School Board Makes Explanation Of Work Of Equalization Board

The school board of Goldthwaite Independent School District are all taxpaying citizens of the district and are interested in giving the most for the money spent that is possible. In taking the oath of office, every trustee swears that he will do the best possible to fulfill the duties of the office and to always feel the obligation of providing good and sound education to the students of the district. It is upon this basis that the point of law that requires a board of equalization to sit annually and equalize the taxes of the many tax payers of the district.

Raising valuations is entirely within the hands of the board of trustees through a board of equalization, BUT they preferred to have the citizens themselves vote such a change, thus an election was called in which a majority of people voted favoring the raising of the rate from \$1.00 to \$1.50, the legal limit.

On a valuation which has been for several years \$2,800,000.00 in round numbers, the rate of \$1.50 would give us \$42,000.00 with which we can operate our school. This is sufficient and all that is needed. The thing that is needed now is power to place about \$16,000.00 annually in interest and sinking fund. We have a constitutional limit of \$0.50 on the hundred dollar valuation that can be used to retire bonds and interest. Our overall bonded indebtedness now stands at about \$280,000.00 and requires a greater valuation for raising the required \$16,000.00. Before the Attorney General of the State of Texas will approve the sale of our bonds we must show that we have sufficient value to retire the bonds.

With both personal and real values considered, 90% collection will be an average on current taxes. Now to raise the required \$16,000.00 we would figure thus: 90% of \$5.00 is \$4.50—this figure divided into \$16,000.00 will give you \$3,555,556.00 required valuation. If the value is raised the required 27% then the rate can be lowered by 27% thus giving a rate of \$1.23 instead of \$1.50 and causing the taxpayer to pay the same amount of taxes he would have otherwise paid.

the public to be considerate of the members of the equalization board and not be critical of things done in keeping with the law. To those who think that the school board should have employed outside experts to have this job done, it is pointed out that present means will mean a saving in expenses that is sorely needed for repairs to present structures at this time.

The three men are only doing what is required by law. The school board is only performing a lawful function. Any person who has been paying their proportion share of taxes will not be raised above what they would pay under the \$1.50 rate. Yes, everybody will pay more than you did under the \$1.00 rate but the voting public voted to do that.

"We are doing our best to do what is right," declared a resolution of the school board.

Council Authorizes Appointment Of Local Housing Authority Commission

Goldthwaite City Council in regular September meeting Tuesday night authorized appointment of a local Housing Authority Commission, heard a district State Highway engineer explain the need for parallel parking on Fisher Street, which is a state highway, authorized committees to look into the cost and feasibility of having a city-wide paving and water drainage survey made by a qualified engineer, requested the street committee to determine costs of a grader and dump truck to be used on city streets, and transacted other important business.

Mayor Charlie T. Wilson read two Housing Authority resolutions creating a local Housing Authority Commission, which will soon apply for a 20-unit Federal Housing project to be built in Goldthwaite. This Commission, to comprise five members, will be appointed this week, and application will be made as soon as possible to the Federal Housing Authority for permission to construct housing to take care of twenty low-income families in Goldthwaite. Preference will be given veterans, service men and families of deceased veterans and service men. The Housing Authority resolutions were passed un-

animously by members of the City Council. Possible cost of building the 20-unit project is estimated to range from 150 to 180 thousand dollars.

Robert J. Milligan, District State Highway Engineer of Brownwood, and Walter Summy, Resident Engineer, were present and showed the Council a sketch of a contemplated street intersection stop-light system for Fisher Street. The State Highway Department will install, maintain and operate a flasher light at Fifth and Fisher and a new electrically-operated stop light on the bank corner at Fourth and Fisher. The new light, if the people want it, will speed up through traffic, staying on continuously for north and south traffic until a car going east and west breaks a circuit, which will give it the green light to go, and in turn stop north and south traffic. Pedestrians will push a button to stop cars so they can walk across. Mayor Wilson suggested that a meeting of the business men of the town be called soon to decide on the system, which will include parallel parking on Fisher Street, at which time Mr. Milligan will again explain the plan.

Alderman Leroy Stacy reported that 12 new lights had been ordered to be placed on Fisher Street, the lights now there to be moved to the Municipal Park.

The Street Committee, Alderman Jesse Moreland and Houston Duren, were authorized to investigate costs of a dump truck and grader, to be used on city streets, and report back to Council. Also to look into cost of hiring a qualified engineer to make a city-wide survey of all streets and draw up a city-wide paving and drainage plan.

Council ordered the streets to be sprayed again to kill out the remaining flies and mosquitoes.

Utilities Manager W. C. Barnett reported final figures of the short but very successful season of operation of the new municipal swimming pool. An operating profit of \$1,114.55 was realized, which is enough to retire first year's bonds.

Council Utility Committee members Carl Letbetter and Leroy Stacy were authorized to look into feasibility of buying a new pick-up truck, or to have the two now in use overhauled.

Councilmen present at the meeting were J. D. Harper, Jesse Moreland, Houston Duren, and Leroy Stacy. Alderman Carl Letbetter was out of the city.

Faulkner To Make Building Repairs

The building which has housed the Goldthwaite Cafe for a number of years and was recently damaged by fire will get a face lifting with general repairs. It was announced this week by J. C. Faulkner, owner.

He stated that work is to get underway right away in making repairs which will include a new modern front, new concrete floor and lowering of the ceiling.

Nothing has been announced as to who will occupy the building when completed.

School District To Purchase Gartman Property

Goldthwaite Independent School District has entered into contract for the purchase of the L. J. Gartman property, consisting of 75.5 acres, at the Northwest edge of the city, according to announcement made Tuesday afternoon by school officials.

The property is located north of the present school site having the Berry and Campbell properties between the two locations.

The next matter to come up for discussion by the school board is to select an architect and go into actual planning for construction of the new building.

Rev. J. T. Ayers Goes To Gatesville

Rev. J. T. Ayers, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Goldthwaite for the past three years, has accepted a call from the First Baptist Church of Gatesville.

He made the announcement to his congregation at the close of the evening service last Sunday. Next Sunday, September 13, will be his last day to fill the pulpit as pastor of the local church.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

See Hot Session When Congress Reconvenes
Ike May Recommend National Sales Tax

WASHINGTON—You can expect the second session of the 83rd Congress to be one of the most hectic in history.

There are so many things that President Eisenhower wants to do—and there is so much opposition, especially within his own party, to doing it. In fact, there may be a filibuster raging in the Senate within weeks after Congress convenes.

It will come either on the bill to make Hawaii the 49th state or, possibly, on the St. Lawrence seaway legislation. Southern senators are expected to fight—and speak—hard against Hawaii. Most of them are also against the St. Lawrence seaway, and they'll be joined by members from other areas which fear the seaway will virtually wipe out such ports as New York, Baltimore and Philadelphia.

Then, there's the President's request for extension of social security to 10 1/2 million persons not now covered. Ways and Means Committee Chairman Daniel A. Reed (R), New York, has already indicated he doesn't think much of the proposal and that he'll fight it.

Mr. Eisenhower wants Congress to postpone a reduction scheduled for next year on corporate income taxes. Reed will fight that request, too.

Then, other bones of congressional contention will include revision of the Taft-Hartley law and the McCarran-Walter immigration act. Mr. Eisenhower wants plenty done along these lines. Congressional resistance will be strong. The administration also will have a tough time of it when it asks for higher national debt limit and if it renews its request for increased postal rates.

TAXES—When Congress reassembles, President Eisenhower may propose the enactment of the first national sales tax in history. It is estimated that a general sales tax, which would be paid by consumers, would net the federal government many billions of dollars.

A sales tax is anathema, however, to many, including organized labor, who maintain it will shift to the general public some of the tax burden now borne by the higher income groups.

The administration faces a difficult problem on taxes when Congress reconvenes Jan. 6. The President has announced he will call for reductions in present excise taxes. Added to these revenue losses will be other tax cuts provided for in advance by law. The 10 per cent Korean war boost in personal income taxes dies automatically Dec. 31, as does the excess profits tax on corporations. The following April 30, corporations are scheduled to get a reduction in their income taxes.

The reduction will cost the treasury many billions, and must be made up some way if the administration is ever to balance the budget. And balancing the budget is a political "must" for the administration.

RED FACES—Security investigations of candidates for State department and other high government posts are playing hob with the "spoils" system—and embarrassing the Republican national committee.

Time was when the GOP, or the Democratic committee, could sound out several candidates for any one job and none would be the wiser. Only people involved would be the prospective appointees and their home state senators.

Now, however, a security check must be run on each Security Checks person before the candidate himself even knows he's being looked over. Meanwhile, word gets around. Prove among the person's associates, whom the FBI has embarrassing questioned, that he's in line for a government job. They don't know it that there may be five or six other candidates also under investigation for the same job.

The problem nearly got out of hand in appointing the United States delegation to the United Nations. Almost every good party worker who hadn't reaped any benefits of victory wanted to be a UN delegate. The Republican committee hopes the folk back home will understand that there's nothing necessarily suspicious about someone who was checked but didn't get the job. He's probably just another "also ran."

For the past two weeks we have carried information about the jaguar which was killed by a group of Mills County men fifty years ago. The first week we mentioned the story appearing in a magazine and last week we carried a picture of the animal with two men who took part in the hunt. There has been much discussion and comment about the affair, as there has been during the years. E. W. Brown of 5341 Michigan, Kansas City, Missouri, wrote to us the past week and sent copy of recent magazine article for our information. He stated: "There are several discrepancies in the description of this battle compared to the story told at that time. I lived in Goldthwaite at that time and was present when the Jaguar was measured, which was

6 ft., and 8 inches." There have been several reliable reports as to who actually killed the "cat" and from all indications it appears that it is quite possible that such credit goes to several who took part in the shooting.

C. D. McLean tells one that he picked up in print a few days ago which we are passing on to our readers this week. It says that Rudolph, the Red, was walking down the streets of Moscow with another Russian and his wife. The wife of the other fellow said: "Look! it's snowing, some snow flakes fell on my face." Rudolph said, "That's not snow it was rain drops fallin'." An argument started and in order to get it settled the Russian had his wife to drop the matter, by telling her, "Rudolph The Red, knows rain, dear."

About two weeks ago we reported on the weather conditions and the amount of rainfall in different sections of the county. In that report we stated that Big Valley received two inches of rain. A few days later Adrain Long told us that at his place it was still dry and that Big Valley—where he was located—was still in the territory without rainfall. It developed that the area across the river in the L. B. Burnham territory did have a good rain but it didn't reach too wide an area. At the time of this writing, however, we have received a report that the Big Valley area where Long is located has received several inches of rainfall. "The first in a long time," said Mrs. Pearl Long.

From Houston comes a note from Mrs. M. L. Lindsey which states in part: "I am enclosing remittance for a subscription to the Eagle. Our son C. D. Lindsey is one of the players on the Eagle football squad and we want to keep in close touch with each game the boys play this season. 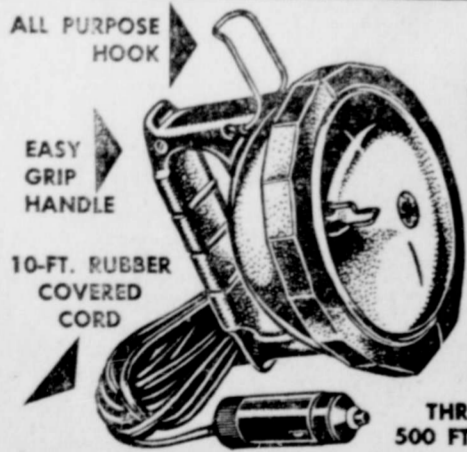

Released by The Texas Department of Agriculture

SAVING THE TAXPAYER'S DOLLARS

The first step towards putting the Texas Department of Agriculture on a self-supporting basis became effective this month.

Through a process of collecting fees for services rendered, the department is financing many of its operations which formerly had to depend upon allotments from the state general revenue fund.

Foremost of these fees are those collected for the inspection of nurseries, and warehouses and the nominal charges made for the examination of seeds offered for sale. The nursery and warehouse fee programs have been in operation for several years but the seed testing charge is new.

At the beginning of this fiscal year, September 1, a bill passed by the Legislature allowed the department to keep most of this service money for its own operating expense. In previous years, most of it was turned over to the general revenue fund and departmental money had to come from tax grants. Under the new program, people actually benefited by agricultural programs will bear most of the expense instead of the average taxpayer.

Such a system allowed the Commissioner of Agriculture this year to request a minimum of money from general revenue. This action breaks with the usual custom of state officers requesting a surplus of funds in hopes of obtaining an adequate amount after legislative cutbacks. Although the request for the next two years was only a few hundred dollars lower than formerly, it means the Department of Agriculture is over the hump in maximum tax money spending and subsequent requests are now expected to decrease with no loss of services to Texas farmers and ranchmen.

Since the seed testing fee is new, farmers and seedsmen are reminded they may obtain

a complete test of all seed except chaffy grasses, native grasses, mixtures and trashy seed for \$2.53. This fee can be broken down to \$1.50 for purity analysis, only, or \$1 for germination tests.

The charge for tests on the four exceptions is \$5. Trashy seed may be rejected for testing when the laboratories at Lubbock and Austin are experiencing a rush season.

Noxious weed seed is examined for \$1 per sample. These tests are required by law before offering the seed for sale in Texas.

Brown-Mills Soil Conservation News

By CHARLES HAENISCH

Farmers and ranchers in this area are urged by the Supervisors of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District to sow Madrid Sweetclover this fall. In determining the needs for Madrid Sweetclover it was found that 10,000 acres are needed this year. Plantings of Madrid Sweetclover in the past have proven that it is well adapted to this locality.

The many uses of this crop have made it popular in this area. Madrid can be used for temporary grazing, hay, seed production, and soil improving.

Cooperators of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District who have successfully grown Madrid Clover say the following rules should be observed:

- 1.) Plant four to five pounds

- of clover per acre. 2.) Sow the clover and small grain at the same time. A small seed attachment should be used. 3.) Use phosphate fertilizer as needed. A fertilizer containing nitrogen has proven profitable on land that has never been in clover. 4.) Inoculate the clover seed with the proper inoculant. 5.) Sow the grain and clover in the early fall when the soil moisture is adequate. 6.) Use a cultipacker behind the drill, if possible, to firm the soil.

Now is the time to locate your seed, fertilizer, and inoculant. Have these items on hand so when the planting time comes you will be ready.

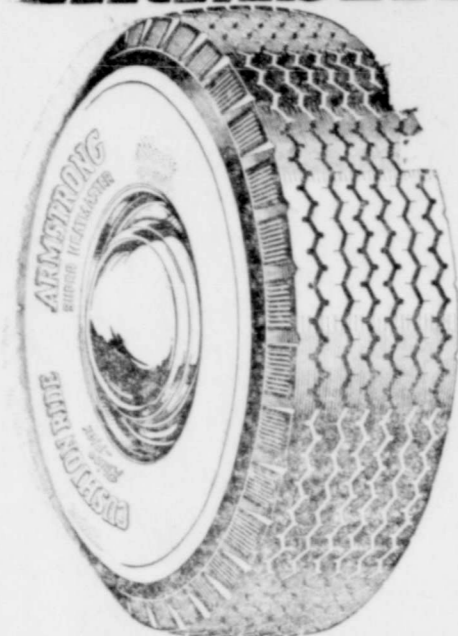

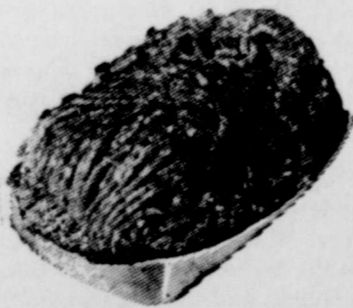
