Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Senator Ferguson Prime Democrat Election Target Congressional Pay Boost Proposal Appears Spiked

WASHINGTON—Senate GOP policy chairman Homer Ferguson is a prime target for the Democrats in their battle to regain control of Congress in this autumn's elections. Ferguson's opponent in Michigan will be ex-Senator Blair Moody, who will have the support not only of the state Democratic organization, but of the politically-powerful CIO United Auto Workers.

The Democrats will campaign against Ferguson on economic issues. Although unemployment in the automobile industry has eased somewhat in recent weeks it is still acute enough, the Democrats feel, to provide them plenty of ammunition.

Ferguson is prepared to fight back with the contention that a strong Republican Congress is essential to enactment of President Eisenhower's "bold, dynamic" program and that unless the GOP is kept in power, the country may face tough times. Moody lost in 1952, by a fairly close margin, to Senator Charles E. Potter. His advisers maintain that Ferguson will prove an easier opponent than was Potter, a disabled veteran of World War II with a brilliant combat record.

● PAY BOOST OR POLITICS—The proposed congressional pay boost which would have hiked the pay of senators and House members to \$25,000 a year has apparently been spiked. The increase which would have amounted to an 80 per cent boost over the present pay of \$15,000 has proved too politically ticklish in an election year.

While a substantial number of congressmen are convinced that the present salary scale is too low, they recognize that it could prove fatal to members in touch-and-go districts, particularly areas where there have been unemployment in the last year.

The presidential commission which recommended the higher salaries has disbanded and the legislators appear startled or vague when the subject is broached to them in the cloak rooms. An effort may be made next year, however, to put through a compromise bill.

● RED BOMBER—The Pentagon doesn't seem too worried about the first public appearance of the huge new Soviet jet bomber, despite the fact that it appears to have international range.

The big plane was a key feature of this year's Moscow May Day parade. Crowds watched with awe as the craft whooshed from horizon to horizon in a matter of seconds.

However, Air Force officials in the know seem to believe that the eight-jet plane may have been a hand-built prototype that they have heard about for some time. The theory is that if the plane was actually in production more than one would have been put in the air for the big show.

● MORE TAX CUTS?—Despite the government's current budget difficulties there is still a good deal of talk around Capitol Hill in favor of a "quickie" cut in income taxes.

The statesmen think such a reduction would be a fine coming-home present at campaign time. What they would like would be a blanket five per cent cut that would go into effect a few weeks before the November elections.

Earlier this year the Republican leadership squelched an attempt by Democrats to raise individual tax exemptions, and relied instead upon a host of small revenue reductions. Now many congressmen are afraid that these cuts won't be felt by voters—at least not enough to do any political good.

● THREE-D EVIDENCE?—Nothing much has been said about it but the Internal Revenue service has hit upon a new way of convicting moonshiners. They are using three-dimensional photographs in court trials and find that juries are impressed when they view life-like photos of illicit stills.

## TODAY'S Menu

### Glamorous Picnic Fare Is Cooked on a Skewer

By ALICE DENHOFF

THE emphasis is on picnic fare, so let's be off to the woods or the shore! Bring along the metal skewers!

If no skewers are available, then use medium gauge steel wires. Cut one end obliquely to serve as a point; form a handle by bending the other end. Let the menfolk take care of that part of it! And if there are neither skewers nor medium gauge steel wires, green branches will do.

Dip skewers or substitutes in salad oil or run 'em through a garlic clove, then alternate 6 or 7 chunks of meat, vegetables or fruits. Grill, turning and brushing with barbecue sauce or melted butter.

Shish-kebab combinations include chunks of lamb, tiny onions and salami; scallops, mushrooms and dill pickle; pineapple, ham and banana; tiny tomatoes, shrimp and green pepper chunks. Any number of delicious combinations are available besides the traditional lamb most of us know.

Out-of-door cooking gives you foods as you like them—plus a generous seasoning of fresh air.

Please the pre-picnic pickle flicher with a hot snack to keep the criminal happy and out of the pickle jar. Run two skewers lengthwise through a big piece of salami, heat on one side of the grill, carve and serve between thin slices of buttered rye bread.

P. S. Pass the pickles early. Maybe we can't all get to sea, but we can have a shore dinner on our own barbecue grill right out in the backyard.

Here is a menu for the saltiest sailor at heart: barbecued fish steaks, potato-shrimp salad, carrot sticks, rolls and cherry tart.

Broiled fish is improved if it is marinated for several hours with salad oil, lemon juice and salt. Grill the fish directly over coals and cook until golden brown. Serve with a piquant sauce.

For a thrifty and easy picnic idea, try skillet hamburgers a la Jiggs.

Slice canned corned beef and brown well in fat in a skillet. Serve on grilled hamburger buns. Serve the hamburgers with coleslaw, sliced tomatoes, and, for the particular eaters, some tartare sauce.

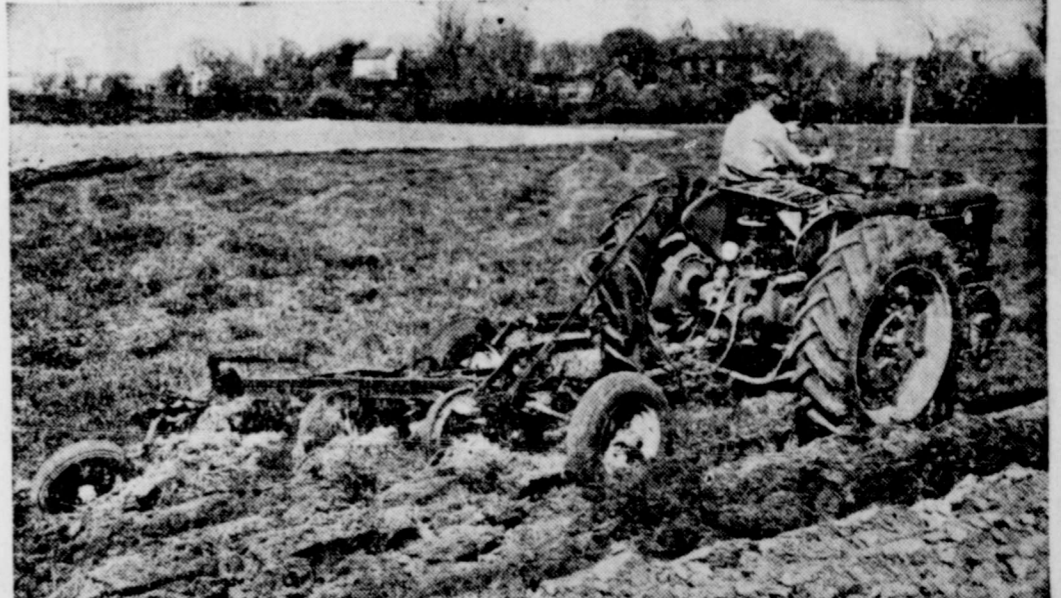

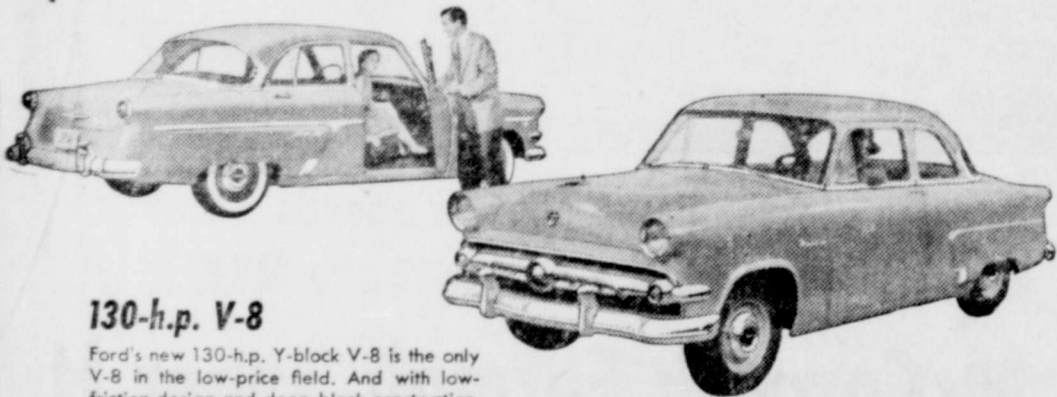

## PARENT PROBLEMS

### Problems of Unwed Mothers Are Surveyed

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

A VERY few who read this column may be unmarried mothers. A few more, perhaps, are mothers of daughters who are unwed mothers. Practically all mothers hope and pray their daughters never will have a baby out of wedlock.

The most elaborate presentation of the problems of the unwed mother and her child is in a recent book, "Out of Wedlock," by Leontine Young, Professor in Casework, Ohio State University (McCraw-Hill, N. Y.). The book, addressed to social workers, is of interest to anyone working with, or on behalf of, unmarried mothers, unmarried fathers and out-of-wedlock children.

#### National Estimate

No one knows how many out-of-wedlock children are born in the United States in a year. The latest estimate by the National Office of Vital Statistics, made in 1949, was 133,200. Professor Young says this estimate is far too low, and that the number has been increasing rapidly since World War II.

The big contributions of this book are the presentation of social attitudes over the years, especially since the beginning of the Christian Era, toward the unmarried mother and her child. It outlines the frustrations facing her and her child, and the legal handicaps to them, besides discussing the social workers who try to help them. Though Professor Young sees some progress, she thinks it discouragingly little.

#### A Controversial Theory

I found myself enthusiastic over most of this book. But when I considered the author's theory about why women become pregnant out of wedlock, a matter of major interest to parents, I could

not accept it. She says it is not true that most women become pregnant out of wedlock through irresponsibility and ignorance. Some do. But, she maintains most do become so through a subconscious wish, having its origin in the family background. The action then is purposeful. The unwed mother wants a baby—an out-of-wedlock baby without a husband. She presents this theory as a fact, but, in my opinion, fails to present convincing objective evidence.

Of the large number of unwed mothers questioned, Professor Young says that "every girl admitted readily and without hesitation that she had known that the sex act might well result in pregnancy."

Their admission of "knowledge" hardly squares with the widely spread idea of a number of leaders in the field of sex education, that many girls become pregnant out of wedlock because they never learned "the facts of life."

Accepting the plea of Professor Young to be humane and charitable toward the unwed mother, and to treat her innocent, defenseless child the same as though he had been born in wedlock, let us parents try also to bring up our children with the ideal of chastity as the surest way to individual and family happiness. This means they will need to learn in a family atmosphere of love and understanding, some basic inhibitions early, as the basis of self-control, together with deep regard for the preciousness of every other person. ### FLOODS AND DROUGHT

Two natural disasters loomed over Texas in the closing days of June; one struck with dramatic swiftness, the second was paying a return visit.

It is a fantastic "joke" that Texas can be plagued with floods and drought at the same time—and often within a few miles of each other. That is what happened last month.

The devastating floods at Lamesa, Ozona and along the Rio Grande, resulting in tragic loss of lives and property, captured the newspaper headlines.

But at the same time, farmers and ranchers in many parts of Central and West Texas began to feel the now familiar effects of a lack of water. The aftermath of both disasters will linger for a long time.

Despite recent rains in many areas of Texas, drought conditions are approaching the critical stage in a number of central and southern counties. Feed crops and pastures are deteriorating as strong winds and a blazing sun deplete the soil moisture.

The moisture situation is grave. Less than five inches of rain has fallen in McCulloch

so far this year, and only total of seven inches has been received since last October. This in a county whose normal rainfall is 24.94 inches. The fields of cotton, sorghums, oats, and crops along the Colorado valley, Brady Creek and Saba valley are suffering. The land which makes up the remainder of the county is also in poor shape. A result an appeal has been made to Austin and the federal government urging that immediate steps be taken to the government feed program reinstated before more of county's seriously depleted stock has to be sacrificed.

Aid has been requested of federal authorities and agricultural leaders are formulating plans of action. From indications, the drought can be a real problem in the again this year.

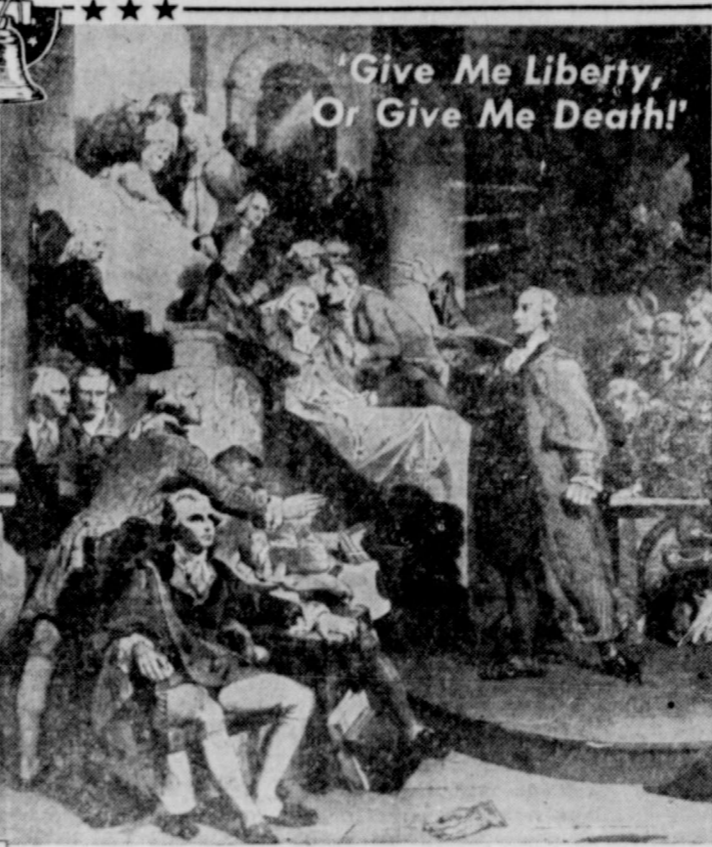

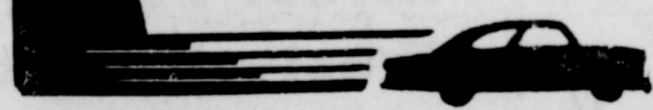

Governor Issues Proclamation On Farm Safety Week For July 25-31

COLLEGE STATION, (Spec.) "More accidental deaths occur, for each 100,000 workers, in agriculture than in any other major industry of the nation. Texas, with its widespread farming and ranching operations, is in a position to help

reduce this accident toll," said Governor Allan Shivers in the proclamation he signed on June 8 designating the week of July 25-31 Farm Safety Week.

Continuing the Governor said, "A disabling injury strikes some farm person in America on the average of every 26 seconds. The U. S. Department of Agriculture and the National Safety Council are cooperating in a campaign designed to reduce the huge number of avoidable farm accidents and I urge all Texans engaged in farming activities to exercise all possible

caution in their work."

The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety committee is the organization in the state through which cooperative efforts are being directed toward reducing the farm accident rate. Committee members represent state and federal agencies working in agriculture and home economics, farm organizations, press and radio, commercial, industrial and business concerns and individuals who are all interested in seeing the label, "Nation's most hazardous occupation", removed from agriculture.

Paul Walser of the Soil Conservation Service is chairman of the general committee and H. Walter Hammond, president Texas Farm Bureau, is Chairman of the Executive Board of the committee. E. C. Martin, state agriculture leader for the Texas Agriculture Extension Service and W. L. Ulich, extensions agricultural engineer, serve as Vice Chairman and secretary of the groups.

The State Committee joins Governor Shivers in urging all Texans to not only observe the special week of July 25-31 but to make the other 51 weeks just as safe as humanly possible. Says Executive Board Chairman Hammond, "It's a real challenge to every farm family. I have never yet met a farmer or a member of his family who wanted to get involved in an accident. The way to avoid them is practice prevention every day."

Importance Of Social Security Card Is Stressed By OASI Official

Your social security card is one of your most valuable possessions. It is the key to your social security account; the account on which payments made under Old-Age and Survivors Insurance will be based.

You should be certain that you get a social security number as soon as you go to work on a job that is covered by social security. If you are self-employed, in most any trade or business, you will also need a social security number.

If you work for someone else make sure that he copies your name and number for his records exactly as it appears on your social security card. He uses this information in the reports he makes every three months of the wages he has paid you. The benefits paid on your account are based on these reports.

If you are self-employed you need the number for the report you make to the Director of Internal Revenue of your income from self-employment that is subject to social security taxes. This report is to be filed with your Federal income tax return once a year covering your income in the last

taxable year. You should have only one social security number all your life. If you change your name you should get another card with the same number but showing your new name. If you lose your card ask your Social Security office for a duplicate card.

Guard your card—put it in a safe place. Let your family know where your card is. You will need your card when you apply for your benefits when you retire. Your family will need the card to file for survivor's benefits in case of your death.

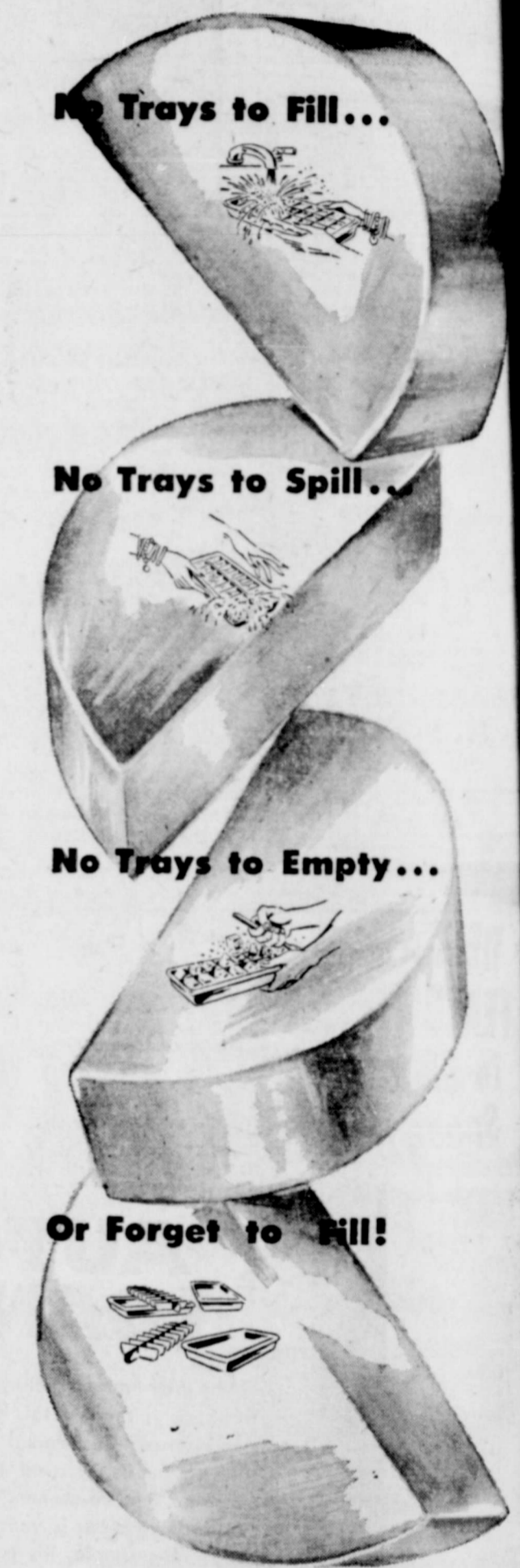

However, the reaction of the other American states is very definitely anti-communist. The military junta which replaced Arbenz government had to agree to outlaw the communist party. This was a response to Western Hemisphere countries.

Even more important is the Congressional reaction. By an overwhelming vote, Congress has gone on record as ready to take the necessary steps to repel communist aggression in the Western Hemisphere. In the Senate, the vote was 69 to 1; in the House, 371 to 0. The meaning of this expression is unmistakable.

I was the author of the resolution that expressed this Congressional sentiment. It is a resolution which I believe expresses the true sentiment of America—we must maintain our freedoms against communist aggression. The communists must not be allowed to penetrate the Western Hemisphere. We do not intend to inter-

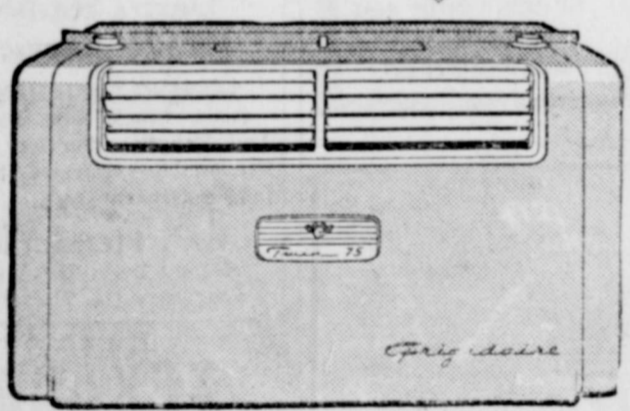

### Brown-Mills Soil Conservation News

By CHARLES EAENISCH

"Public interest in water problems in Texas is at an all-time high", H. N. Smith, State Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service, at Temple, said today.

Many articles on water resources and water needs are appearing in newspapers and magazines, and Federal and State agencies, committees, and many cities are making water

studies. "This widespread concern about water supplies", Smith pointed out, "emphasizes the importance of taking needed steps without delay to prevent rapid filling of reservoirs with sediment without accompanying loss of valuable water storage capacity."

Mr. Smith referred to the four major reservoirs—Benbrook, Grapevine, Garza-Little Elm, and Lavon—which are being completed by the Corps of Engineers above Dallas and Fort Worth. "These reservoirs," he said "will give flood protection to Dallas and Fort Worth and to levee districts and farmland along the river below them. The dams also will serve the very important purposes of storing water for municipal and industrial use, recreation, navigation of the Trinity, and streamflow regulation. Foreseeing even greater needs for water in the future as Texas develops, we need to do everything that can be done to protect and increase the useful life of these reservoirs."

Mr. Smith estimated that at the present rate of erosion, and soil movement in the watershed the sediment pools of the four reservoirs would be filled with sediment in 27 to 36 years.

"But this doesn't need to happen", he said. "If the needed soil conservation measures and practices were being used throughout the watershed of Grapevine reservoir—as an example—the life of the sediment pool would be increased to 50 years and the storage capacity of the reservoir maintained cor-

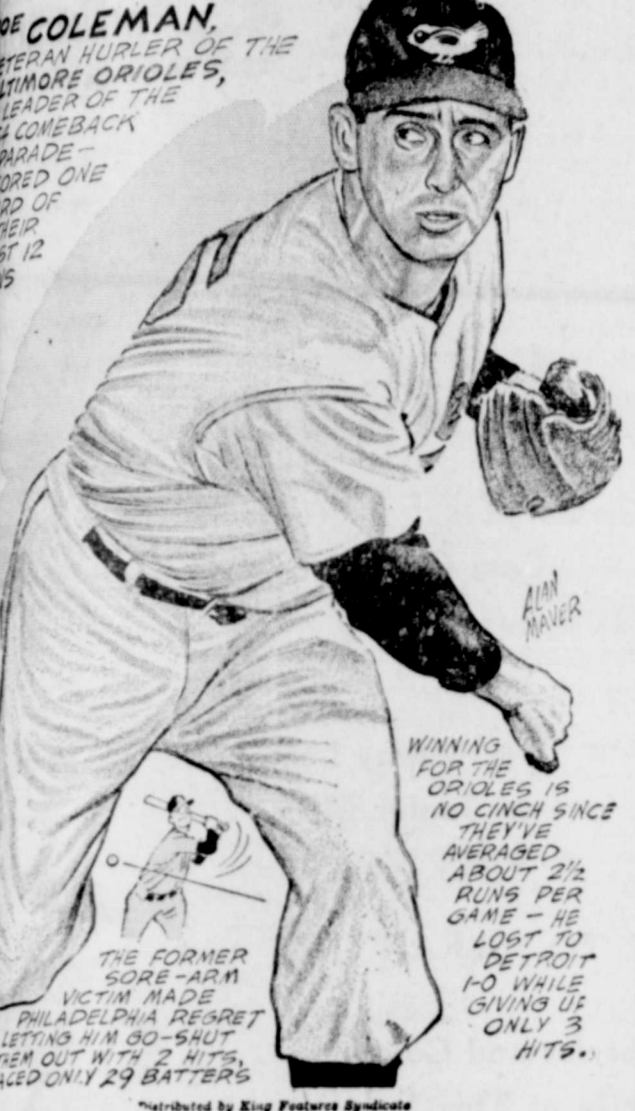
respondingly, and if the proposed system of upstream flood prevention dams, which has been planned by the Soil Conservation Service above Grapevine reservoir, were built immediately the sediment pool life would be lengthened to 116 years because of the sediment deposition which would be prevented.

"The Trinity River watershed isn't the only place in Texas where rapid filling of reservoirs by sediment is occurring," Mr. Smith continued. "The same thing is happening in other parts of the state, and people are becoming concerned at seeing mud replace water. We have had requests from many cities and towns for help in finding out the rate of sedimentation in their water supply reservoir, and what can be done to protect them."

"During recent years we have cooperated with the cities of Corpus Christi, San Angelo, Waco and Abilene in making sedimentation surveys of their water supply reservoirs," said Smith, "and with the Dezcar-Medina-Atascosa Water Improvement District in a survey of Medina Lake. We are right now cooperating with the cities of Graham and Throckmorton in surveys of their reservoirs."

Smith pointed out that good sites for reservoirs are scarce, and the best ones already have been used. "When replacement dams have to be built at other locations it is going to cost a lot of money," he said. "That's why we must do everything we can to make our reservoirs last as long as possible."
