ADDITIONAL DROUTH AID REQUESTED

The situation remains serious ond straight year. The problem still remains unsolved.

Governors from five states, including Texas, met in Washington recently to place their recommendations before the national administration. Their wind problems in disaster areas. This amount would be in addi- stricken area. tion to the \$195 million already earmarked for the agricultural conservation subsidy program

The \$15 million figure is not an unreasonable sum. It would go a long way in relieving the strain imposed by the threeyear dry spell. However, hte request was not accompanied by any concrete recommendations | as to how the money should be used.

The governors frankly admitted they had made no attempt to find any long-range solution to the dust bowl threat and added that the requested sum would cover "emergency and immediate" problems for the next two months, only. It was not stipulated whether this would be by direct relief grants

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
