Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Sees Commercial Shipping Top User of Atom Energy Rep. Carl Hinshaw Points Out Advantages of A-fuel

WASHINGTON—A top congressional expert believes that commercial shipping may prove to be the greatest user of atomic energy on a peacetime basis and virtually revolutionize ocean travel in the future. The opinion is firmly held by Rep. Carl Hinshaw (R., California), who heads a congressional subcommittee studying the possibility of non-military use of atomic power.

Hinshaw emphasizes that "reactors" turning out enough heat to provide steam power for commercial vessels will be completed in the next two or three years. While a pound of uranium-235 to generate the power costs about \$10,000, Hinshaw is convinced that it will still prove to be an economical fuel for ships. He points out that a pound of U-235 can produce as much heat as 2,600,000 pounds of coal. With this in mind, Hinshaw cites these factors as making shipping a logical beneficiary of the Atomic Age: 1—Atomic power will permit a substantial increase in the amount of cargo that could be carried by a ship because no conventional fuel load would be required. The space saving on this alone could amount to one-third of present capacities. 2—A half-day's time required for refueling at the end of each voyage could be saved. 3—Since the atoms are tireless, ships with nuclear power could operate at almost maximum speed both day and night and they wouldn't require a fuel change more than once every 12 months.

THE ATOM IS BIG BUSINESS—The mushroom growth of the Atomic Energy commission since it first received funds in 1940 is graphically illustrated in a new booklet issued by the agency. The booklet notes that in 1940, \$6,000 was made available by the government for the purchase of materials needed for laboratory studies of nuclear fission.

Today, the program receives billions in appropriations from Congress and the AEC directs an industry employing 80,000 workers. Of these, 6,700 are government workers and in addition, 70,000 other employees are used for the construction of new production facilities. The booklet, entitled Selling to the AEC, was issued to inform businessmen on procedures for selling their products to the agency.

Among the products which the AEC lists among its needs are animals, cages, helmets, goggles, elevators, film, cranes, food, glass, metals, paints, plastics, playground equipment, school supplies, railroad equipment, sewing machines, shrubbery and other landscaping materials, X-ray equipment and, naturally, chemicals of all types.

FAST FOOTWORK—Page boys in the Senate and House are as fleet-footed a group of youngsters as can be found outside of a track meet. At the snap of a legislative finger, they bound off at a rapid trot or run errands for congressmen which can take them from one end of the Capitol to the other.

One of the Senate pages is not only fast afoot, he's curious, too. He recently attached a pedometer to himself to get an accurate count on how much mileage he covers per day at legislative behest.

He clocked himself from the time he left the Capitol Page school to report for work in the Senate chamber to the moment the presiding senator banged the gavel for adjournment.

At the end of the day, he found his pedometer had recorded 10 miles of travel on his part but he wasn't impressed. As he told a friend later, "It was a light day."

MORE FOOTWORK AFOOT—And page boys aren't the only ones who get footwork. The American Automobile association has reported that more than two million United States motorists ran out of gas and had to appeal for help last year.

In addition, the AAA said that run-down batteries stranded another nine million motorists who had to receive emergency aid on the highways. On the brighter side, the agency reported that emergency calls for members who become stuck in the mud are now almost negligible.

# LONE STAR Agriculture

By John C. White, Commissioner

## A SURPLUS DISPOSAL PLAN

There is a simple solution to the surplus of grain which is causing our storage facilities to bulge at the seams.

That solution is—sell it! Sell it to the highest bidder even if the price will be below the support paid by the federal government.

Such action would recover at least a part of the taxpayers' dollars paid out on this program and, in addition, it would produce some positive results which would more than make up the difference in money lost.

The benefits from such a plan are these:

(1) It would bring the cost of such feeds down to the level of the farmers pocketbook and have the feed into consumption where it ought to be.

(2) Provide storage space for upcoming crops, thus relieving a serious storage situation at the beginning of wheat harvest.

(3) Save taxpayer money on new warehouse construction.

(4) Make money for grain and cotton farmers by providing them with storage for their crops.

ing them with storage for their crops.

(5) Save taxpayers millions, perhaps billions, of dollars, because they would realize a return from products now off the market and which are now an expensive dead weight.

(6) Solve serious drought relief problems for cattlemen.

(7) Will not interfere with normal trade in feed products.

Selling our surpluses for drought relief measures may sound too simple for those who like to do things the hard way. Yet costs of feed for hungry cattle is too high in relation to the sale market.

Such a situation means we must either raise the price of cattle or lower the price of feed. Either would bring relief, but raising the price of cattle would be complicated and obviously require direct subsidies.

The proposition of lowering feed costs has not been studied except as federal relief programs involving reams of red tape, allotments and expensive administration. On the other hand, the plan of placing surplus feeds on the open market would be simple, direct and entail no government interference or controls on farmers or businessmen.

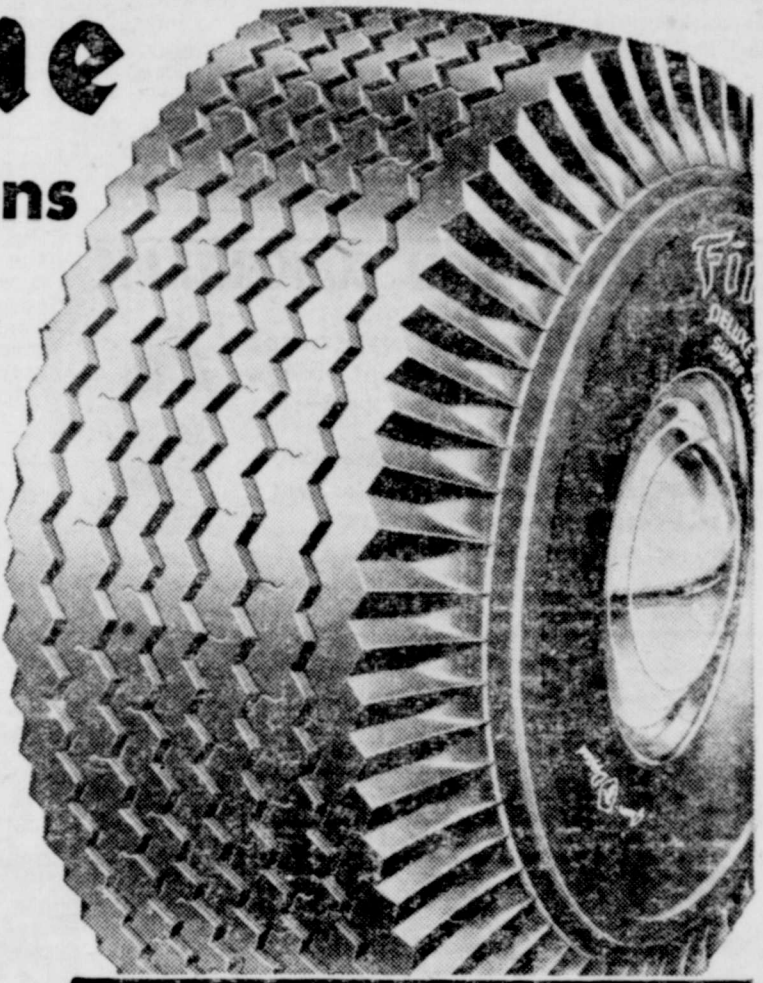

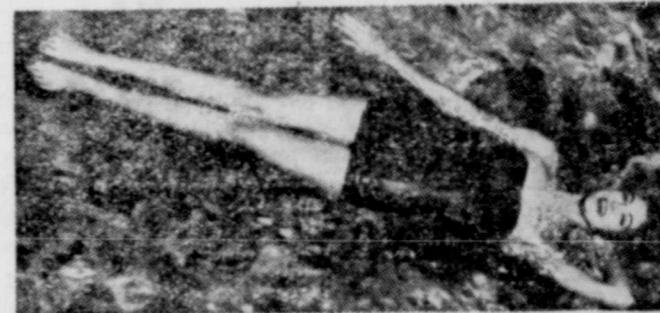

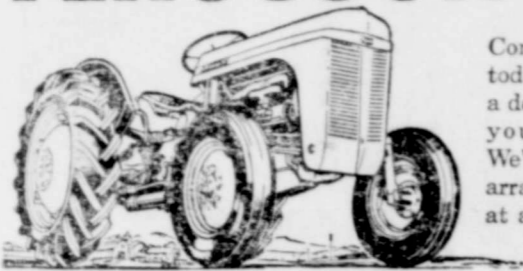
