> The suggestion came from the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission. He noted that north zone hunters who know their dove diet have been having much, better luck then those trusting to luck to cate the birds.

He said doves are very fond of weed seeds such as sunflowers and croton. They also like grain such as maize.

One handicap to the hunter since the rains came is that water is more accessible and thus the doves do not concentrate at tanks like they do in extremely dry weather.

Some hunters, who dress their own game, study contents of the birds' crops and then plan their hunting trips accordingly.






