his findings. Willis S. Marshall, the first postmaster, was appointed by

President Grover Cleveland, (Democrat) on January 11, 1886. About 1889 he moved the office to a larger frame building on the lot now occupied by the Lone Star Gas Company office. Unlike the first post office which had only a few boxes, it

On January 23, 1890 John J Stockbridge was appointed postmaster by President Benjamin Harrison (Republican). He served three years, and it was during his term that the post office was moved in 1892 to the building on the northwest corner of the Square where it remained until December 28, 1953. On July 10, 1893, James P. Grundy was appointed by PresHarrison resigned on July 1, 1932 with a record 25 years of combined service under five Presidents.

July 12, 1932 Robert F. Mc-Dermott received his second appointment, this time from President Herbert Hoover (R) and served for nearly two years. April 10, 1934 Mrs. Lawrence Thompson Stokes was appointed Acting Postmaster by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. The same year the President appointed Melmoth Y. Stokes, Jr, and his permanent appointment was confirmed by the Senate on January 25, 1935. On his release from Army duty on March 11., 1935 he succeded his wife as postmaster.

In 1936 the Goldthwaite Post Office was raised from Third to Second Class and all employees placed under Civil Service. In 1938 the quarters were double in size, and government owned boxes and fixtures were installed to replace the obsolete equipment then in use.



Statistics by the U.S. Department of Commerce shows that over a 20-year period corporate profits have averaged only three per cent of sales.


It is reported that many hundreds of "investment clubs" are now in operation throughout the country. The usual method of operation is for the members to contribute a certain sum of money each month to a fund, which is then used to buy stocks. Some have been most successful. One club, which began in 1940, has had a total of \$17,000 in contributions. Ten thousand has been withdrawn from the fund - and \$44,000 remains.

Not all will do so well, of course. But the clubs provide an excellent means of broadening the base of business-ownership in this country. And, as one writer has pointed out, they also "offer the possibility of profit and the certainty of education and good fun.





• TRADE-Top government officials are highly concerned over Brazil's desire to trade with countries behind the Iron Curtain, because of what this may lead to in the rest of Latin America.

They are worried because they fear that this sort of trade might enable the Kremlin to get hold of strategic war materials.

However, the authorities concede that Brazil's desire stems purely from an effort to find markets for her goods and to solve pressing economic problems created by her increased purchases of foreign wheat and petroleum products.

Many Latin countries, according to the Washington authorities, are using Iron Curtain trade to bolster rapidly dwindling dollar supplies. However, if concessions are made for such legitimate purposes, they are likely to be used as levers to secure higher prices and other trade advantages.

• COSTLY FATALITIES-Working for the government can be very dangerous! Secretary of the Interior Douglas McKay revealed recently that 243 were killed in 1952 while employed by the federal government. Most of the fatalities, which McKay termed "a shocking thing," occurred from falls and during the handling of materials.

Three million man-days were lost in 1952 through accidents, which also cost the government more than \$23 million in compensation. McKay disclosed that during 1951, one federal fatality cost the government \$151,530, and another the same year \$124,744. In the following year, one fatality cost \$144,407 in compensation, while several cost \$50,000. .

• RAIDS AID STOCKPILE-United States narcotics commissioner Harry J. Anslinger disclosed the other day that he sent 640 tons of

morphine and other drugs to the nation's stockpile of critical commodities. Senators at hearings on juvenile 'Recoverable' delinquency had asked Anslinger what happens to Drugs Added the drugs he seizes in making raids on illicit sellers.

Anslinger said that "recoverable" drugs are sent To Stockpile to the national stockpile and pointed out that in event

of war or other disaster, the need for pain-killers mounts. He said the stockpile has 640 tons of drugs as the result of raids.

Incidentally, Anslinger pointed out that his undercover agents never sell drugs but deal only with those who have them to sell. "We buy, we don't sell," he said.





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

Above is a sketch of the architect's drawing but final plans call for a different style colonade which will be even more attractive than that shown in the picture.



(Continued from Front Page) Lewis B. Porter was named temporary Acting Postmaster. During the trying War Years which followed, Mrs. Lucile Grisham Fairman served as Assistant Postmaster. She had been promoted to regular clerk in 1942.

In September 1946 Colonel Stokes returned from Military Leave and resumed the postmastership. When he was recalled to three months Army duty in October 1947. Mrs. Fairman was placed in full charge of the office. In the fall of 1948 Colonel Stokes again received orders for Army duty and he then requested transfer from Postmaster to Rural Carrier. On December 1. 1948 Mrs. Fairman was appointed Acting Postmaster by President Harry S. Truman. At that time she had had 12 years service in the post office. After passing the Civil Service postmoster examination, she received the permanent appointment. This was confirmed by the Senate on September 20, 1950.

Mrs. Fairman was thus not only the first woman to receive the permanent appointment as Postmaster in Goldthwaite but was the first postmaster here to be selected from the ranks of Civil Service em-

During the five years that she has been postmaster, she has been responsible for many improvements in the operation and equipment of the post office

Through her tactful presistence she was able to convince Post Office officials of the need for a better post office building in Goldthwaite, and the modern new office is a tribute to her ability.
