GOP Desperately Hopes To Placate Farmer Vote

Department of Agriculture Reorganization Might Help

WASHINGTON-More than a century ago, the immortal New England poet Ralph Waldo Emerson penned some words which might well be the theme song of most successful politicians in the

"The farmer," wrote Poet Emerson with more truth than poetry, "is covetous of his dollar. And with reason . . . He knows how many strokes of labor it represents. His bones ache with the day's work that earned it.

While it is probable that very few members of Congress have come across Emerson's quote in their reading, the lesson is not lost on them. There's turmoil among politicians of both parties today and the farmer's concern for his dollar is the cause. There is nothing that will cause the heart of the bravest politician to quail quite so quickly as an irate farmer. Ever since the surprise victory of Democrat

Lester R. Johnson in Wisconsin's ninth congressional district where he recently became the first Democrat in history to represent that district in Congress, Republican congressional leaders and top officials in the Agriculture department have been burning the midnight oil trying to devise ways and means to placate the farm vote.

One thing that they hope will do this is Secretary Ezra Taft Benson's reorganization of the Department of Agriculture which is expected to be put into effect about the first of the year.

BEFORE IT ADJOURNED FOR THE YEAR, Congress passed a pill giving Secretary Benson authority to reorganize the Agriculture department more or less along his own ideas. Benson asked for and got a kind of "blank check" from the lawmakers. The most sweeping of Benson's announced changes of the department include the complete abolition of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, the Production and Marketing administration and the closing of seven regional offices of the Soil Conservation.

Benson and his top assistants claim that the changes will make the unwieldy department more efficient and will save taxpayers' money. Leaders of both parties appear convinced that the administration's record on the problem of slipping farm prices during the next few months is the key that will control the 1954 congressional elections. If the administration can't come up with some convincing answers soothing to farmers, most observers think that the President will face the prospect of a hostile Congress during the last two years of his term, since the Republicans are in only nominal control of Congress.


IF THE FARMERS ARE NOT PLACATED, the Republican party faces rough going in the congressional elections. The House agriculture committee, under the chairmanship of Republican Clifford Hope of Kansas, has been holding many open hearings with farmers and farm leaders in all sections of the country trying to sound out rural sentiment.

The rub comes from the fact that most congressional and administration leaders aren't quite sure just what should be Political

done to cure the long-range problem of overproduction on farms and the short-run emergency caused by droughts and bad weather. The farmers have enough political muscle to persuade Congress to do just about Muscle anything they demand, it's just that farm and congressional leaders aren't sure at this writing what can or should be

Meanwhile, the problem remains pressing for the GOP and the administration. Some weeks back a poll taken in connection with the Minnesota State Fair showed the farmers in that state were convinced by nearly a 3-to-1 margin that the Republican-controlled Congress is doing a bad job and subsequent events have proved that farm leaders in other states have pretty much the same idea.

POISONOUS PLANTS

Poisonous plants are not ordinarily a major threat to livestock in good grazing country because cattle are pretty selecti e in their eating habits. Most toxic plants just don't taste

Stockmen recognize on sight most of the plants which have a harmful effect on their livestock and try to keep them cleared from the land. Secondary threats such as mesquite beans during certain weather conditions, and cactus with spines are kept under only nominal control because cattle turn them down in favor of good grass.

Mesquite and cactus can be dealt with when grass conditions are unfavorable. But a real threat sometimes develops with another group of plants which are not usually considered toxic. These plants include Johnson grass, sudan grass, velvet grass, arrow grass and mest varieties of sorghums.

Drouth often stunts the growth of these plants, or they may be arrested in development by frost or cattle trampling. When stunting occurs, there is danger of prussic acid forming in the plants which bring on symptons of poisoning in cattle the same as cyanide poisoning.

Mature plants in this group, however, are not likely to be dangerous.

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
