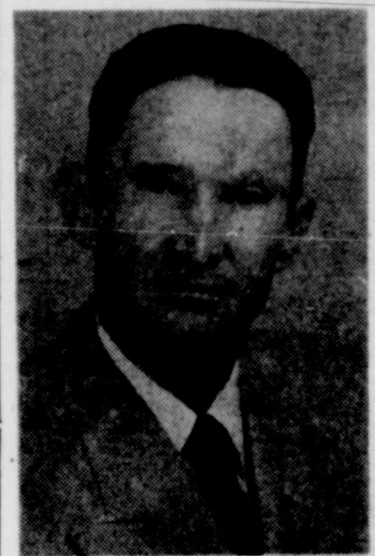

Another encouraging note of this meeting was a report that fewer loans are being rejected than previously in spite of the drought and uncertain prices on some livestock.

The association serves an eight county area including McCulloch, Mason, Gillespie, Llano, Burnet, Lampasas, Mills, and San Saba.

## Color Film Of First H-Bomb Is Now Available

Congressman O. C. Fisher has authorized this newspaper to announce that a 30-minute film in technicolor of the first hydrogen bomb test in history may be borrowed for local showing by writing him in Washington.

The 16-mm film, purchased by Fisher from the Atomic Energy Commission, was made by the Air Force during the "Operation Ivy" test in the South Pacific. It will be recalled that after viewing the spectacular explosion, a sailor wrote home that "an island disappeared".

Fisher says he thinks it would be a good thing if every American could see this showing of the destructive power of the H-bomb. He is making the film available to schools, clubs, or other gatherings for programs or special occasions.

Soviet Union May Lose Chance at Olympic Games | Break With Australians May Bar Russian Athletes

WASHINGTON—The Russian decision to break off diplomatic relations with Australia because the wife of a Soviet embassy official decided at the last moment to join her husband as a refugee from Communism may cost the USSR dearly in sports prestige in 1956.

Unless the rupture is healed, it may well mean that the Soviet Union will not be represented at the Olympic Games in Melbourne two years from now.

Moscow propagandists have been eagerly anticipating that the international games would afford them a tremendous opportunity to impress the world with Russian athletic prowess. On the basis of their exceptional showing in the 1952 games, the Soviets were considered a good bet to outscore the United States on the unofficial team scoring at the Australian Olympiad.

However, invitations to the games are entirely up to the host country and if Australia chooses not to do so, no invitation will be sent the Russians.

On the other hand, the Australians, with a fine record of international good sportsmanship, may decide to ignore the diplomatic break between the two governments and invite the Soviets to participate anyway.

SURE THING—Democratic leaders have subtly refrained from bragging about it, but there's a feeling among them that they can't lose no matter what the eventual result of the Army-McCarthy controversy proves to be.

That cocksureness stems from a simple fact: In this furore, a GOP senator is pitted against a Republican administration. Whichever is the loser, the Democrats anticipate a decision of which they can make political capital come the November congressional elections.

Conversely, Republican leaders are convinced that the televised hearings starring Senator Joseph R. McCarthy (R), Wisconsin, and Army Secretary Robert T. Stevens hurt the party.

For one thing, the constant squabbling and public airing of dirty linen pointed up disunity within the GOP. Also, the issues involved appeared unseemly for a party which campaigned against Communism and corruption.

A Capitol Hill wag put it this way, "It's got so bad we ought to have called Harry Truman back to clean up the mess." This reference to the GOP's own campaign slogan is the sort of thing which has the Democrats gloating; the GOP worrying.

That is a major reason why Republicans on the Senate investigations subcommittee tried so hard to bring the hearings to a close.

SOONER THAN YOU THINK—Color motion pictures on television with 19-inch color tubes will be within financial reach of present-day black-and-white set owners by 1956. That's the prediction of industry leaders who demonstrated new color TV equipment to the Federal Communications commission.

Members of the commission saw the new 19-inch tube presenting large screen color TV pictures generated by DuMont's device dubbed the color multi-scanner. The multi-scanner presents color movies over TV from 16-mm. film.

Small screen color TV receivers are now priced at \$1,000 and up. However, DuMont executives say their new tube not only presents a clear color image of large size, but has the potential of economical mass production. As a result, they predict reasonably-priced, large-scale receivers will be available within a couple of years.

The color multi-scanner will enable most broadcasters to present a wide variety of color television programs from film with a relatively low investment in equipment, or at least that's the forecast.

**TODAY'S Menu**  
Flavor with Lemon Juice

By ALICE DENHOFF

A FEW drops of tangy lemon juice is a good ingredient at any time of year—in the winter to supply precious vitamin C and in summer to add a tart, distinctive and refreshing flavor to many foods.

For a good trick, try adding a few drops of lemon juice to the water when boiling rice. This keeps the rice white and ever so fluffy.

**Versatile Lemon Juice**

And a few drops of lemon juice sprinkled on dried fruits before feeding through the chopper prevents the chopper from clogging.

Add 2 tsp. lemon juice to a cup of fresh cream and you have sour cream when it's not available, but a recipe calls for it. Likewise, 2 tsp. of lemon juice added to a cup of fresh milk turns the milk sour for sour milk recipes.

**Raspberry Soup**

Now for some fine recipes geared to the season such as a delectable Chilled Raspberry Soup to add joy and color to a summer luncheon.

To serve 4-6, combine a 12-oz. package frozen raspberries and 2½ c. water in a saucepan and bring to a boil. Cook, covered, over low heat 20 min. or until fruit is soft. Strain. Add 1½ c. apple juice, 1 tsp. sugar, dash each of salt and nutmeg and 1½

tbsp. cornstarch dissolved in 1¼ tsp. cold water. Bring to boil, cooking until clear and stirring constantly.

Chill and add ¼ c. lemon juice, stirring well. Serve very cold, topped with whipped cream.

Madrilene, that favorite summer soup, can be very tasty or it can be a matter-of-fact concoction. Frequently, unfortunately, it is the latter.

For a really good version, combine in a saucepan, a 10½-oz. can each consommé and chicken consommé, 1¼ c. tomato juice and ¼ c. lemon juice. Heat and serve immediately. Serves 4-6.

**Succulent Spareribs**

Many of us, especially the men-folk, are sparerib eaters the year round.

For a summer version to serve 4-6, heat ¼ c. bacon drippings in saucepan. Add 1 small, chopped onion, and 1 garlic clove; saute until a golden color. Add 6-oz. can tomato paste, 1 c. water, ¼ c. lemon juice, ½ tsp. salt, 2 tsp. paprika, ¼ tsp. tabasco and ¼ tsp. crushed red pepper. Mix thoroughly. Cook over low heat for 10 min., stirring occasionally. In a shallow baking pan, bake 2 or 3 lb. spareribs at 450° F. for 15 min., then reduce to 350° F. and bake for 1 hr. longer or until spareribs are tender, basting frequently with the barbecue sauce.

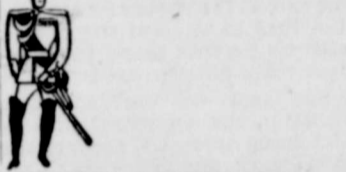

### PARENT PROBLEMS

#### The Place of Parents At a Children's Party

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

A P.T.A. president said to me recently: "During a party for young people at our home, I had occasion to drop into the basement playroom, where they were dancing. The room was pitch dark.

"When I asked my 12-year-old son about it," this mother continued, "he said this was usually the case at the parties he attends, and that in some of the homes, with no parents there, the children roam all over the house."

She said she smelled some smoke in the playroom and was told that a number of them smoke in the dark. She explained to her son how easily one of the girls' dresses might catch on fire.

Acting "Big"

Perhaps children at this age range are motivated in these ways by supposing they are acting "big." Also, since kissing games are quite popular among them, darkness may make it easier for the shy boys, usually more shy than girls of the same ages. However silly we consider these kissing games, they probably are pretty harmless in a lighted room, except perhaps for spreading cold germs.

Few parents, I believe, consider darkened rooms desirable at these parties. Prudent parents set adequate lighting as a requirement. To enforce such a regulation, one parent, at least, must be home during the party. Yet we are amazed at how many parents plan to be absent from these parties, as requested or demanded by their children. Why they do so is more than I can understand.

If you really care about the

welfare of your child at this age range, or even somewhat beyond it, you won't let him attend a party unless you know one of the parents is present. If several parents concerned were to confer on these matters, they might easily effect more desirable standards.

The parent need not become obnoxious to the children during their party. A mother certainly wouldn't remain in their midst. Yet she would let them feel her presence in the home, and might occasionally drop into their midst perhaps, "to wish them a good time."

Some parents help the young party-giver to plan wholesome, enjoyable programs.

Transportation Problem

Another problem of these parties for youths from 11 to 14 is the transportation. It is fortunate if the party is within easy walking distance. Otherwise, the parents should take their children and call for them, unless they can easily go by bus or trolley car. It is very hazardous when older children drive many passengers to and from the party.

Safety can also be furthered if a reasonable hour is set by the hostess-parent for ending the party, as driving hazards usually increase around midnight and later. Often it's the after-parties at restaurants and inns that are least safe and wholesome. Children are fortunate when parents get together and decide on some regulations they will help enforce. ### TOWN-Mills Soil Conservation News

By CHARLES HAENISCH

Similar farming practices were being followed on both watersheds at the beginning of the study. Conservation practices were established on one of the watersheds in the spring of 1943. These practices included changing part of the cultivated area to grassland; the use of improved crop rotations. No change was made in the farming practices on the other watershed.

During the first five years rainfall was slightly above normal and the runoff-producing rainfall averaged 17.4 inches annually. The following five years, 1948 through 1952, were drouth years and the run-off producing rainfall averaged only 4.8 inches yearly, the total rainfall during the drouth period was two-thirds the amount for the normal five years, but most of it fell in a slow rate that it produced such slow rate that it produced no runoff.

For the normal rainfall period there was almost no difference in the runoff from the untreated and treated watershed. The annual average was 10.3 and 10.4 inches, respectively. During the drouth period the average yearly runoff from the untreated and treated watersheds was approximately 1.4 and 0.9 inches.

The fact that there was a difference of one-half inch in the annual runoff from these two watersheds during the drouth years is not the significant point, said Mr. Smith. This minor difference in rate, even over a period of several years, would amount to so small a volume of water that it could not be considered in the planning of a dependable municipal water supply. The important point is that the TOTAL runoff from the untreated watershed during the five drouth years was only about two-thirds of the average runoff for ONE year during the normal rainfall period.

Mr. Smith emphasized that because runoff during drouth years may be very small, water supply reservoirs must have enough capacity to catch the water during years of normal to high runoff and store it for use during drouth periods. A city cannot depend on the runoff during a drouth to maintain its water supply. This is a fact which needs to be widely understood.

Although soil conservation practices on a watershed will not have a significant effect on water yield they can help greatly in protecting water supplies from loss of storage space by sedimentation. Conservation practices reduce erosion and the rate of reservoir sedimentation. By slowing down the rate at which reservoirs are filling with sediment, Mr. Smith said, more storage capacity will be maintained in which to store water for use during drouth years.

Value of the serum as a modifier or preventative of measles has been known since World War II, and in 1944 the Red Cross began distribution of gamma globulin, processed from surplus blood plasma, to state health departments for this purpose. In 1951 and 1952 studies made in various cities demonstrated that the serum would prevent the paralytic effects of polio.

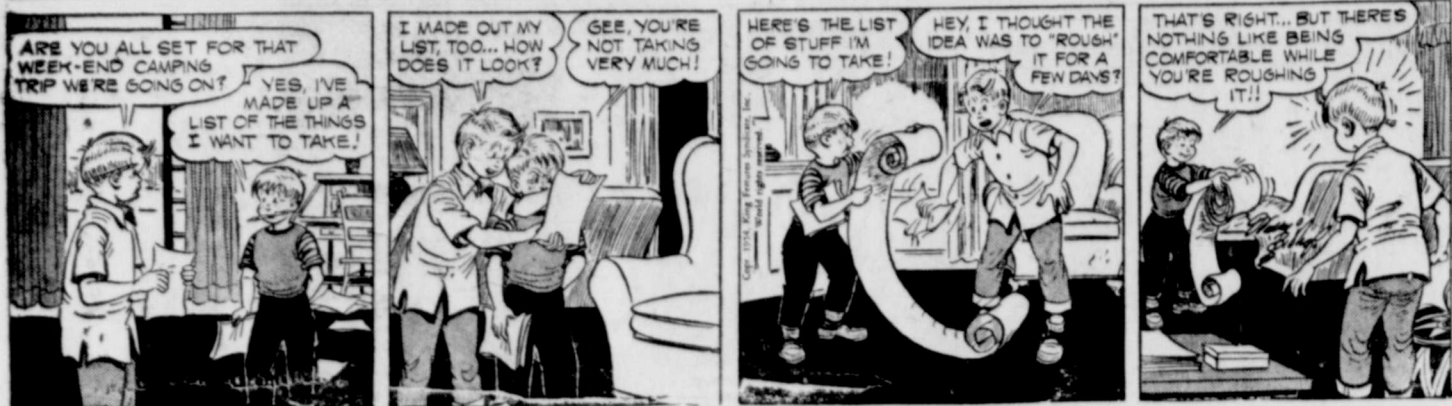

Facts About Social Security

How much covered employment or selfemployment income will YOU need in order to be eligible for social security benefits when you reach 65? According to James B. Marley, Manager of the Austin social security office, there is better than an even chance that your answer—if you have one—will be wrong. Mr. Marley explains it this way: Since thousands of older workers have already qualified for benefits with as little as a year and one-half of covered earnings, many people have assumed that any person can do the same. Actually that is true only where the individual is already 65 or will attain that age before July 1, 1954.

Anyone reaching 65 after 30th of this year will need two more quarters of covered employment for every additional year up to the time he reaches 65. Thus, a person who will be 65 three years from now will need 6 more quarters in addition to the 6 already required, or a total of 12. The maximum coverage requirement is 40 quarters and the minimum is 6.

The Austin social security manager stated that a pamphlet explaining fully the eligibility requirements and other social security questions is available upon request at any social security office. Request for Pamphlet No. 35 should be addressed to the Social Security Administration, Austin Texas. Persons approaching 65 who have any doubt about their ability to meet employment requirements are urged to obtain a copy.

Current Population Survey Will Cover Special Questions On Marriage

Special questions on marriage will be asked in the June Current Population Survey, according to Supervisor Francis H. Wilmer of the Census Bureau's District Office at Dallas, Texas. Persons currently married or separated will be asked the year in which the current marriage took place while those widowed or divorced will be asked the year of their last marriage. Persons married since 1947 will be asked additional questions on number of times married, state of residence and highest grade of school completed.

The inquiries on marriage are in addition to the regular questions on employment and unemployment which are asked each month in the Current Population Survey which provides official national figures on these important items.

This information on marriage to be collected in the June survey is expected to be a valuable addition to the current knowledge of the pattern of American family life.

The Current Population Survey is being conducted this week here and in 229 other places throughout the country. Mrs. Nella Casbeer of Lampasas, Texas, will handle the local interviews.

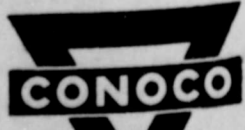

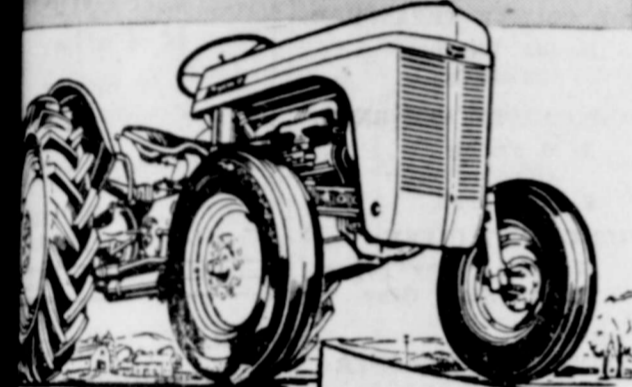

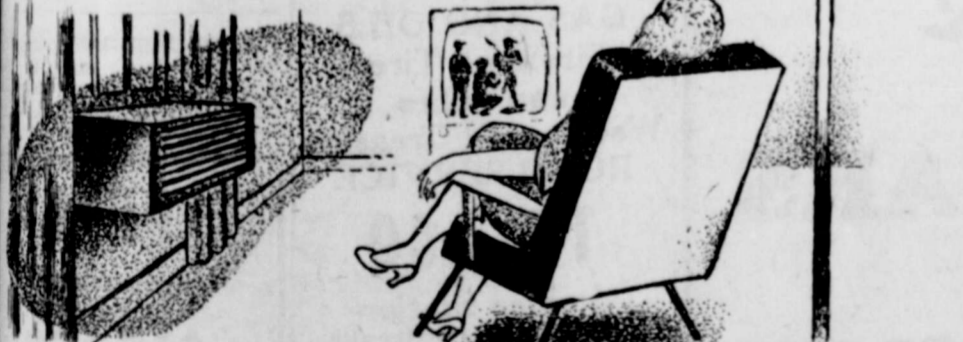

**THE NEED FOR CHANGE IN FARM PRACTICES**

Recent drouth-breaking rains in Texas should not be the signal to relax our soil and water saving efforts. Rain today does not guarantee prosperity on the farm tomorrow. Topsoil can be removed from good land in a few years by careless farming. When our topsoil is gone, the productivity of the land is gone. Subsoil moisture can be wasted even more quickly—in a few short weeks of thoughtless soil neglect.

Yet, every time it rains, many farmers relax just as though there was never going to be another drouth. Their attention is diverted by the more immediate problems of taxes, high cost of living and public scandals. But there is no greater scandal than the costly waste of our natural resources.

The most recent drouth again emphasizes the need for changes in land use and farming practices in many parts of Texas. In the states of Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Nebraska and Texas, more than 11 million acres of crop land and about 5 million acres of range land have been damaged by wind erosion this past spring.

Many of the present difficulties arise from the fact that a great deal of poor land in the drier sections of this area has been improperly placed in cultivation during the last 12 or 15 years. In the six-state area, the amount of cropland increased by about 3.6 million acres from 1939 to 1949. Much of this should have been left to grasses.

The plowing up of sod land for cash crops and the soaring land prices were undoubtedly influenced by the favorable weather and high yields of the 1940's and the high prices for wheat and cotton. Then the

drouth started and the resources were rapidly exhausted.

Emergency tillage programs have been inaugurated but these, at best, are only short term measures. A long range program should point towards converting about 8 or 9 million acres of present crop land in the southwest to permanent grassland where the soil is unsuited for cultivation. For land that is to remain in cultivation, such conservation practices as stubble mulch tillage, cover cropping, strip cropping and terracing for water conservation are necessary.

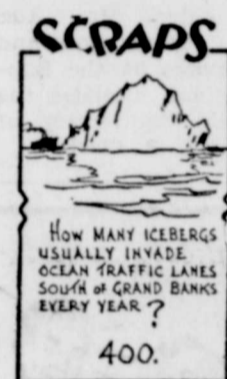
