Two Injured When Roll-Away Truck Crashes Through Bedroom Saturday

Mrs. J. A. Vines of Rt. 1, Goldthwaite, received painful injuries early Saturday morning when a 1950 Ford F8 tractor-trailer rolled through the bedroom where she and a niece were sleeping.

The accident happened about 1:30 a.m. The tractor-trailer driven by J. H. Waggoner of Abilene, had been parked by him on the east side of U. S. Highway 84, across the highway from the Durenville cafe.

After the driver had left the truck, it began to roll. It traveled north for about 200 yards, crossed the highway and ran into the bedroom of the J. A. Vines home. It stopped with the tractor through the bedroom on one side and the trailer on the other side.

Mrs. Vines was taken to the Brownwood Memorial Hospital. The attending physician reported she sustained three fractured ribs, multiple cuts and lacerations about the face and chest, and multiple bruises over the body. He said she had a severe glass stab wound in the upper right portion of the chest which almost severed her arm.

Wanell Calder, 7, niece of Mrs. Vines, was spending the night with her as her husband was away from home on a trip. The young girl suffered a dislocated left shoulder, the attending physician said. Both persons were hospitalized.

The tractor-trailer belongs to Central Hide & Rendering Co. of Wichita Falls and was working out of the Abilene branch office.

Damage to the truck was estimated at \$200. It was estimated that damage to the house would amount to \$1,500.

Mills County Sheriff C. F. (Stub) Stubblefield of Goldthwaite was investigating officer on the accident.

District 23 Highway Construction Program Is Approved For 1955-1956

Mills County is slated to receive the largest single expenditure project in district 23 highway reconstruction program for the 1955-56 period, out of a three and one half million dollar primary program that has been announced in Austin by the Texas Highway Commission.

The program for Mills County covers \$720,000.00 to be spent on a distance of some 18 miles on State Highway 16, from Comanche County line south to U. S. Highway 84 near Goldthwaite. This project calls for grading, structures and surfacing.

Robert J. Milligan of Brownwood, District Engineer, said purpose of the Consolidated Highway Program is to set out specific projects on which construction is contemplated in order that engineering work,

plan preparation and specifications may proceed and right of way be secured.

Plans for highway work were prepared and submitted by members of the District 23 offices in Brownwood and were approved by the Texas Highway Commission.

Mr. Milligan said it is considered desirable to get this planning work under way in anticipation of funds that would be made available to the Highway department for the construction of this program of work.

Resident engineer, Glenn G. Trotter, of Goldthwaite will be in charge of work in this area.

Other projects in the proposed program of work are located in Eastland, Stephens Comanche, Lampasas and Brown counties.

Hope He Got 'em!

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Republican Congress O.K.'s | He's Senator Harry F. Byrd, Democrat's Probe of Agencies | Long Advocate of Economy

WASHINGTON-In a city where the unusual is quite often the normal thing, a Democratic senator is conducting a major investigation of Republican agencies. He is doing it with the sanction of a Republican Congress!

Never before in history has such a thing occurred, yet no undue alarm is being shown by Republican leaders over the Democratic-led probe. They expect a non-political investigation.

Who is this Democrat in whom the Republicans impose such trust? He is Senator Harry Flood Byrd of Virginia, only Democrat ever to head a committee in a Republican Congress.

Byrd is now engaged in a painstaking investigation of the administration's scandal-ridden Federal Housing administration. This agency is entrusted with the task of underwriting billions of dollars worth of private housing construction and repair work.

There are estimates that as much as \$500 million in exorbitant profits have gone to unscrupulous builders who obtained excessive loans through the FHA and pocketed the difference between the actual cost of a housing project and the larger loan.

WHILE BYRD IS ENGAGED IN HIS PROBE,

another Senate committee, that on banking and currency, is garnering the headlines. This committee, headed by Senator Homer Capehart (R), Indiana, has legislative jurisdiction over housing. However, Byrd's joint committee on reduction of non-essential federal expenditures has been doing undercover work on the housing scandals for more than a year.

An aide has said the group, unique in that it is the only regular committee of Congress to contain House, Senate and executive branch representatives, will complete its investigation and then submit a detailed report on its findings.

The committee works with a limited staff, has no investigators, and has requested no additional money for the probe. Whenever it finds indications of tax violations, it turns the matter over to the Internal Revenue service for investigation.

The committee does the same when it turns up criminal violations, turning the evidence over to the Justice department. Essentially, the committee is a one-man operation, the one man, of course, being Byrd. This unusual committee was created by Congress in October 1941 to see what could be done to bring about economy in government. Byrd sponsored the resolution establishing the committee and has been its chairman ever since.

IN 1947, WHEN THE REPUBLICANS TOOK OVER Congress for a two-year term, Byrd offered to resign, but Republican leaders did not take up his offer. However, they neglected to furnish the committee with any funds.

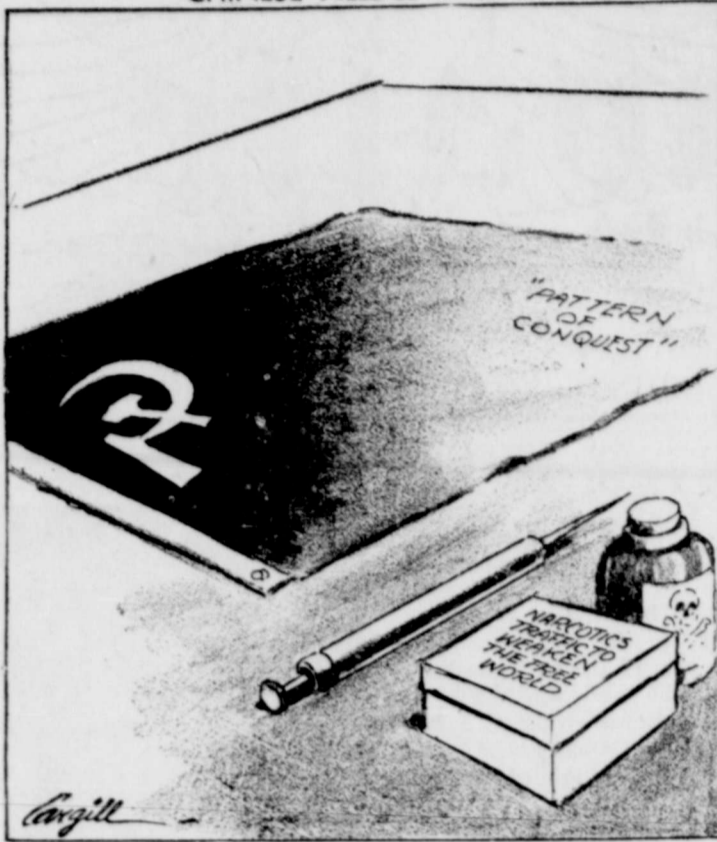
This did not faze the Virginia senator, long known as Congress' leading advocate of economy in government. He proceeded to conduct the committee without funds, using his own office staff to operate it.

When the Republicans took over again in 1953, no move was made to supplant Byrd as chairman. This time the Republicans voted funds for his committee.

Byrd's supporters say the Senator has saved the country billions of dollars by keeping tab on federal expenditures. Byrd estimated on one occasion that his committee saved the government \$1.3 billion in a single year during the war.

If some of our readers saved the copy of rules from last week they will probably want to keep this, also, to make their rules and information more complete.

WHERE TORNADES CAN OCCUR

Any place in the United States at any time of the year. They happen most frequently in the midwestern, southern and central states from March through September.

HOW OFTEN DO THEY OCCUR

The records show that the average number of tornadoes varies from 20 per year (Kansas) to one in thirty-seven years (Nevada).

HOW TO RECOGNIZE A TORNADE

Usually observed as a funnel-shaped cloud, spinning rapidly, and extending toward the earth from the base of a thundercloud. When close by, it sounds like the roar of hundreds of airplanes.

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TORNADO "WEATHER". Hot, sticky days with southerly winds and a threatening, ominous sky. However, many such days occur without tornadoes.

CLOUDS. Familiar thunder storm clouds are present. An hour or two before a tornado, topsy-turvy clouds appear sometimes bulging down instead of up. The clouds often have a greenish black color.

PRECIPITATION. Rain, frequently hail, preceding the tornado, with a heavy downpour after it has passed.

TIME OF DAY. Mostly between 3 and 7 p. m., but they have occurred at all hours.

DIRECTION OF TRAVEL. In nearly all cases they move from south west to northeast.

LENGTH OF PATH. Usually 10 to 40 miles, but they may move forward for 300 miles.

WIDTH OF PATH. 300 to 400 yards, but they have cut swaths over a mile in width.

SPEED OF TRAVEL. 25 to 40 miles per hour average, but they have varied from 5 to 139 miles per hour.

WIND SPEED. Estimated as high as 500 miles per hour within the tornado.

CAUSES OF DESTRUCTION

(1) Violent winds which uproot trees, destroy buildings and which create a serious hazard from objects blown through the air.

(2) Differences in air pressure which can lift automobiles and cause buildings to collapse.

Mrs. J. M. Oglesby has sent us some excerpts taken from the June issue of Reader's Digest which she feels will be of interest to many of our friends and acquaintances. It states: "German scientists arriving in Washington for a conference on bacteriological warfare, brought a secret derogatory report that the Kremlin seems more worried about U. S. activities at Camp Detrick, Md., than Atomic tests in the Marshall Islands. Scientists at Camp Detrick have perfected airborne crop-killing germs that could starve enemy's population." Glenda is one of the leading bacteriologists at Camp Detrick. In the May meeting of national scientists at Pittsburgh, Penn., she gave the report for the camp.

Hearty Main Courses To Satisfy the Menfolk

By ALICE DENHOFF

MEALS are lighter now, with plenty of fresh salads, fresh fruits and vegetables. But the hearty main course is still essential, particularly when the household includes very active members. Hardworking menfolk, especially, like to come home to a good dinner built around a hearty but not heavy main course, such as the following excellent veal special.

Spicy Veal Dish

To serve 4, melt 4 tbsp. fat in a heavy skillet. Cut a garlic clove in halves and cook in the hot fat until soft. Dredge 4 veal chops or steaks with flour; brown in hot fat.

Remove garlic; drain off fat. Sprinkle meat with salt and pepper. Combine 1 can tomato sauce with 1/2 c. water, tsp. oregano or marjoram and 2 tsp. sugar. Pour mixture over meat. Cover and cook over low heat until tender—about 1 hr.

Break for the Budget

A satisfying main course, and a thrifty one, too, is meat balls with Spanish rice.

For 4 servings, combine 1 lb ground beef, 1 slightly beaten egg, 1/2 c. fine dry bread crumbs, 1/2 c. milk, 1/2 c. ketchup, 1 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. pepper, 1 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce and tsp. chili

powder. Shape mixture into 12 balls. Brown on all sides in 1/4 c. hot fat in a 10-in. skillet or Dutch oven, turning carefully. Remove meat balls.

Browned Rice

Lightly brown 1/2 c. uncooked rice in hot fat; add 1/2 c. chopped onion and 2 tbsp. chopped green pepper and cook until tender. Stir in 1 1/2-oz. can tomato soup, 1 1/2 c. water, 3 whole cloves, 1 small bay leaf, 3/4 tsp. salt and 2 tsp. sugar. Cover and cook over low heat for 35 min., stirring this frequently.

Add meat balls, pushing them well down into the rice. Cover and continue cooking 10 min. longer.

Tamale Casserole

Tamale Casserole is another thrifty dish that is a favorite with the menfolk.

For 6 servings, brown 3/4 lb. ground beef in 2 tbsp. hot fat. Drain off fat and add 1/2 c. chopped ripe olives, an 8-oz. can cream style corn (or 1 c.), 1/2 c. ketchup, 1/4 c. chopped green pepper, 1/4 c. finely chopped onion, 2 tsp. salt, 1 1/2 tsp. chili powder, 1/2 c. cornmeal, 1 c. milk and 1 slightly beaten egg.

Pour mixture into a greased 1 1/2-qt. casserole and bake, uncovered, at 350° F. for 1 1/4 hr.

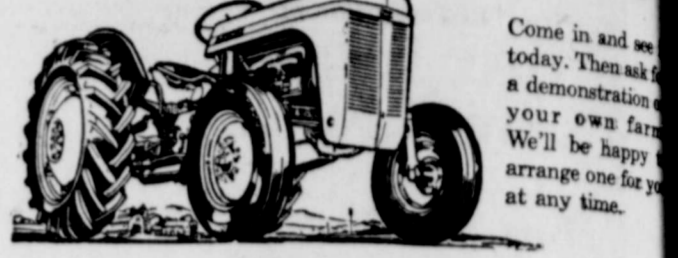

Other sub-watersheds in the Middle Colorado have been plan-

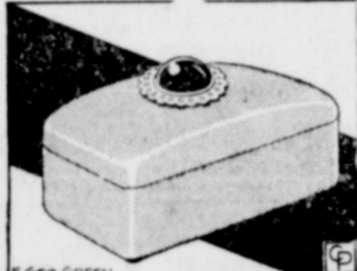
ned and are ready for construction. Construction has started on four of the 46 planned structures on Brady Creek near Brady.

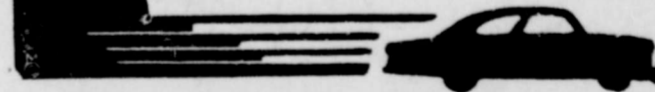

COMMUNIST PATTERN: It seems clear that the communist aggression in Indo-China and the shipment of Iron Curtain arms to Guatemala are pieces of a pattern -- a pattern designed to keep the United States off balance in the months ahead.

COURSE OF ACTION: Obviously, we cannot police the whole world. American soldiers cannot act as fire brigades rushing to stamp out flames spurring up at isolated corners of the globe.

That would be a fruitless undertaking. It would exhaust

both our economic strength and our manpower.

We have to pick and choose. We must select the ground upon which we will stand -- and know clearly just who will stand with us.

We do not want to abandon any unwilling people to communist tyranny -- nor should we. We do not want to break relations with countries that are our friends and allies -- nor should we.

Nevertheless, we must take a long, cool look at the realities of the world today.

HARD TASK: Our foreign policy is a complicated network of alliances, pacts and understandings which have been put together in the last few years. Some parts of that network have worked well. Some parts have been severely strained. Some may have failed altogether.

We must examine this network and determine the strengths and the weaknesses. Perhaps some parts should be propped up. Perhaps others should be abandoned altogether.

It is not a job to be accomplished in a day or a week. It is a hard, plugging task that

will take time -- even though we cannot afford too much time.

But it must be done. And the first step in doing it must be the promotion of national unity.

The times call for a bipartisan review -- in a nonpartisan spirit -- of our whole foreign policy.

REASON TOGETHER: We need to recall and act upon the Biblical injunction from Isaiah: "Come now and let us reason together."

As Americans, we have our agreements and our disagreements. Regardless of that, I am convinced practically all Americans hold one objective in common. That is peace and freedom for our country.

It is not an abstract objective. It means an opportunity to plan for the future. It means security for our children. It means liberty in thought and in deed for our posterity.

Most Americans, I am confident, want these things for themselves. I believe they also want them for their fellow-Americans.

We can attain them by uniting in mutual confidence and

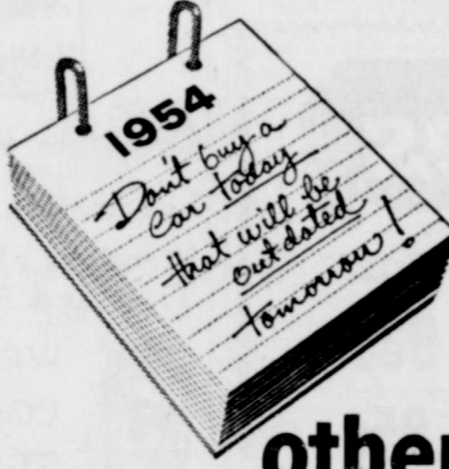

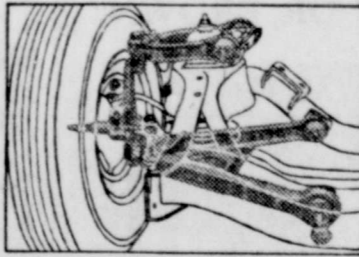

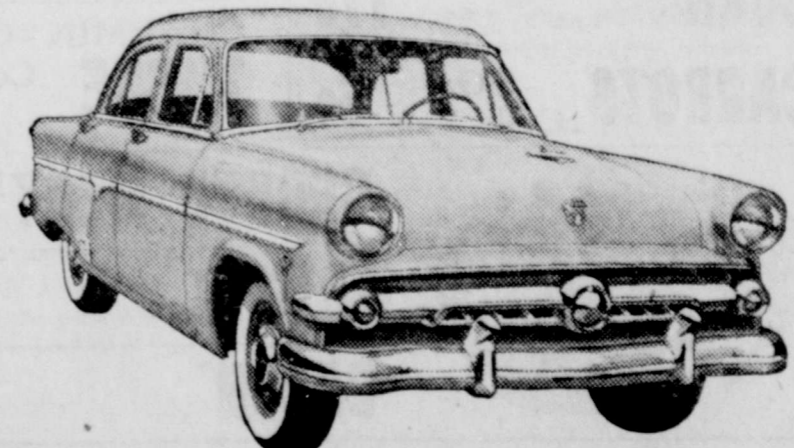

Your Red Cross Blood Program

"There is an ever-increasing need for blood to save human lives."

Dr. Howard A. Rusk, Chairman of Office of Defense Mobilization Health Resources Advisory Committee, said, "We must look to the American People to donate this blood so that we can tend the ill or critically injured men, women, and children of our civilian population; assure adequate reserves of blood derivatives to meet any emergency or natural disaster or atomic attack; and help save the lives of wounded servicemen recuperating in American hospitals. There is no substitute for human blood. It can come only as a donation from patriotic citizens.

"We are only at the first stage of new and important uses for blood derivatives. Gamma Globulin which is a temporary preventative in fighting the crippling effects of poliomyelitis is one of the recent major discoveries. Serum albumin, another blood fraction, has proven effective in shock therapy. The end of shooting in Korea reduced the quantity of blood required for the armed forces, but it did not lessen the great need for this precious fluid for other useful purposes.

GETTING RID OF WASPS

There are at least 2,500 different kinds of wasps inhabiting North America--- But don't bother to count them. Only about 50 species annoy man.

The rest of the wasp go about their appointed ways building nests, raising young and pollinating plants. They prey on other insects and eventually become a meal for some larger insect or bird, themselves. Even the pesky types do a certain amount of good in nature's scheme of things.

Still, the natural value of a wasp is small consolation when nursing a stinging red wheel on the face or hands. They have a nasty habit of building their nest too close to the barn or house for personal comfort. And when you want to get rid of them, you get rid of them. Here's how:

Chlordane or DDT is an excellent eradicator of the pest, according to entomologists who make a living by knowing such things. They make it sound deceptively simple--- just spray the dust or liquid into nests openings. But a little skill and lots of luck might come in handy. A second way is safer.

Suppose you have a nest of hornets or yellow jackets that guards your barn door with a vengeance. The best time to plan your attack is at night when the insects are less active. This provides maximum protection --- or at least minimum risk.

First --- and this is where opening with a wad of cotton soaked in carbon tetrachloride. Then, very quickly dislodge the nest into a sack. Been stung yet?

Now the sack can be burned or buried. Or if you prefer, pop

it into an airtight can containing a few tablespoons of carbon tetrachloride. Used on cotton wadding, carbon tetrachloride slows down the activity of these pests and lessens the chance for painful stings. In an airtight can, it's fatal. But don't open the can for 24 hours lest a particularly hardy hornet revive and seek out its tormentor.

If all this seems like too much trouble, try the other method. Just spray the nest with chlordane or DDT, then run like fury.

Incidentally, old fashioned bluing is good for stings.
