One of the local school district's greatest problems has been met in the selection and acceptance of a board of equalization. The board consists of Luther Jernigan, W. W. Fox and P. R. Reid. Members of the board have assured the school trustees that values will be equalized without fear or favor to any person.

The board of equalization and our local school board met in joint session last Saturday night and aired the problem facing the district in detail and they feel that the budget for the 1953-54 school year has been set up, read and accepted, and that sufficient money is provided within the budget as it stands. The problem facing the district is not more money but a wiser distribution of the money to be paid by the taxpayers of property within the district.

Superintendent Jones said: "The taxes provided on the present rate of \$1.50 is sufficient to operate the school and retire the outstanding vouchers and other indebtedness, and also maintain our present building in a state of good repair, but we must have legal leeway to retire our bonded indebtedness."

The equalization board started work on Tuesday morning and hopes to have the task completed within 30 days. It is hoped that no taxpayer will jump at conclusions that their taxes will be excessive at the hands of this board.

Mills County's First Bale Of 1953 Cotton Is Ginned Wednesday

Credit for producing the first bale of cotton in Mills County for 1953 season goes to Alfred Limmer of Priddy. He brought the first bale to the Priddy Gin, owned and operated by W. R. "Bill" Shipp, Wednesday morning, August 26.

Hollis Blackwell of this city purchased the first bale, paying the producer 23 cents per pound for the 532 pound bale. Shipp ginned and wrapped the first bale free for the producer.

Goldthwaite Cafe Is Destroyed By Fire Tuesday At Midnight

Goldthwaite Cafe was destroyed by fire which started in the kitchen about midnight Tuesday of this week. Cecil Bradley, owner of the establishment, was working on a stove in the kitchen, making repairs at the time the fire broke out.

The fire alarm was turned in by Mr. Bradley and firemen were on the scene in short order and kept the fire from spreading to other buildings, but apparently the cafe and Juanita's Watch Repair Shop, which was housed in the same building, were a total loss. Bradley stated that he turned in the alarm in less than a minute after he discovered fire and in a matter of two or three minutes it seemed that the whole building was ablaze. From early reports only contents in safe were saved.

Wednesday afternoon insurance adjusters were on the scene making their surveys, and

at that time Mr. Bradley's plans for the cafe were uncertain. He stated: "I don't know what I'm going to do, at this time." Amount of loss to the business was undetermined at the time of this writing.

J. C. Faulkner, owner of the building, stated that loss on the building is approximately \$5,000.00. He plans to rebuild just as soon as the premises can be cleaned up and work can get underway. The building was covered by insurance.

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GOVERNMENT SHOULD NOT SUPPORT THE PEOPLE

The lesson should be constantly enforced that, though the people support the government, the government should not support the people.

Does that sound like something that was said yesterday? Actually, it was said by President Grover Cleveland 76 years ago, in the course of vetoing a long-forgotten bill.

The principle which President Cleveland laid down was important then. It is a thousand times more important now. In the intervening years millions of us, knowingly or otherwise, have been infected with the virus of government paternalism.

Abilene, Kansas, Daily Reflector-Chronicle: "Perhaps the best example of a handicapped person rising to great heights is Helen Keller, one of America's greatest ladies. Her recent trip to Latin America may have won more good will for her country than all of our diplomatic missions. She is the sort of person to whom the people in the countries she visits can open their hearts."

Coatesville, Pennsylvania, Record: "The million non-operating rail workers of 15 unions, who have served new demands on 311 U. S. railroads, say they don't want more wages... The 'fringe' benefits they are now demanding include longer vacations, paid health and welfare programs, increased overtime rates for Sundays and holidays, and more liberal free transportation allowance. This may not be money to a railroad worker — but it would be to your scribe."

Your Letters to Congressman Receive Personal Attention
Most Solons Pay Close Heed To "Way Mail Is Running"

WASHINGTON—Do letters to members of Congress ever get read? This question is asked frequently, and the answer is yes, all letters do get personal attention, although not always by the senator or representative to whom they are addressed.

A lawmaker may get one or two sacks of mail on a highly controversial issue. In this case, staff aides will read all the letters, analyze them and give a report to the boss. The more pertinent letters or those with a fresh catch-phrase that may prove helpful in debate will be called to the lawmaker's personal attention.

Congressmen are little impressed with form letters on any issue. These are likely to come from pressure groups whose views are well known. What counts is a personally-penned letter, or even a typewritten one which is clearly the sole work of the author.

Most congressmen consider "the way the mail is running" before making up their minds on how to vote on a disputed issue.

Senate Democratic leader Lyndon Johnson of Texas receives an average of 400 letters a day. He says they "do much to keep me in touch with the men and women I represent and serve as a guide in helping me chart my course."

Most lawmakers agree with Johnson when he says: "I am glad to get all those letters."

HAPPY HOMECOMING—The end of the fighting in Korea put Senate and House members in a happy frame of mind for the congressional recess.

None of the lawmakers is expected to be brash enough to claim any personal credit for achievement of the truce but it will enable them to point with pride rather than view with alarm.

Farm bloc congressman probably face the roughest fence-mending task of all. Declining farm incomes, the drought and the uncertainty about the Eisenhower administration's price support program means midwestern congressmen from rural areas will be confronted by a number of acute questions.

House members from areas where there are large foreign-born populations were given some last minute ammunition with congressional enactment of a bill permitting the entry of over 200,000 iron curtain refugees.

Big city congressmen face their toughest task in the fact that government rent controls in many areas are expiring and the cost of living has continued at record high levels.

All in all, the nation's legislators, who are frequently politicians as well, may be glad to return to Washington next January where they can become statesmen rather than a guy who runs for office in 1954.

Three Salads Starring Melon

By ALICE DENHOFF

FINE fresh fruits and vegetables are now gracing our markets. So make use of this bounty, serving fresh fruits and vegetables at every meal.

Melons as is are marvelous, but how about preparing delightful dishes that use melon as a major ingredient, a Melon-Tomato Aspic, for instance?

Melon-Tomato Aspic

To serve 6 with a salad that works out to about 101 calories per serving, exclusive of dressing, combine 3 c. stewed fresh ripe tomatoes, ¼ tsp. salt, tsp. grated lemon rind, 2 tsp. grated onion, stalk celery, coarsely chopped, and one bay leaf. Simmer 25 minutes. Strain. Soften 2 envelopes unflavored gelatin in ½ c. cold water. Stir into hot mixture. Measure and add enough water to make 3 c. Cool until mixture begins to thicken.

Form a 3-oz. pkg. cream cheese into small balls. Fold cheese balls, one c. melon cubes or balls, ¼ c. each shredded green pepper and chopped celery into gelatin mixture. Turn into 1½-qt. mold that has been rinsed in cold water. Chill until firm. Serve garnished with lettuce and water cress.

Next, a delightful and different salad that has about 88 calories per serving, the recipe for 6.

Wash and separate one head iceberg lettuce, breaking into bite-sized pieces. Crisp in refrigerator. Peel and seed one medium-sized cantaloupe. Cut into small wedges. Peel and cut 3 fresh, ripe tomatoes into eighths. Place in salad bowl with lettuce and ¼ c. finely sliced green pepper. Pour on ½ c. French dressing; toss. Should be served at once.

Here's a pleasing variation on the chicken salad theme, the recipe to serve 6, each serving having about 146 calories per serving.

Chicken Salad

Combine 1½ c. diced cooked chicken, ½ c. chopped celery, 2 tbs. chopped pimiento, tbs. minced onion, ½ tsp. salt, ½ tsp. black pepper and ½ c. mayonnaise. Chill.

Cut one small cantaloupe in half, peel and seed, then slice into crescents one inch wide.

Place iceberg lettuce on salad plates. Arrange cantaloupe crescents petal-fashion on lettuce. Sprinkle with juice of one lemon. Place mound of chicken salad in center of each plate. Top with additional mayonnaise.

SAVING GRAIN THROUGH RAT CONTROL

There are some rats and mice on nearly every farm. A few rats may not do much apparent damage in a short period of time, but the pests multiply rapidly in favorable quarters and destroy millions of bushels of grain and feed in the U. S. annually.

Just a few rats in your grain bins may be enough to prevent you from selling products for human consumption under Federal Food and Drug regulations. In addition, these pests are the source of several diseases that are deadly to humans, pets, livestock and poultry. Rats and mice on your property means money out of your pocket.

Permanent control is a five-fold job. Here are the basic rules:

1. Don't give them shelter. Rodents are difficult to get rid of if they have places to hide. Piles of rubbish, stacks of old lumber or other material and wooden floors close to the ground are favorite hiding places. Many farms have several such "rat hotels" near granaries or other food and feed supplies. All such shelters

should be cleaned up or removed.

2. Don't feed them. A hungry rodent is easily poisoned or trapped. Food and feeds should be stored properly, and scraps and garbage kept in rat-proof containers. Granaries, corn cribs, feed rooms and storage cellars should also be rat-proof.

3. Kill them! Rats and mice that are hungry and lack shelter are easily killed by poisoning, fumigating or trapping. All of these methods may be employed individually or in combination on most rodent control jobs. But a word of caution—poisons should be handled with great care, keeping them away from children, livestock and pets.

4. Organize community rat-control projects. Community action is the most effective way to fight rats. Controlling rats on one farm in a community is usually only temporary. More may come in from surround-

ings where control is not practiced. Campaigns should include not only farms but dumps, feed mills and other rat food sources.

5. Follow a year-round program. Rats never take vacations. They may raise four or more litters a year averaging from 6 to 10 in a litter. The presence of one pair of rats on a farm in the spring can mean 50 rats by fall.

Rat control must be a continuous job. But it will pay long-range dividends to the farmer and the community.

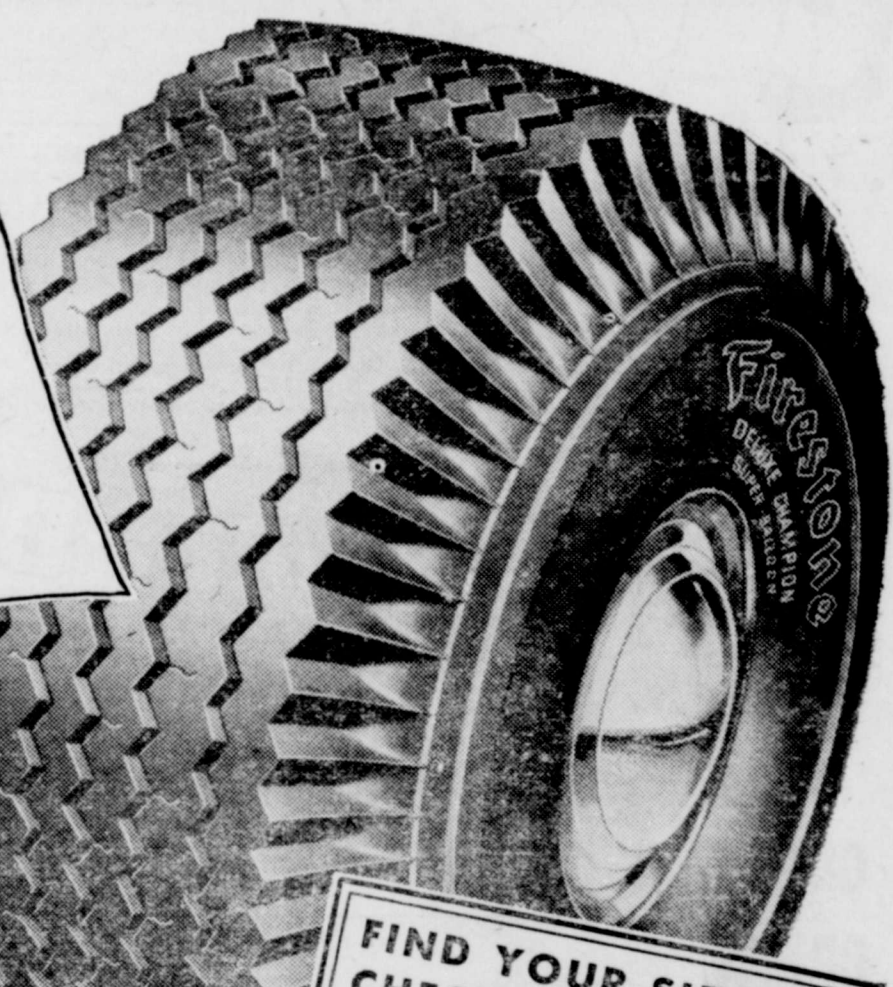

News About Social Security

"Many older household workers are now eligible for monthly old-age benefit payments under social security," James B. Marley, manager of the Austin social security office stated today.

These people are regular domestic workers now 65 or over who have been employed in one private household on an average of at least two days a week during the past two years.

If, due to health or other reasons, they are forced to give up regular employment, they can now file a claim for social security insurance and get monthly old-age benefit payments based on their earnings during the past two years. These earnings must have been at least \$50 cash in each calendar quarter of their period of employment in one household.

Many other regular household workers, not yet 65, have built survivors protection during the same time and their dependent families are eligible for monthly benefit payments in case of the death of the insured worker.

Old-age and survivors insurance benefits are based on the worker's earnings. "This is why it is so important to the domestic worker to have her employer report all of her cash wages for social security purposes," Marley declares. He says that the regular household employee can cooperate with her employer by showing her social security card. The employer needs to know the number on the worker's social security card. She copies this number on the reports she sends in on the worker's cash wages.

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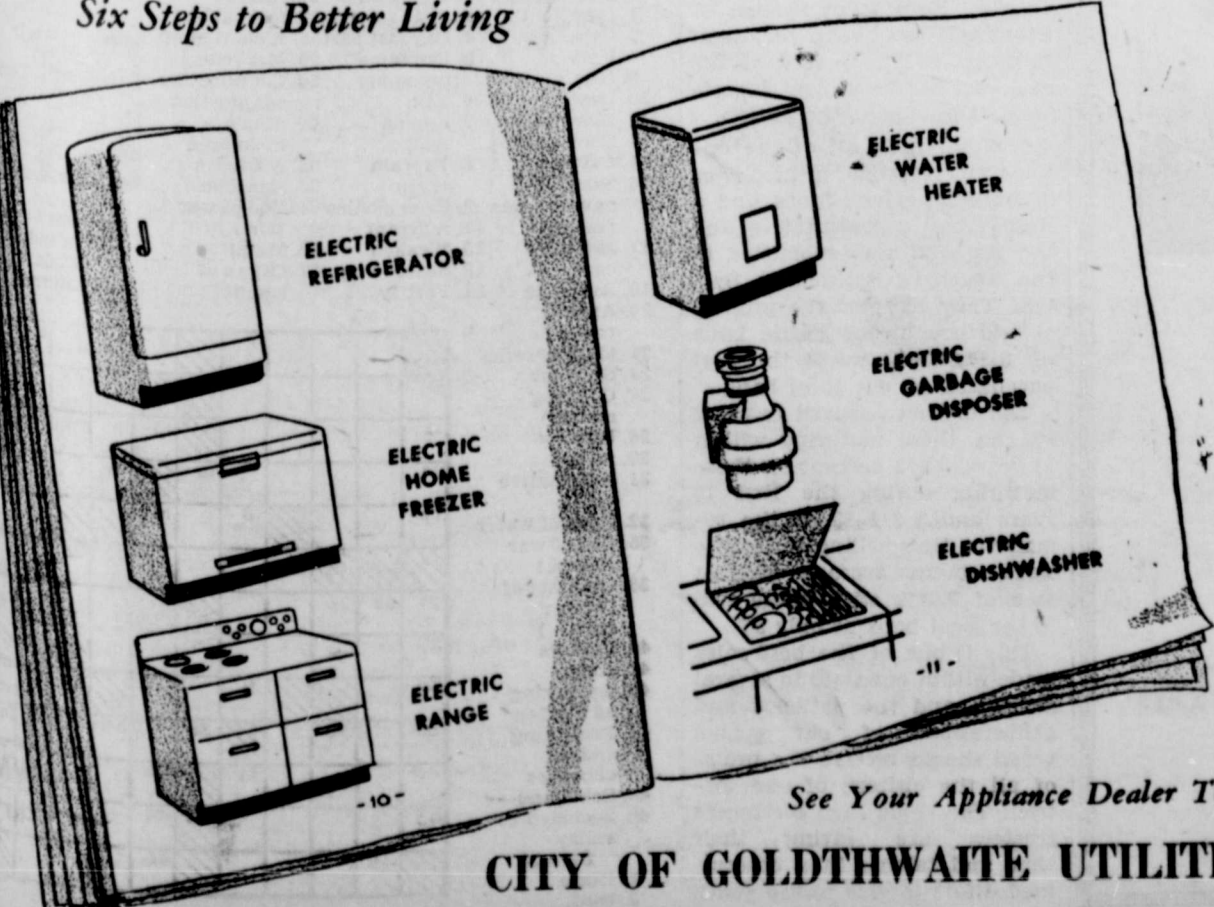

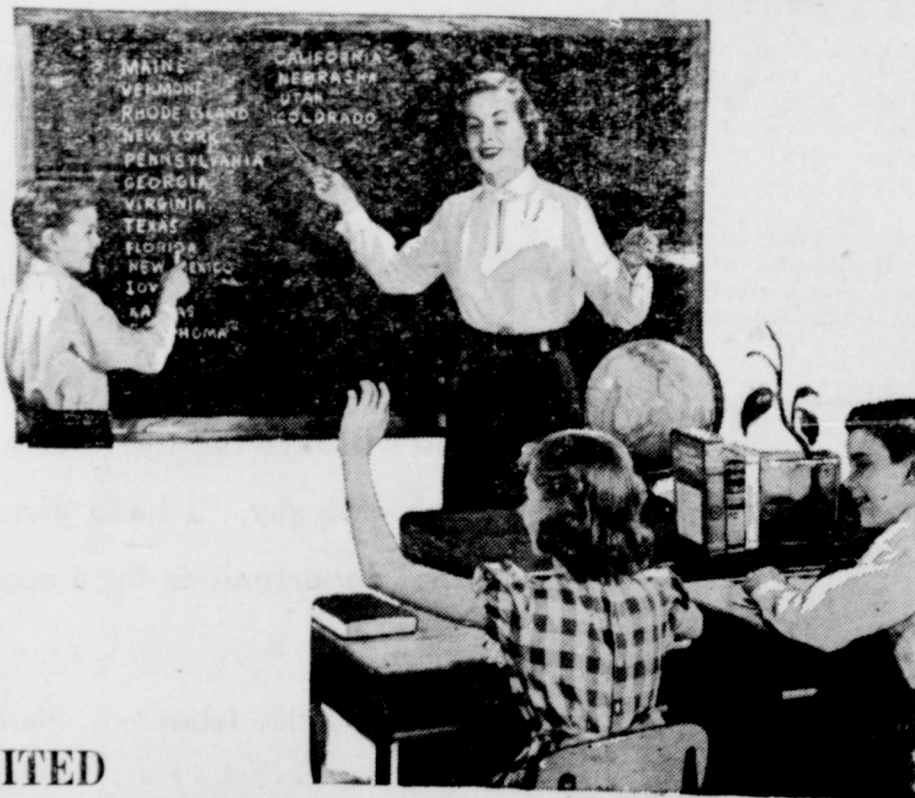

School District Officials Announce Sale Of Entire Building Bond Issue

The school board of Goldthwaite Independent School District has been faced with proposition of finding a buyer for the bond issue voted on June 6 of this year. After the issue was voted, Henry-Seay Investment Company of Dallas was selected to handle proceedings on the issue. The transcript was recently completed and bids called for.

Nine investment companies were sent information sheets but felt that our offer to the Teacher Retirement System of Texas was too cheap for them to compete with in view of the changed condition on investments throughout the nation. The bid with all of the options was rejected on the advice of Superintendent Jones and a Henry-Seay representative and the proposal was submitted to the Teachers Retirement System. They accepted the proposal and bought the entire issue of \$190,000.00, except the part purchased by our local bank.

The district received rates of 3% on those maturing within 14 years, 3 1/2 percent on those maturing during the first 19 years and 3 3/4 % on the remainder, thus selling the entire issue at an average interest rate of 3.67% with those sold to the local bank at only 3%.

This is one of the best sales made within our state in several months and the patience and deliberations of our school board should receive the praise of all the citizens of our district. The seven men serving as trustees are giving their time and talents in a determined effort to give to the youth

of our district the best school possible.

The bid of investment companies on this bond issue resulted in a return to the investor of more than 4%. The sale resulted in several hundred dollars saving on interest alone. All the bonds are callable after fifteen years.
