## Post Office Will Not Move Until January 1

Goldthwaite Post Office will not get to occupy their new home until January 1, according to announcement by Lucile Fairman, postmaster.

The new building under lease to the Post Office Department, which is under construction at the corner of Fourth and Parker Streets, was scheduled to be completed by October 1st, when plans called for the office to be moved. It has developed that completion of the building has been delayed. Because of the delay arrangements have been completed whereby the post office will remain in the present location for an additional three months. This will carry their operations through holiday season without having to move during the rush of Christmas mail.

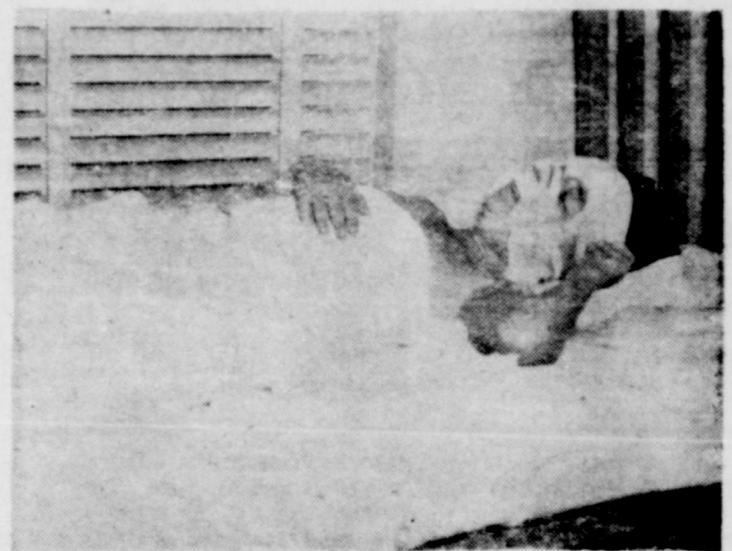

## Funeral Services For K. V. Straley, Accident Victim, Are Held Tuesday

Funeral services for K. V. Straley, 57, lifetime resident of the Goldthwaite area, were held Tuesday at 2:00 p. m., at the First Baptist Church with the Rev. Ramon Sims conducting the services. He was killed in the collision of his 1951 Dodge sedan with a 1950 Chevrolet trailer-truck from Brownwood at 12:30 noon Sunday on U. S. Highway 84-183, about six miles northwest of Mullin in Mills County.

The accident orphaned his 12-year-old son, Gary Woodson Straley, who received treatment in Medical Arts Hospital from multiple lacerations and bruises.

Driver of the truck was Billy Eugene Barron, 17, of Brownwood. His uncle and owner of the truck, Robert L. Barron Jr., of Barron Brothers Produce Co., 600 West Commerce, Brownwood, was reported asleep in the seat beside the driver at the time. They received cuts and bruises and were released from Medical Arts Hospital after receiving emergency treatment.

Mills County Sheriff C. F. "Stub" Stubblefield and Brown County Deputy Sheriff Joe Townsend investigated the accident. Stubblefield said it was the fourth fatal traffic accident in Mills County this year.

The accident occurred on a straight stretch of the highway, with the vehicles headed in opposite directions. The truck was headed toward Goldthwaite and the Straley car toward Brownwood.

Surviving in addition to the son are a daughter, Mrs. Mary Louise Braughton of Los Angeles, California, and a half-brother, Will Jackson of San Saba.

His wife, Mrs. Connie Straley, died in 1944. His parents were the late Mr. and Mrs. French Straley, pioneers of Mills County.

Interment was in the Goldthwaite Memorial Cemetery under the direction of the Roy Wilkins Funeral Home with Masonic services at the graveside. Pallbearers were: Fred Stephens, Milton Tate, Walter Bryant, Ray Duren, Glynn Collier and Charles Conratt.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Ives Looms as Key Figure in T-H Revision Expect New Bill to Be Written on Senate Floor

WASHINGTON—The death of Senator Robert A. Taft makes it most unlikely that the Senate labor committee, of which he was a member, will ever be able to agree on a bill revising the Taft-Hartley labor act. This means that any new labor bill that passes will have to be written on the Senate floor, a most unsatisfactory method of operation. Labor legislation is listed for a "must" at the next session of Congress.

The Senate labor committee is sharply split along party lines over the kind of legislation which is needed. However, one Republican—Senator Irving M. Ives of New York—usually is more in sympathy with the labor views of Democratic committeemen than with the position on this issue taken by his GOP colleagues.

If Ives should vote with the Democrats, the committee would be so divided it probably never could get agreement on a bill. Taft, because of his prestige, might have been able to bring about a measure of agreement, but, even for him, it would have been difficult. With Taft gone, the committee probably is in for a good deal of feuding, fussing and frustration.

Senator Ives TRADE WORRIES—The government is "deeply concerned" over the desire of many Japanese to resume trade with Red China as a means of easing Japan's economic difficulties.

The State department fears that such trade would enable the Chinese Communists to increase their war potential. American officials believe, also, that Japanese-Chinese trade would arm congressional opponents of foreign aid and possibly enable them to get new programs reduced to such an extent that they might as well be discontinued.

Although many legislators have said foreign aid is on its way out and next year's appropriations should be the last, the program is likely to continue in some form beyond that date.

For one important reason, foreign aid helps provide markets for many United States manufactured goods.

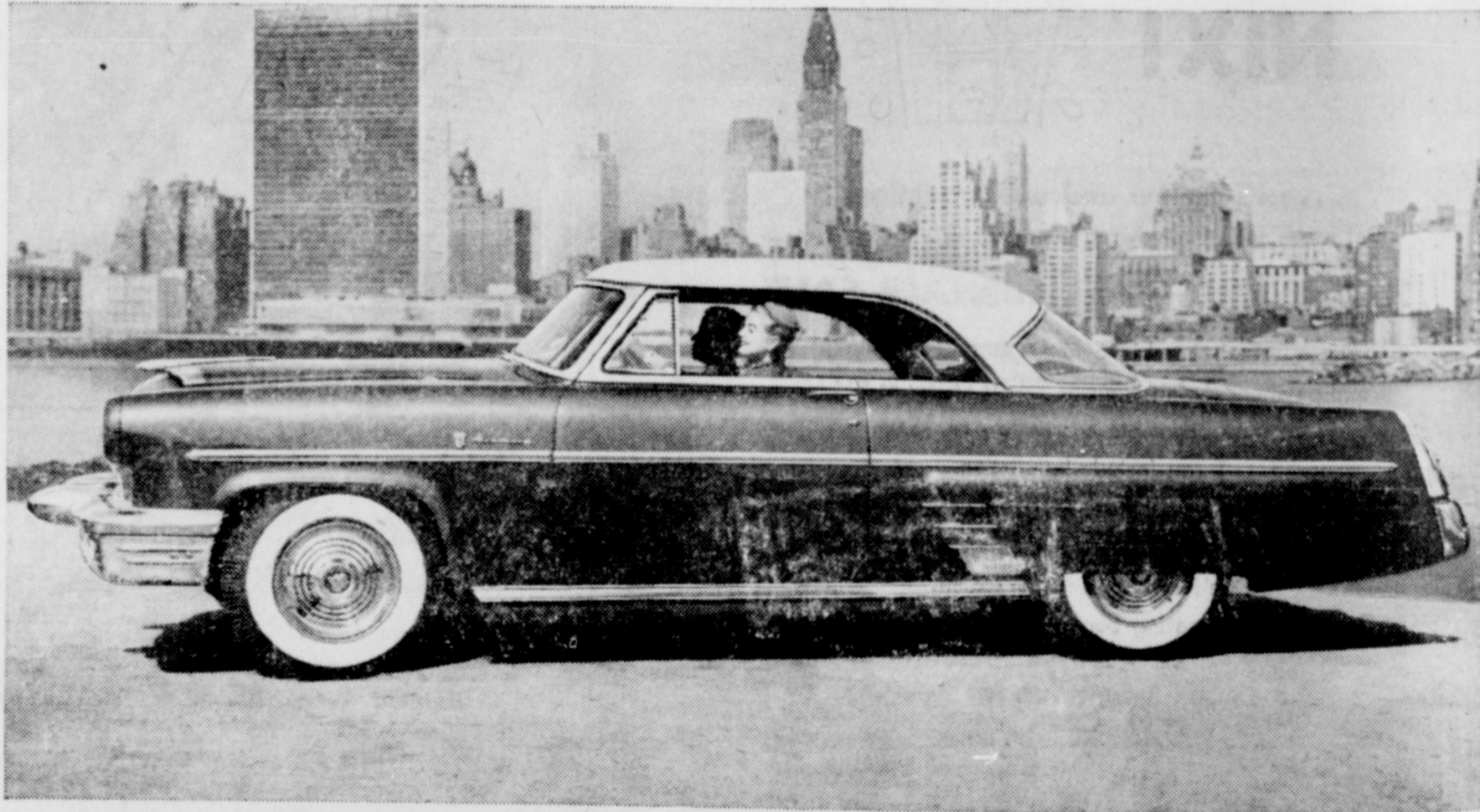

### Breakfast Dish with Bananas

By ALICE DENHOFF

WE'D like to remind our friends that a good breakfast is just as important during warm weather as it is the rest of the year. Very often, the family plans to be absent from home much of the day, and the knowledge that they go forth fortified with a good meal is of great comfort to the home-maker.

For something substantial to bolster captious eaters, try Banana French Toast or Strawberry Toastwich.

#### Flavored With Nutmeg

For 4 portions of the banana concoction, combine 2 slightly beaten eggs, 2/3 c milk and tsp nutmeg. Dip 8 bread slices into mixture, turning to coat both sides. Brown bread on both sides in 1/4 c shortening in a skillet. Slice 3 medium bananas and place a layer of fruit on each of 4 slices of French toast. Cover with second slice of French toast. Serve with maple syrup. To make the toastwich, butter 12 slices bread with 1/4 c soft butter. Make 6 sandwiches by placing 2 tsp strawberry preserves between slices of buttered bread (takes 2/3 c preserves in all).

Combine 2 slightly beaten eggs, 1/2 c milk, 1/2 tsp salt and 1/2 tsp sugar. Dip each sandwich in egg mixture, turning to coat both sides. Brown sandwiches on both sides in 1/4 c shortening in skillet. Shake a little confectioners' sugar over top of each toastwich.

#### Now for two snack suggestions

##### Tomato-Cheese Sauce

To serve 5, combine one can condensed tomato soup, 1/4 c milk, 1/2 tsp onion juice, tsp prepared mustard and 1/2 tsp Worcestershire sauce. Heat well. Add 2 c grated processed cheese and stir until it melts. For each serving, place 2 deviled egg halves on slice of toast and cover with 1/4 c hot tomato sauce.

##### Ham Toastwich next, the recipe for 6.

Combine 1/4 c soft butter and 2 tsp prepared mustard and spread on 12 bread slices. Makes 6 boiled ham sandwiches.

Combine 2 slightly beaten eggs and 1/2 c milk. Dip each sandwich into egg mixture, coating both sides. Brown sandwiches on both sides in small amount of hot shortening in skillet. Serve at once.

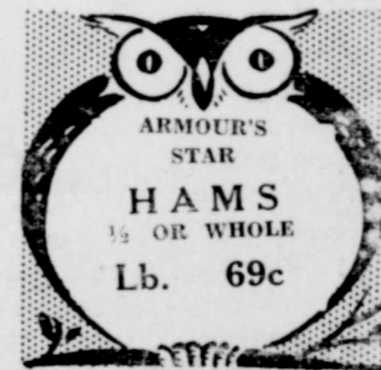





### REVERSING THE SOIL FERTILITY LOSS TREND

Our Texas soils are being built up and torn down at the same time.

The use of crop residues, manure, fertilizers and other good management practices builds up our soil productivity. But leaching, erosion, crop removal and oxidation of organic are depleting soil fertility faster than it is being built up. Reversing this trend will involve the development of soil management methods for all parts of the state.

The red or brown water of our Texas rivers, the increasing seriousness of flash floods, eroded hillsides and frequent dust storms are evidences of lost soil. While these situations are serious, the destruction of the productivity of our land is the real tragedy.

Productivity loss is not easy to see with the naked eye, and it is not reflected in data on crop yields. New technology, such as high-yielding, disease-resistant crop varieties and new chemicals for insect control have temporarily prevented a downward trend in yield. And our crop yields have often been maintained by using up "capital reserves" — depleting our basic soil resources.

Soils are produced by a vast number of combinations of climatic, geological and biological forces. Each of our thousands of soil types has its own possibilities and limitations. Some have been carefully explored, but many have not yet been described.

Better erosion control through contouring, mulching, terracing and grass waterways reduces soil loss. Good crop rotations and applications of lime and fertilizer compensate for part of the fertility loss. Research has been productive in overcoming these factors, but we have not yet stopped the downward trend on most soils. Only a start has been made in our understanding of the chemical, physical and biological forces involved in the building-up and tearing-down process.

Our biggest task will be in learning to understand the effect of alternative soil, crop, livestock and management systems upon gains and losses in fertility in each section of the state. The Texas Department of Agriculture and the Agricultural Experiment Station at College Station have been working on this project for a number of years.

But it is also the duty of every farmer to learn as much about the qualities of his own soil as he can. Only then can

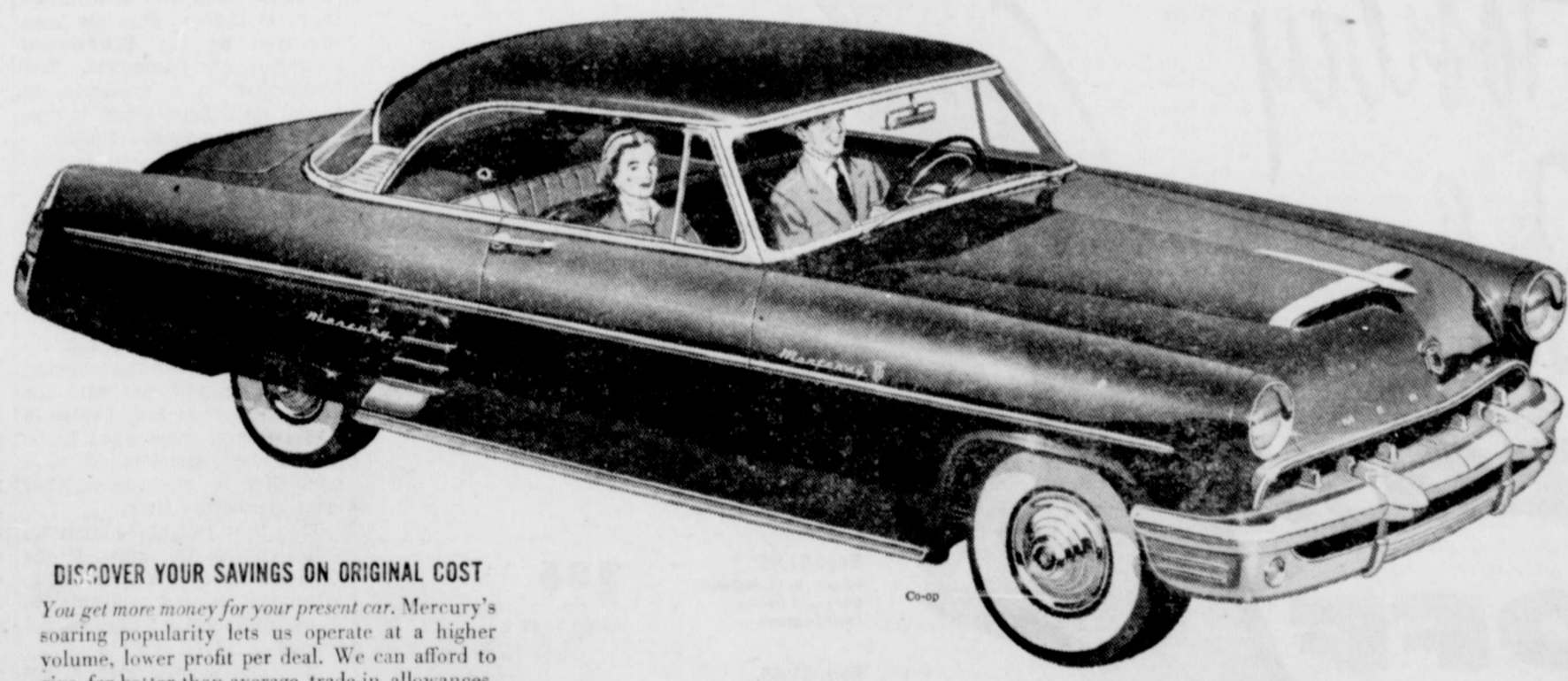

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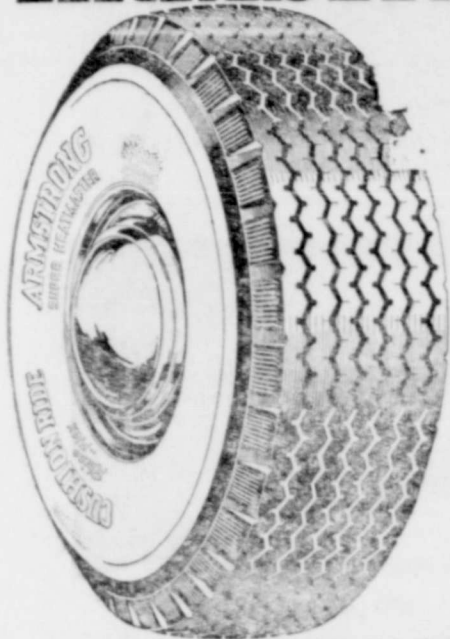
