Expect New Bill to Be Written on Senate Floor

Special to Central Press WASHINGTON-The death of Senator Robert A. Taft makes it most unlikely that the Senate labor committee, of which he was a member, will ever be able to agree on a bill revising the Taft-

Hartley labor act. This means that any new labor bill that passes will have to be written on the Senate floor, a most unsatisfactory method of operation. Labor legislation is listed for a "must" at the next session of

The Senate labor committee is sharply split along party li es over

the kind of legislation which is needed. However, me Republican-Senator Irving M. Ives of New York-usually is more in sympathy with the labor views of Democratic committeemen than with the position on this issue taken by his GO? colleagues. If Ives should vote with the Democrats, the committee would be so divided it probably never could get agreement on a bill. Taft, because of his prestige, might have been able to tring about a measure of agreement, but, even for him, it would have been difficult.

With Taft gone, the committee probably is in for a good deal of feuding, fussing and frustration.

Although many legislators have said foreign aid is on its way cut and next year's appropriations should be the last, the program is likely to continue in some form beyond that date.

The use of crop residues, manure, fertilizers and other good management practices builds up our soil productivity. But leaching, erosion, crop rematerial, in too many cases, moval and oxidation of organic are depleting soil fertility faster than it is being built up. Reversing this trend will involve the development of soil management methods for all parts


