Roads In Mills And Brown Counties

This project includes grading structure, base and surfacing on Farm Roads 1642 and 573. The new pavement will be from a junction with U.S. Highway 84 at a point some 200 yards east of the Zephyr business district and 7.3 miles from there to a point a mile west of Democrat, where it will connect with pavement previously completed

on FM 1642. Two miles of the new FM 1642 pavement will be in Brown County and 5.3 in Mills County. The contract on this project also calls for pavement of 4.2 miles from a junction with FM 1642 at Democrat south to previously completed FM 573 pavement out of Mullin.

The National Safety Council has found that traffic accident deaths on both Christmas eve and Christmas day are about twice as high as the annual daily average. Family gatherings and other festivities bring the peak travel of the winter. And when more cars are on the move there is more chance of an accident.

Early darkness plus bad weather add up to poor visibility. Fogged windshields also make it difficult to see and avoid accident situations.

Rain, snow and ide mean slippery streets and highways, ubt thousands of holiday drivers fail to adjust their speed to hazardous conditions.

The good fellowship of the season stimulates more drinking — and too often the celebrants clink glasses with death.

Seven hundred and forty persons died as the result of accidents during the Christmas holidays last year — and the toll of 556 killed in traffic accidents was the highest on record.
