## Tax Collections Will Start Today

Thursday, October 1, (today) marks the official opening day for folks to start paying their 1953 taxes. This date applies to county and state, city and school taxes.

County tax assessor-collector, C. F. "Stub" Stubblefield has announced that statements were scheduled to be mailed by Wednesday, September 30, in time to reach all taxpayers on the roll by today. Discounts applying on County and State taxes are as follows: October 3%, November 2%, and December 1%. County and state taxes must be paid before January 31, in order to avoid penalty charges.

School and City taxes are due and payable beginning today, October 1, although there are no discounts allowed.

City treasurer, W. C. Barnett has announced that city tax rolls are up to date and his office is ready to receive payments for this year's taxes, at the City Utilities office.

Walter Henry, tax collector for Goldthwaite Independent School District stated that his office will also be ready to receive tax payments as of today, October 1.

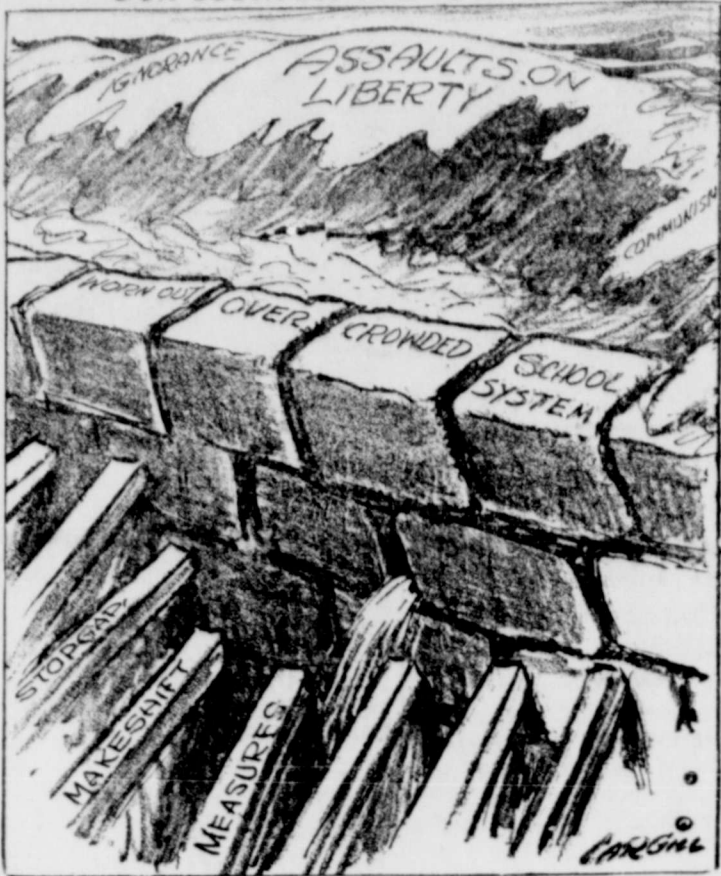

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

No Recession, Depression But 'Shakeout' Predicted Experts Label 'Shakeout' Healthy Event for U. S. Special to Central Press

WASHINGTON—Most government and independent economists are leaning toward the belief that the outlook for the future is for a "shakeout" but not a recession or a depression. Business activity may decline in volume and the dollar may become lighter but the experts predict this will be off-set by a period of great stability in prices and wages at a high level. They contend a "shakeout" will be a mild and healthy event.

A slightly contracting economy will mean a slightly lessened demand for goods and services but it also will produce an intensified competitive spirit which always has benefited the consumer.

Administration officials declare that the fiscal policies which have been instituted by President Eisenhower are to be credited for the prospect of healthy economic conditions. They assert that the single largest inflationary factor in recent years has been the fact the government is spending more than it takes in, thus increasing the supplies of money and credit with a resultant cheapening of the value of a dollar.

Republicans now say that government income is more nearly approaching outgo and the inflationary pressure is tapering off. They anticipate that in the long run, the entire economy will continue to flourish.

ON THE OTHER HAND—Despite their optimism, administration officials are beginning to worry about the decline in housing production and some fear, a sagging construction industry could confront the President with a major headache.

At the present, housing activities are running at a very high rate but future operations, according to informed government reports, indicate a sharp decline in future months.

Many officials believe that production in 1954, for the first time since 1948, will fail to hit the one million unit mark. This year, the forecast is for about one million, 100 thousand units.

Reason for the predicted slump is deep-seated and officials admit there is little that can be done to cure it short of extraordinary pump-priming measures.

A declining demand for new houses is a big factor in the troublesome situation. It is now becoming clear that the huge post-war demand for housing has been satisfied and buyers are exercising caution and care before committing themselves to purchase.

Inability to obtain adequate financing is another deterrent to home construction. Banks are following an extremely cautious lending policy, requiring big down payments and shorter amortization periods.

No one hazards a guess on how serious the housing doldrums may become. Government officials emphasize they are not alarmed but they concede they are "watching the situation."

FARM FRONT—Agriculture department authorities report the much-publicized drought is not going to have very much effect on 1953 crop sales or farm income.

They still anticipate total cash receipts from the marketing of farm products will run around \$30 to \$31 billion this year and that net income of the nation's farmers will total about \$13 billions. Farm experts declare that the United States agricultural economy is now so immense that it can take a drought pretty well in stride. While cattle and cotton were hurt by the drought, wheat and corn crops appear to be above expectations. In addition, the rainless spell encouraged cattle raisers to sell their stock at a faster pace which will boost income slightly, even though beef prices are off. Fruit and vegetable crops were also hurt but housewives are paying higher prices for the products and in many areas, truck and fruit farmers escaped damage. All in all, the total volume of farm products to be marketed this year is expected to be about as sizeable as it was a year ago.

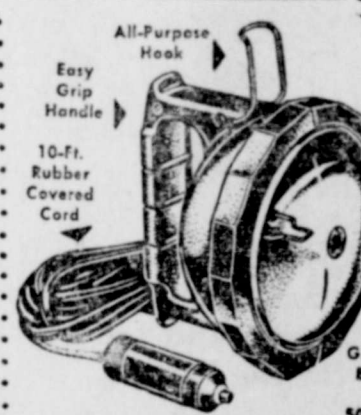

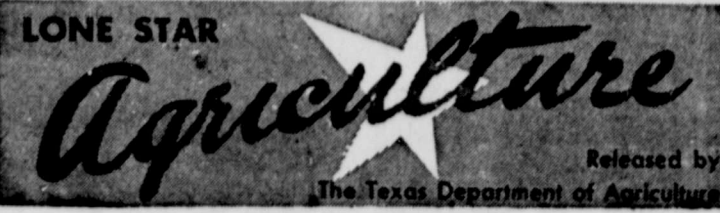
**FC Dorman Hanks Returns To States**

**NEW GRASSLAND SEEDING METHOD**

The problem of how to establish a good grassland crop may now be close to a solution due to experiments conducted during the past year.

The farmer has long been troubled by the puzzler of how to give grass seeds a good footing in the soil. In most cases, he still relies upon the old "broadcast" method—a system prevalent during Biblical times. Now, a new type of "precision planting" is showing excellent results.

Precision planting calls for drilling of grass and clover seed at a depth of one-fourth inch. One inch below these seeds has been placed a band of fertilizer. Soil is then packed over the seed.

The advantage of fertilizer placement in a band below the grass seed became evident soon after the plantings were made in September of last year. Although seedlings in all test plots were up within a few days, those in which the fertilizer had been "banded" one inch below the seed, developed most rapidly. Weeds also were less prominent in the "banded" plots than they were when the fertilizer was broadcast.

Plants in banded drill rows eight inches apart grew rapidly and made growth enough to survive the winter. But plots where the plants were between fertilizer rows developed slowly and many were killed during the winter.

Further tests showed that if a high rate of fertilizer, 750 pounds per acre of 3-12-8, were placed in contact with the grass and clover seed at planting time, then the stands of clover was suppressed. Growth was al-

so slow if the bands of fertilizer were one inch below and one inch to the side of the seed. Therefore, the method of placing fertilizer one inch directly below the seed proved superior to all other tests.

There was apparently very little advantage in broadcasting the seed banding the fertilizer. However, drilling the seed showed considerable advantage even when the fertilizer was broadcast.

Examination of the weed content in harvested forage showed that where both seed and fertilizer were drilled, practically no weeds were in evidence. But where seed or fertilizer were broadcast, weeds were a real problem, especially at low rates of seeding and fertilization.
