

The original church was erected during the pastorate of the Rev. C. V. Oswalt and while Rev. W. T. Malugen was the Presiding Elder. The Second church was built during the pastorate of the Rev. J. A. Biggs in the years 1900-1902. The present Sanctuary and Educational Building were erected during the pastorate of the Rev. R. E. Duke and finished in 1936. During the first decades of Methodism of which Goldthwaite soon became an integral part we see the names of many organized congregations whose services were held in School houses. Some of these names have disappeared while others are still important communites in Mills County. The 75th Anniversary of Official Methodism in what is now Mills County will be observed this coming Sunday at the Goldthwaite Methodist Church. As early as a year or two following the Civil War a Methodist preacher by the name of H. Childress preached regularly at what is now the area of Regency and at a private home near where the Willams Ranch was located.

Brother Childress was known as the Bear Hunting preacher. He always carried a Winchester rifle and wore his six shooter. These he would lav aside as he entered the pulpit or took his position to preach.

Between then and June 28. 1879 there were many other local Methodist Preachers going up and down this area but there were no Official Meetings or organized methodism, according to a historical sketch by Rev. J. S. Bowles, Pastor of the Goldthwaite Church from 1906 to 1909. "On June 28, 18-79 the First Quartely Conference of Methodism in this area was held at Big Valley," so Bro.

Bowles wrote. His source of information is not in my possession but I presume it was taken from a Quartely Conference and feeling a sharp pain in the the Troop and ate lunch with Record. 





DEFENSE BILL: Defense appropriations of \$28,861,584,486 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1955, have been recommended by the Senate Appropriations Committee.

That sum is \$5,451,736,514 less than total appropriations for the current fiscal year. It is \$1,025,470,514 below the budget estimate. The recommended appropri-

ation is equivalent to more than \$170 for every man, woman and child in the United States.

AIRCRAFT: Committee hearings on the defense appropriations bill brought out the fact that aircraft procurement expenditures by the Air Force, Army and Navy will account for some 22 per cent of all defense spending in 1955.

This reflects continuing emphasis on building up our air power. During the current year, aircraft procurement expenditures are 20 per cent of total defense spending. Last year, the figure was 17 per cent.

By July 1, 1957, it is planned that the Air Force will be organized into 137 wings, of which 126 will be combat wings. The air army of the Navy will include 16 carrier air groups and 15 carrier anti-submarine warfare squadrons. The Marine Corps will have three air wings.

SHIPS: Under terms of the bill, expenditures for shipbuilding will total approximately one billion dollars next year. That is about the same amount being spent this year.

At the end of June, 1955, the active fleet of the Navy will consist of 1.080 ships. Of these, 404 will be major combatant types - aircraft carriers, cruisers, destroyers, submarines, and so on-and 676 will be mine warefare, amphibious warfare, patrol, and auxiliary vessels. 



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
