Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

European Iron Curtain's Beginning to Show Rust

Kremlin Now Losing Sleep Over Unrest of Satellites

WASHINGTON—Russia is deeply concerned over the unrest in her Iron Curtain satellites which is growing stronger day-by-day. Top intelligence reports reaching Washington are keeping the United States informed on the situation and led Secretary of State John Foster Dulles to declare the matter is a critical one for the Kremlin.

Dulles has told members of Congress that the situation is one from which the Soviet can not escape. It was learned that the secret reports to the State department tell of widespread unrest in East Germany and other Soviet-dominated satellites in Europe.

The department has been told that the whole Russian satellite structure is being shaken by internal unrest and sabotage. Next to Germany, the unrest is reported greatest in Czechoslovakia, Poland and Albania.

● BAD TIMES—If there is one thing the administration is extremely sensitive about it is the possibility of another economic depression.

White House informants said President Eisenhower and his aides have no intention of waiting until things get too bad before starting government pump-priming operations.

They shudder at the thought of any repetition of what occurred during the administration of the last Republican incumbent, Herbert Hoover.

It took the Republicans 20 years to live down the effects of the depression which swept Franklin D. Roosevelt into the White House. Party strategists are fearful another depression, while a GOP incumbent is in the White House, might spell the doom of the Republican party.

That is why the President promised he would act promptly if unemployment continued to grow during March. This is the month when employment normally rises. If it falls, Republican economists feel the decline would be a definite danger signal, and they intend to act.

● GOP WASTE—Democrats will blast a \$100,000 probe of the nation's Social Security system as a complete waste of money. The study, made last fall by a House ways and means subcommittee, will end officially in a few days with a memorandum from the staff to the full committee.

No legislative recommendations will be made. The study was begun to find out shortcomings, many of which have already been made public in hearings.

The chairman of the subcommittee, Rep. Carl T. Curtis (R), Nebraska, has advocated substantial changes in the Social Security laws. However, these are essentially different from those recommended by President Eisenhower.

The ways and means committee is expected to receive the Curtis report politely and then forget about it. Democrats say they will charge that the subcommittee found out nothing that wasn't already known before and contributed nothing to legislative hearings that must be held on the President's own program.

● KIBITZERS KEEP OUT—One of the most touchy and dangerous jobs in Korea today is locating and getting rid of unexploded bombs and shells, both those belonging to the Communists and those of the United Nations forces. The three military forces are specially training men for the work at the explosive ordnance school in Maryland.

Capt. Raymond Caricofe, who carried out the work in Korea, reported that one team neutralized more than 700 pieces of enemy ammunition in a three-month period.

Asked why he chose bomb disposal work, Caricofe replied, "It's one job where you aren't bothered by anybody looking over your shoulder while you work."

**Tuna Tetrizzini, Bean Salad For Delicious Buffet Dinners**

By ALICE DENHOFF  
RECIPES collected from readers and hostesses are offered today, leading off with Tuna Tetrizzini, a delicious, if fattening dish, which we enjoyed at a buffet supper.

Here is the recipe for 4 servings.  
**Tuna Tetrizzini**  
Cook an 8-oz. package spaghetti according to directions. Drain. Put 6-oz. can flaked tuna, 1/4 c. each diced pimento and chopped green pepper and 1 small onion, chopped, in a casserole. Mix 1/2 c. water, 1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup and add to tuna mixture. Add 1 1/4 c. grated sharp cheese, the spaghetti, and season to taste with pepper and salt.

Toss lightly until well mixed and coated with sauce. Sprinkle with 1/2 c. grated cheese. Bake at 350° F. for 45 min. This is also good when made with canned salmon.

Another buffet recipe, also reduced to 4 servings, is a tasty Hot Bean Salad.

**Hot Bean Salad**  
Cut 2 slices bacon into pieces and cook until crisp. Remove; brown 1/2 c. chopped onion in the fat. Add bacon, a 1-lb. can baked

beans, 1/2 tsp. dry mustard, dash pepper and 1/4 c. each vinegar and water. Simmer until beans absorb vinegar and water. Serve hot. Nice made with beans in tomato sauce, too, in which case, omit water.

Want a new taste treat for broiled chicken? Then vary the flavor with a generous sprinkle of ground ginger before putting the chicken under the broiler, and baste with butter while broiling.

**Glorified Sprouts**  
And how about transforming Brussels sprouts into a gourmet vegetable? Just sauté a little onion in 3 tbsps. fat left after cooking 4 strips bacon. Toss gently with the cooked Brussels sprouts; then crumble the 4 crisply cooked bacon slices and sprinkle over the top.

**Ice Cream Sundae Meringues** for dessert!

To serve 8, mix 1/2 cup cornstarch and 1/4 tsp. salt in saucepan; add syrup drained from a No. 2 can fruit salad or pineapple tidbits. Cook until thickened and clear, stirring constantly. Add the fruit; chill.

Fill 8 meringue shells with ice cream and top with the fruit sauce. Takes 1-qt. vanilla ice cream.

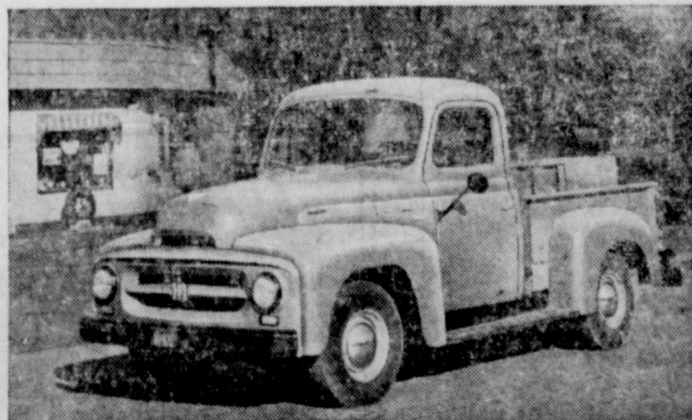

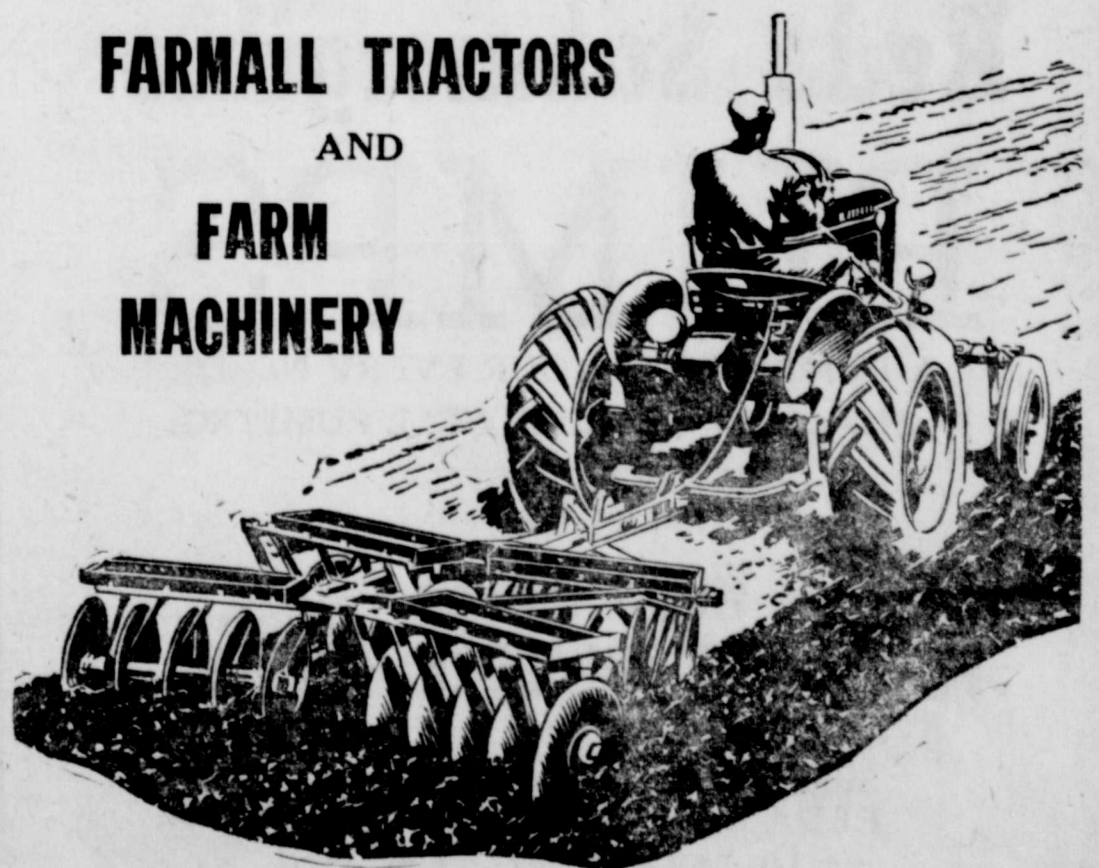

**Government Employees' Council Is  
Against Proposed P. O. Incentive Plan**

The Government Employees' Council of the American Federation of Labor, fully appreciative of the effort of the Postmaster General to come up with a workable reorganization program, believe that the proposals submitted to Congress are unworkable, unfair and impracticable in many respects.

The plan was hastily conceived by the firm of George Fry and Associates, who are presumed to be qualified in the field of job evaluation or they would not have been selected. However, the study reveals that while Fry and Associates indicate considerable familiarity

with jobs that are not primarily concerned with mail handling, they show a complete unfamiliarity with the important duties and requirements of the larger number of postal employees, including supervisors, postal transport clerks, post office clerks and letter carriers.

Basically, the Post Office Department is a mail handling organization. The Fry study is primarily concerned with the occupations that are incidental and supplemental to the main functions of the postal operations. Fry and Associates were guilty of many basic errors in making their study. First, it is evident from their report that, while a number of installations were carefully studied, their conclusions were largely based upon activities at the post office in their home city—Chicago. The Chicago Post Office is not a typical mail installation. Perhaps the only post office whose operation is comparable to Chicago is the New York post office, and even here there are essential differences.

The eight men who made the study failed to contact the representatives of the men who actually perform the various functions and the study reflects a complete lack of functional knowledge of mail operations on the part of Fry and Associates. As a result, some of the recommendations reach the point of absurdity. The proposed pay increases contained in the plan range from \$10 a year to the post office clerk and letter carrier in grade 3, up to an increase of \$5,150 for the postmaster in the Chicago Post Office.

Because of this and many other inequities, the Government Employees' Council is compelled to withhold their endorsement of the proposals of the Postmaster General. We believe that further study of reclassification, supervised by the Congress of the United States, is necessary before a reclassification bill should be enacted by the Congress.

**DECISIVE MONTH:** Where do we go from here?

Economists expect April to be the crucial month that may give us the answer to that question.

Unemployment is still rising (now about four million); inventories are up—sales down; factory production and freight carloadings are still skidding.

If there is going to be an upturn, seasoned observers think it will come in April.

**INFORMATION:** All during my Dad's lifetime he drilled into one that a man's judgment is no better than his informa-

tion. My work each day involves seeing 30 or 40 of the eight million people living in Texas and working with my 95 colleagues in the Senate. I spent the last five months of 1953 traveling all over Texas, but when Congress is in session I must be on the job in Washington.

I want my information about Texas and Texans to be accurate—so that my judgment will be sound. Your letters, containing suggestions and advice and setting forth your views on issues, help me greatly.

**FIVE YEARS:** Just over five years ago I entered the U. S. Senate. During these years I have earnestly tried to serve all the people of Texas—all the time—Texans in organizations and Texans as individuals—Texans who supported me and those who did not.

Being human, I have made mistakes. But I have done my best to be a good Senator. I have no higher ambition than to give the people of Texas the

kind of representation they deserve.

**IN THE SENATE:** My resolution to establish March 7 of every year as Friendship Day passed the Senate three hours after its introduction. This is the resolution urged by the General Federation of Women's Clubs, the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, and the National Society of Arts and Letters.

I have written Chairman Aiken of the Senate Agriculture Committee to urge hearings on my bill for upper watershed flood control and soil conservation. A similar bill has passed the House.

The Senate approved my amendment to the Mexican Labor Appropriations adding \$64,000 to provide for a Labor Reception Center.

Senator Saltonstall, Chairman, Senate Armed Services Committee, has appointed me to a subcommittee to investigate the need for continuing operation of the Texas City tin smelter.

## PARENT PROBLEMS

### Your Child's Birthday Party

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D. MOTHERS often write to ask me about games for young guests at a party for the youngster, three or four. Sometimes, they indicate that they plan to invite a dozen or more guests of his age.

In the first place, I remind these parents that a child so young is not ready for the usual sort of group games. He has not learned to follow rules of a game. He is an individualist. If you observe him in a nursery school, you find that while he may like to be with other children, he tends to play alone, alongside another child who is also playing alone. He may like to do along the same thing as another child near him. At best, he chooses to play co-operatively with only one or two other children.

Stories and Marches One group amusement such young children may enjoy is listening to a brief story while they can see the pictures in the book. Even then, the group rarely can number over three or four, in order for all of them to look and listen at the same time.

They might also like to move about for a few minutes as some rhythmic music is played. Or they might be induced to "march" in duck-like fashion, from one room to another or through a few doors. Even then, four or five children will do this far better than eight or ten.

Adult Assistance If you are sure you must have as many as ten or twelve such young children at your child's party, it is well to have two or three adults assist you, each tak-

ing charge of a small group of them. I urge the mother not to have more than four or five children of this age at a party, and to make it very short, not more than about twice as long as it takes them to eat the refreshments, which should be simple.

In good weather, when the youngsters can be out-of-doors, where they can run and enjoy a variety of free activities, the party might, successfully, be a bit longer.

Too Much Excitement Furthermore, for most children around three or four, a large party is far too exciting. The size and length of the party should not increase rapidly as the child grows older. After some months of experience in kindergarten, most children have progressed considerably in following directions and having some short periods of group fun. Even then, a party of six or eight, for a total period of an hour, is far better than a party of twelve or fourteen, for two hours. At this age, and up to seven or eight, some quiet fun, like cutting, drawing, coloring, putting together simple puzzles, and listening to stories, is far more wholesome indoors than exciting running games. If the party could be timed to fit in a wholesome not-exciting radio program, that might prove helpful and enjoyable.
