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EDUCATION LOCAL RESPONSIBILITY

A worried parent recently wrote Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby, Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, expressing deep concern over community apathy toward local school problems, especially those of a budgetary nature. In an election involving desperately needed school taxes, the writer observed that, "There were 72 votes cast in our box - in contrast to the several thousand votes cast during the last presidential election. And ours is a neighborhood of young marrieds." Mrs. Hobby, a federal officer, was then asked to do something about the situation.

The answer to a plea of this kind should be painfully clear. Local initiative, local responsibility and local pride are things that cannot be established by fiat nor bought with federal money. Turning to the federal government to solve local problems is a deadly process for people who value freedom. It is suicidal in the case of education.

As Mrs. Hobby warns, "Our public schools began in our local communities, they must stay there... the Federal Government must not interfere in educational matters which rightly belong to the local and State authorities.

Plattsmouth, Nebraska, Journal: "As long as the average American is free to read what he pleases, listen to whom he pleases, travel freely, speak his mind and enjoy access to all sources of entertainment, news and propaganda he desires, communism will make no significant gain in the United States.'

Korea Army Withdrawals Arouses Little Criticism Congressmen See Selves Getting Pay Rise Soon

United States Army divisions from Korea stirred up virtually no criticism by Washington armchair strategists even though no assured peace has been reached with the Reds.

Second, the move holds out strong hope that a reduction of forces overseas obviously spells out the possibility of additional cuts in military Even though the man in the street hasn't shown

plicitly on the decisions he makes on reducing military strength in keeping with national security. The battle over a reduction in Air Force funds, which the President won, has convinced the poli-

Eisenhower ticians of this fact. • PAY BOOST PREDICTED-Members of Congress are privately

confident they will win a pay boost in the coming year and they are perfectly willing to give the same treatment to federal judges. A national commission recently conducted hearings on the problem and gave numerous indications that the salary hike will be recom-

mended. Congressmen will be merely required to approve the recommendations made by the 18-member board. The most likely proposal-and the one urged by most witnesses before the commission-would provide a \$10,000 across-the-board pay raise suggested by Senator Pat McCarren (D), Nevada.

Such an increase would boost the pay of senators and House members to \$25,000 a year. It would lift the pay level of judges in district courts to the same figure, provide \$27,500 in the circuit courts and \$35.000 for the Supreme Court justices.

Chief Justice Earl Warren would benefit even more. His salary would be increased from \$25,000 to \$40,000, placing him on a financial par with the vice president and the speaker of the House.

· CHARITY CRACKDOWN-There will be a strong movement underway in the new session of Congress to tighten controls on charity "racketeering" in the wake of disclosures made by a New York state legislative investigation of abuses.

Several House members have announced they will press for action on bills aimed at preventing the American public from being bilked by unscrupulous operations.

Some of the measures to curb abuses would set up federal safeguards on the use of United States mails as well as the radio and television industries in promotion schemes. Also under consideration is a proviso requiring sponsoring organizations to list the amounts spent on fund drives, amounts raised and dispersed as well as their officers and sponsors.



A TIME FOR ALERTNESS

Any program as extensive as good and yet still have some harmful after-effects.

One danger lies in the spread of noxious weeds or plants to areas where they did not exist before. When hay is brought in from distant points, it is inevitable that some foreign plants are mixed with that hay. And they can be a real bother if they get a foothold in Texas

There are several precautionary measures a farmer or rancher can use to prevent this spread. When practical, only one area of the pasture or barnyard should be used as a feeding site. This area can be watched closely, and if weed seeds are present in the hay, it will be a simple matter to eradicate the resulting plant

Caution also should be used when using barnyard fertilizer the recent drouth relief hay in the fields. Many undesireable chipments to Texas can have weed seeds can pass unharmed mixed results. It can do a lot of through the digestive tracts of livestock and germinate in the ground.

If this fertilizer is used, it should be spread in designated areas and a close watch kept on it. Any new or unusual plants found in the field is a potential threat to the land.

Studies show that the shipment of agricultural commodities from one state to another is the prime cause of weed and insect spreading. The opportunity is especially ripe in Texas this year

Although only about 81 counties have received these disaster shipments this winter, the facts are that foreign plants can spread alarmingly in a new area in a very short time.
