democratic national chairman, replacing the amiable but non-dynamic Stephen Mitchell.

Politicos believe that Di Salle will bring with him a headquarters crew chosen with the advice of ex-President Harry S. Truman, whose recent visit to Washington was primarily for the purpose of plotting 1954 campaign strategy.

The party's titular head, Adlai E. Stevenson, is said to have sent word that Di Salle is perfectly acceptable to him as national chairman.

The Democrats' first big barrage of the year will be fired at a gigantic rally in Chicago this September. Di Salle's selection for the chairmanship may be announced then.

Stevenson and all other possibilities for the 1956 presidential nomination will address the Chicago parley. They include Senators Stuart Symington of Missouri, Estes Kefauver of Tennessee and Richard Russell of Georgia, and former Mutual Security Administrator W. Averell Harriman.

• NEW CHIEFS Despite President Eisenhower's success in fighting off attacks on his \$5 billion Air Force budget cut, airmen still believe they may get a larger share of the defense dollar.

They are pinning their hopes on a re-survey of the nation's military needs which Mr. Eisenhower has ordered his new Joint Chiefs of Staff to make.

The re-survey could very conceivably result in a decision that the Air Force after all does need more momey It will then be a relatively simple matter for funds appropriated by Congress to be shuffled from service to another.
