

We have always maintained that we are not too old to learn, or to see something new or different.

As we go along from day to day we are not too surprised that we learn something new nearly every day - so to speak - which we seem to be able to take very well.

Once in a while though, we see something new that is a bell ringer. That's what happened to us last Friday night when we went, with several other hundred fans to the Goldthwaite-Lometa football game at Lometa.

That was our first time seeing a football coach pick up his boys and go home at the beginning of the second half and forfeit the game. That's what the Lometa coach did.

Was it because it was too tough for his boys and they couldn't take it or was it because he couldn't take it?

It is true, and unfortunate, one of his players suffered a broken arm. Though it must be remembered that the Eagle, who tackled his man that suffered the broken arm, was not put on the bench for "Slugging." It was a good, clean, hard play, according to the rules of the game.

It is easy for a member of any team to get steamed up, at times, and feel like laying aside his training regarding good sportsmanship in high school athletics. But that isn't the purpose of sports in our school program. In fact it is quite the opposite. They are to learn to be competitive and yet get along.

It is a sad picture though, when one of the coaches comes up with requests, and demands, that he and his team be given special privileges outside the rules of the game, or they will quit playing and forfeit the game.
