Work Gets Underway Monday On New Elementary School Building

Work on construction of the new elementary school building for Goldthwaite Independent School District got underway Monday of this week, according to announcement by school officials. Kenneth A. Sparks Construction Company, Hamilton, submitted the low bid of \$111,200.00 when bids were received by the board of education two weeks ago.

At the time bids were opened the school board employed Sparks, as contractor, to work out some alternates to effect savings on the project. After alternates were submitted by Sparks a contract was signed for the job. Alternates accepted by the board effected savings of \$1,836.40. Other alternates that are under consideration by the board will effect an additional saving of \$7,159.00 if they are put into effect as the construction job is in process.

The new Elementary Building, which is scheduled to be completed within 190 days, will be located on a new site which was acquired by the trustees some time ago for expansion purposes. The site is located one block north of present school buildings. Twelve class rooms, a combination lunch room and

auditorium, visual aids room and offices will be included in the new building.

HIGH SCHOOL PLANS IN PROCESS
The school district architect is working on plans now for remodeling the present grammar school, and adding a new wing to it, to convert into a modern high school building. Preliminary plans call for the Science and Home Economics departments to be located in the new wing while other departments will be located in the present building, after remodeling is completed. The Vocational Agriculture department would move into the present high school building.

These plans are subject to change as need arises. Preliminary plans were to be presented to the board in special meeting last night.

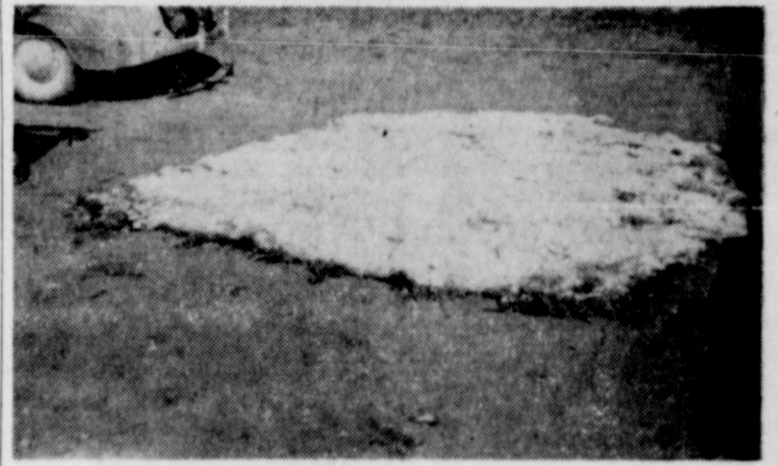
Friends Visit Walter Fairman

The Fleece of wool shown here was sheared from a buck belonging to Fey Johnson recently, by W. A. "Smokey" Manuel, on the Johnson ranch northwest of Goldthwaite. It measured 13½ by 9½ feet and weighed 22 pounds. According to Manuel it is the largest fleece he has ever sheared from one animal during his many years of sheep shearing. He stated that he has sheared many fleeces that weighed more but never one as large as this one which measured 38 feet around the outside. The fleece was reported as solid with no breaks.

Sheriff C. F. Stubblefield Arrests Man Charged With Murder At Austin

A man charged with murder in connection with the death of his wife, at Austin two weeks ago, was arrested at a tourist court near Goldthwaite last Saturday afternoon by Mills County Sheriff C. F. Stubblefield. The arrest was made by Stubblefield about 3:30 p. m., after receiving a state broadcast on police radio in search of the man.

He was arrested at a tourist court at Durenville on highway 84 north of Goldthwaite and was held in Mills County jail until early Sunday morning. At that time he was turned over to military police from Bergstrom Air Force Base and police officers from Austin.

The man was identified as 41-year-old Bergstrom Air Force Base Staff Sergeant, Louis Ervin White, according to

news dispatches from Austin. He was charged with murder if the court of Justice of the Peace at Austin Monday morning in connection with the death of his wife, Mrs. Mildred White, whose partially decomposed body was discovered in their Enfield studio apartment more than a week ago. Austin Police Chief said White made a "Complete" statement in connection with the case.

White had turned up AWOL at BFAB soon after the body of his wife was found.

Sheriff Stubblefield stated that White was armed when arrested and had been staying at the tourist court since checking in there Thursday morning. During that time his car was parked back of the cabin and he spent most of his time inside the cabin.

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GRASS ROOTS OPINION

Montpelier, Vermont, Evening Argus: "No one would be happier than Soviet Russia if the Catholics, Protestants and Jews of the United States could be brought to hate and distrust one another. It is a foremost objective of the Communists to stir up antagonisms and sow seeds of discord among the major religious groups."

Bellingham, Washington, Herald: "The Monroe Doctrine of 1823 warned European nations — then mostly monarchies — against attempts to get a further foothold in the Americas. That was a unilateral United States doctrine. But it stood the test of time. The 20th century version of the Monroe Doctrine was voted at the 10th Inter-American Conference at Caracas, Venezuela, when the American republics condemned the activities of the international Communist movement as foreign intervention in American affairs."

Hugo, Colorado, Eastern Plainsman: "Any time any one person or any group of persons receives a check from the federal government for any purpose or on any pretext, they can be sure somebody paid a lot more into the government for that check than it amounted to. See Korean War Resumed | Think Rhee Will Order
If Reds Win at Geneva | Force Into North Korea

WASHINGTON—The Korean war might start again if the Chinese Reds win a diplomatic victory at the forthcoming Geneva conference. Washington sources familiar with the views of South Korean President Syngman Rhee believe he will order his forces to move into North Korea if the Reds win any concessions at Geneva. Rhee has consistently threatened to "go-it-alone" to win unification of North and South Korea by force, if necessary.

While Secretary of State John Foster Dulles will go to the Geneva conference determined to treat the Chinese and Korean Communists as "aggressors" in the war, Rhee fears that the Reds will win a diplomatic victory in the eyes of the world.

If this happens, Rhee may act. The United States-South Korean Mutual Security Pact provides that the United States will go to South Korea's aid only if it is attacked by an aggressor. Some capital sources express concern, however, that Rhee may disregard this and attempt to unify North and South Korea by force. If this does happen, the United States will undoubtedly find itself fighting in Korea again—perhaps against Rhee's American-trained army.

● PRICE SUPPORTS—An informed observer predicts that Congress, with its very slender Republican control, will approve neither the flexible farm price support program nor the administration's Taft-Hartley Labor Law amendments.

This observer said there was a chance that the Senate might go along with the flexible price support system—although even this appears doubtful—but that the House will strongly support continuation of the 90 per cent rigid support system.

He added that the House may pass at least part of the Taft-Hartley amendments urged by President Eisenhower but that they will die in the Senate. He asserted: "The Republicans are not so anxious to alienate both the farm and labor vote that they will pass these bills."

It was also forecast that the best outlook for price supports is for a one-year extension of the present program, with a declaration urging a switch to another system next year.

● JUNKETEERING PROBES—Capitol Hill observers are wondering how the legislators will react to Rep. Clare Hoffman (R), Michigan, and his probe of congressional junkets overseas.

The globe-girdling trips by individual congressmen, and sometimes entire committees, are a touchy subject around Washington. Some insist that the trips provide valuable background material and a fresh approach to world problems.

Others have condemned the expeditions as paid holidays. Now the State department has told Hoffman it would be impossible to estimate how much it spends entertaining junketeering lawmakers.

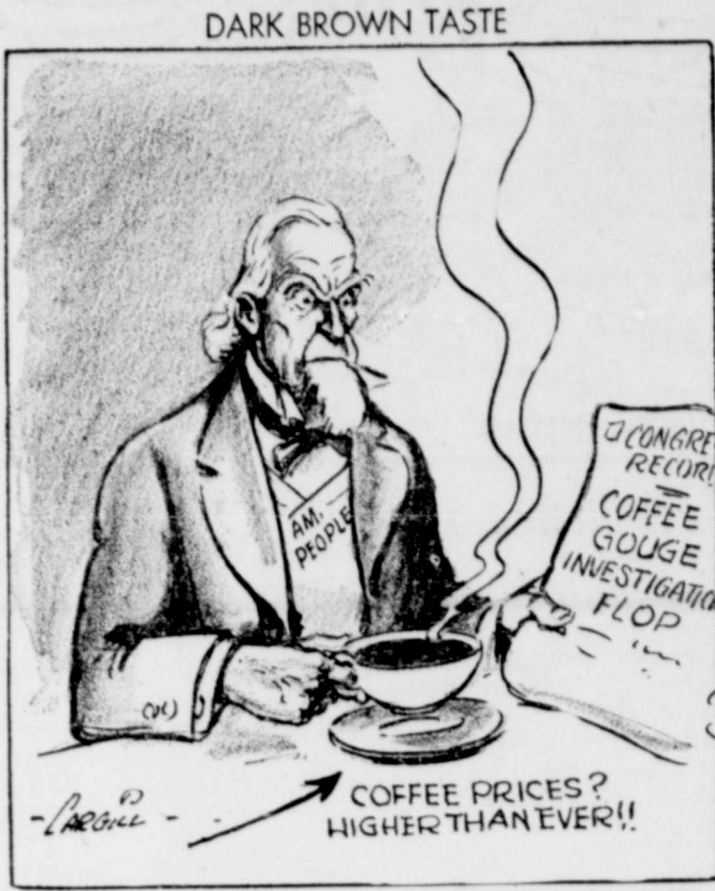
The State department also said that the congressmen have almost unlimited use of so-called counterpart funds—money which is deposited by many countries in partial return for American aid.

● IMMUNITY—A Supreme Court decision may finally put a halt to witnesses claiming constitutional immunity against testifying. The decision does not invalidate the Fifth Amendment, which protects a witness' right against testifying if the witness feels his testimony might tend to incriminate him under the law. Under this provision, many Communists have apparently sought, and obtained, legal protection against testifying.

In an effort to force a halt to this practice, proposals have been made to pass legislation granting immunity from criminal prosecution to witnesses, who would then be compelled to testify.

However, the proposals have run against this obstacle: immunity granted a witness from prosecution might extend only to federal, and not to state courts.

The Supreme Court has now ruled unanimously that the testimony given by a witness before a congressional committee can not be used in any court, state or federal, to convict him. This decision removes the major obstacle to enactment of immunity legislation.

A Variety of Salmon Recipes

- By ALICE DENHOFF**
- WHATEVER** the season, there's fine fare locked up in a can of salmon. Good by itself or in a salad, healthful canned salmon is the basis of many a delightful dish.
- Onions a la Basque**
For example, Stuffed Onions a la Basque. To serve 6, cook 10 medium onions in boiling water until tender. Make a mixture of a 1-lb. can of salmon, 2 tsp. chopped green pepper, 2 tsp. olive oil, salt and pepper to taste. Remove center from onions; fill with mixture. Dredge each onion slightly with flour and dip into 2 eggs, well beaten. Fry in hot fat (380° F.) until golden brown. Serve with Tomato Sauce.
- Special Tomato Sauce**
Want an especially nice tomato sauce? To make 1 1/4 c., melt 2 tsp. butter, add 1 diced onion, 2 tsp. flour and brown slightly. Gradually add 1 1/2 c. strained cooked tomato or 1 c. soup stock and 1/2 c. tomato puree; bring to boil, stirring constantly. Boil 3 to 4 min. Season to taste and serve hot. Makes about 1 1/4 c. of sauce that is smooth and good with meat balls, fish or similar dishes.
- From New Mexico comes Taos Salmon Challupas, the recipe to serve 4. This one, too, calls for its own sauce which we'll give you before we start on the main recipe.
- To make 1 1/2 c. Mexican Sauce for fish, cook 4 tsp. chopped onion in 1 tsp. olive oil until tender. Add 2 tsp. flour and allow to brown. Add 1/2 tsp. each salt and chili powder, 2 tsp. sugar, 1 tsp. vinegar, 1/2 lemon sliced thin, 1 tsp. chopped tender celery leaves, 1 tsp. chopped parsley and 1 c. tomato puree. Simmer about 10 min. Add 1 chopped hard-cooked egg.**
- Salmon-Corn Cakes**
To prepare the salmon-corn cakes, mix 1 c. each corn meal and boiling water and tsp. salt. Cook until slightly thickened. Cool; add 1 well-beaten egg and 1/2 lb. canned salmon, forming into patties for frying. Fry in hot fat. When brown on both sides, sprinkle a tsp. grated cheese on each patty and serve with sauce and slices of mild onion.
- Salmon Souffle, a dainty dish is the windup. It's a fine choice for luncheon or supper, the recipe to serve 4.**
- Dainty Dish**
Prepare a thick white sauce with 2 tsp. butter, 2 tsp. flour, 1/2 c. milk and 1/2 tsp. each salt, celery salt and paprika. Cool slightly; add 3 beaten egg yolks, and 1 c. fresh cooked or canned salmon (picked over and flaked). Cool, fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into a greased baking dish and bake at 375-400° F. about 30 min. Serve at once with or without an accompanying sauce.

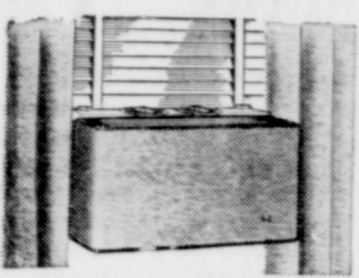

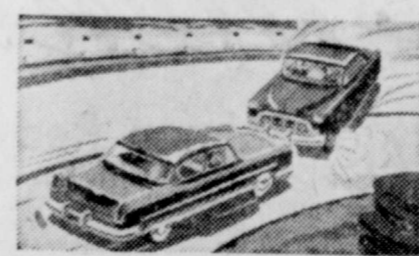

CRUCIAL WEEKS: The next two or three weeks are vital to Texas.

Weather experts, with whom I am in daily contact, tell me this is our best chance to break the drought. They may be wrong. But a check of their records indicates we may be starting a

brief but lifesaving rain cycle.

At this writing, a good part of Texas has had some rain. Some areas have had too much rain—flooding rains that wash away topsoil and escape before they can be trapped. Other areas have had gentle, soaking rains—the kind that mean life to thirsty crops. Some areas have had only "teasers"—light precipitation.

At the beginning of April, 1,587,000 acres of Texas soil were suffering from moderate to severe wind erosion. Even more significant, 5,416,000 acres were about ready to blow because of insufficient or inadequate cover.

It will take a lot of rain to make up for the months and years of drought. In some areas, 10 to 12 inches will be needed to restore the soil.

By the time you read this, we should know what the future holds—whether the rains will continue or whether they are just a freak of nature. Either way, however, we have had a clear and unmistakable warning. We can expect no mercy from nature if we ignore it.

WHAT HAPPENS if the Rains NO NOT Continue? The facts are ominous and forboding. The government keeps figures on dust storms in which visibility is reduced to a mile or less. In the "dust bowl" year of 1936, there were 68 such storms in Texas and Oklahoma; in 1937 there were 72 (the all-time high mark); in 1938, there were 61.

In 1953, there were 41 dust storms in Oklahoma and the

Texas Panhandle. Up to March 20, of this year, there were 21 dust storms. If this rate should continue, it will be the worst year on record.

WHAT CAN WE DO? There are few emergency measures available. I am urging approval of a bill by Senator Eugene Millikin, Chairman of the Republican Conference Committee, and other colleagues to appropriate \$15,000,000 for wind erosion measures. This money would be used to make payments to farmers who carry out control measures. By and large, this would consist of "chiseling"—turning up clods of sub-surface soil that still retain some moisture. The payments could not exceed one dollar per acre.

LONG RANGE MEASURES ARE NEEDED! We need small dams to trap water when it rains and reservoirs to store it against drought. We especially need those dams up-stream! I have introduced one bill for up-stream development. A Senate Subcommittee is studying that measure right now.

What else do we need? Overall development of the water resources of our state. Last summer, the Rio Grande ran dry at Laredo almost on the same day the President released funds for repairing flood damage at Orange. Somehow, we should be able to get together on this one.

There have been plenty of plans; plenty of surveys. But the plans and the surveys mean nothing unless we all unite and roll up our shirtsleeves and get to work.

We all want to leave something to our children. The most precious gift within our power is the soil. The hydrogen bomb can destroy life. It is both gruesome and dramatic. But soil erosion—though not dramatic—can make life impossible to maintain!

We can go to work now and save the future for posterity. Or we can let things slide and pile up more trouble for the future. Somehow, I think Texans will take the first course!

PARENT PROBLEMS

Benefits of Reading to Child

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

FOR years, in this column, I've been urging parents to read to the young child, usually beginning this before he is two and continuing indefinitely, long after he has entered school.

Some of us can remember the time when story-telling was solely and constantly emphasized in literature on educating children. Those trained to teach at the kindergarten and primary levels were given courses and periods of practice in telling stories to young children. Children's librarians were richly trained in story-telling, and most public libraries held regular periods for telling stories, attracting large groups of young children. Some libraries are doing this still, apparently with good effect.

Modern Concern

But the modern librarian, dealing with literature for young children, is more and more concerned with helping young parents grow familiar with books from which they and others at home may read to little children.

Apparently, the rapid appearance of attractive books which children from six to nine like to read has stimulated the eagerness of preschool children in listening to reading. (My bulletin, "Books From Which To Read to the Young Child," may be had by sending a self-addressed, stamped envelope to me in care of this newspaper.)

Unfamiliar Practice

When you were a school child in the grades, certainly when your parents or grandparents were, it was almost unheard of for a teacher to read to the students. Several decades ago, this practice

was even frowned upon by some educators.

But within the last ten years, I myself have heard teachers in various parts of the United States reading to children in classes from the kindergarten through senior high school.

Enthusiastic Student

When my youngest son was in high school, he often expressed great enthusiasm over the way one of his teachers read from Shakespeare in his class at school. A few times, he asked me to listen while he read to me certain selections she had made interesting to him. You may know some families in which older children and their parents read to one another for sheer enjoyment.

In the December issue of the Journal of the National Educational Association, I find an article called "Let's Read to the Children," by Herbert J. Farris, a teacher, who expresses great enthusiasm concerning teachers reading to children at school for their education and enjoyment. It is difficult to imagine such an article in any educational journal twenty-five years ago.

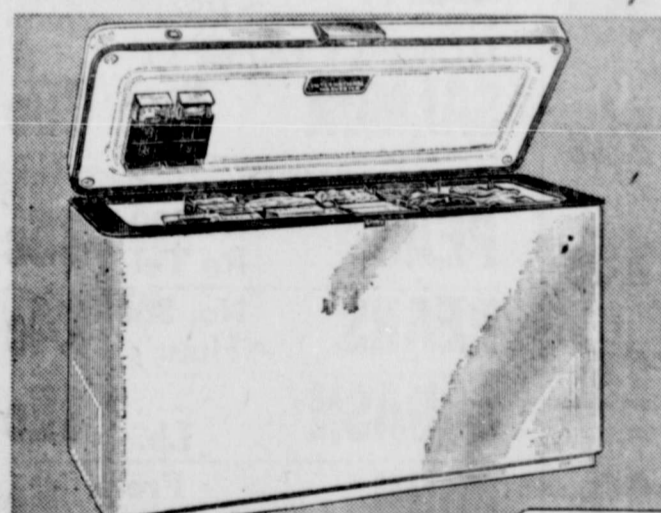
When I was helping train teachers in Cleveland, Ohio, in the late twenties, I was able to get some principals and teachers to induce a few poor readers of the upper grades to read aloud to small groups of kindergarten and first graders. They selected children who could read very well at these levels, but read very badly in their own grades. The result was great enjoyment by the listeners, great improvement by the readers. Some of those same teachers and principals are, I understand, carrying on this practice still.

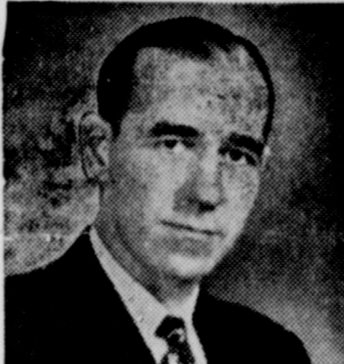

Local Sheriff And District Attorney To Attend Law Enforcement Meeting

Austin, (Spec.)— C. F. Stubbiefield, Sheriff of Mills County and Raymond Thornton, District Attorney, are invited to attend the Attorney General's Fourth Annual Conference on Law Enforcement at Baylor University in Waco, April 26, 27 and 28.

Attorney General John Ben Shepperd called the annual meeting to discuss problems and new methods of prosecutors, judges and peace officers of Texas.

The meeting will be jointly sponsored by the Attorney General's Office and the School of Law of Baylor.

The Texas statutes authorize the Attorney General to

Convene law enforcement officials in order to determine law enforcement practices and policies.

Over 400 law enforcement officers are expected to attend from every part of the state. Included among those present will be Justices of the Court of Criminal Appeals, District and County Judges, District and County Attorneys' Sheriffs, Police Chiefs, Justices of the Peace and Constables. Last year's meeting held in Austin was attended by 315 delegates.

Attorney General Shepperd explained that the conference has been enlarged this year from two to three days of business meetings.

state-wide crime report, prison and jail problems, control of narcotics, juvenile delinquency, lie detector techniques, hot check legislation and trial and appeal of criminal cases.

Featured speakers will include William J. Jameson, President of the American Bar Association and Erle Stanley Gardner, Attorney and Novelist.

Shepperd said that General Manager O. B. Ellis of the Texas Prison System will discuss methods and value of rehabilitating convicted criminals. David B. Irons of the United States Department of Justice will discuss federal control of subversives.

"This conference is a practical means for law enforcement officials to exchange ideas on crime fighting," Shepperd pointed out. "And the attendance of local officials at this meeting will be of great value to them, the State and the specific area which they serve."

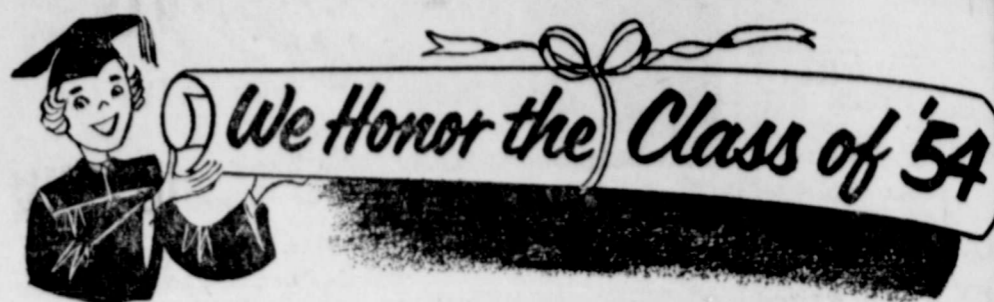

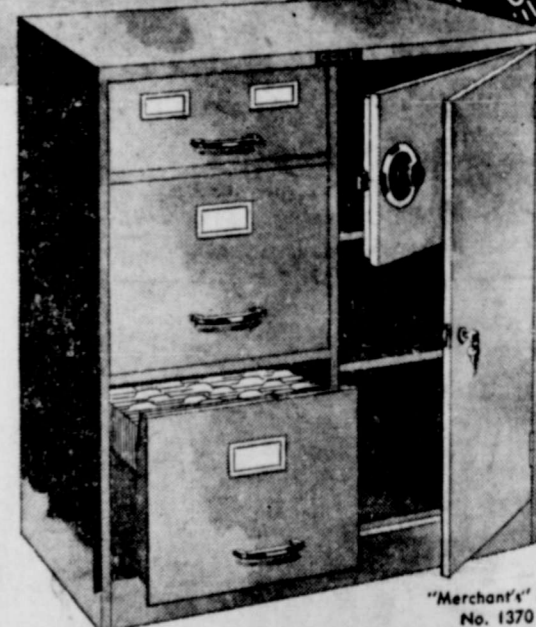
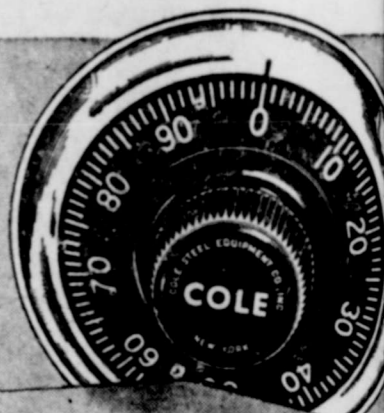
