The United States moved to have the showdown at the Tenth Inter-American conference, scheduled to convene in Caracas in March, by proposing inclusion of the topic under the wording of "intervention of nternational Communism in the American re-

Adoption of anything more than pious resolutions condemning Communist infiltration in the Americas will be very difficult precisely because the American republics are pledged not to interfere in each other's affairs.

However, if it accomplishes nothing else, the United States hopes to draw attention to the prob-Senator Arthur lem and alert other nations in the hemisphere to the menace.

• PROBERS-Rep. Clare Hoffman's announced intention of investigating how deeply junketing legislators dig into the public purse will get nowhere as far as one Republican senator is concerned.

Senator Arthur V. Watkins says he did no wining and dining on his recent three-month tour of 16 countries in Europe, Asia and Africa to discover how United States immigration and refugee laws are working from the standpoint of American consuls. Says Watkins: "In my case, it was not a joy ride. For one thing, my wife and I do mot drink and we gave no parties.





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

For the season ahead, try a cold "shift meal."

Fill a crock or glass jar with a good hearty salad, ready-mixed to serve in individual portions.

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





Central gas heating, thermostatically controlled, provides a comfortable tempera-2,558.56 ture on the coldest days, and a built-in cooler will keep the entire building cool in the summer. The attractive tile floor was selected for durability as well as easy cleaning. 




