Goldthwaite Postal Receipts Show Increase

Postal receipts of the Goldthwaite post office for the first six months of 1954 show an increase of approximately 8 per cent over the first six months of 1953, it was announced this week by postmaster Lucile Fairman. Receipts the first six months this year totaled \$9,709.89 as compared to \$8,906.54 for the corresponding period of 1953.

Receipts for the fiscal year 1954 were \$21,482.37 while those for the fiscal year 1953 were \$19,112.23. This reflects an increase of \$2,370.14 or about 9 per cent, the postmaster announced.

Prepare to Shed Tears; Choo-Choo on Way Out!
Lordly Steam Locomotives Fade From Capital Scene
Special to Central Press

WASHINGTON—Just 118 years ago the history-making steam locomotive, Atlantic, puffed into the nation's capital from Baltimore.

Ten years ago the first railroad Diesel locomotive appeared in the national capital. Today the railroads scarcely use any other mode of locomotion.

Nicknamed the "Steak Runners' society," the club got its start among some Baltimore and Ohio railroad engineers in Newark, O.

Each member of the SPMSLMWRT—and there are now well over 10,000 of them—pays a dollar registration fee and is presented a certificate for framing to show that he once operated a steam locomotive.

Here in Washington, steam locomotives are only used in case of emergency for main line service through the local terminals.

Railroad officials explain why this big change has come about very simply: efficiency. A Diesel locomotive can be expected to remain in active service 99 per cent of the time.

Except for emergency runs, the B. & O. railroad operated its last steam locomotive through Washington last November.

THE UN AND TREATY CURBS—Senator Price Daniel (D), Texas, disputes the view of those who say the cause of isolation will be benefited if Congress restricts presidential treaty powers.

Daniel says that United States support of the United Nations and the North Atlantic Treaty alliance has been slipping because people fear these global agencies will be used to interfere with domestic laws.

The senator says that safeguards such as those offered by Senator Bricker and Senator Walter F. George (D), Georgia, will relieve fears of these organizations and gain new support for America's foreign policy.

BIG CITY COMFORTS—Senator George Smathers (D), Florida, thinks small towns should have the luxuries of community facilities enjoyed by the big cities, and has introduced legislation to carry out his idea.

Smathers says that he wants to set up a government agency that could insure bond issues for communities of less than 10,000 that want to construct or modernize such facilities.

The senator says that "There is nothing so 'American' as a small town, and its economic stability and well-being is vital to the entire nation."

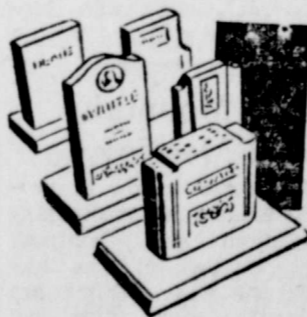

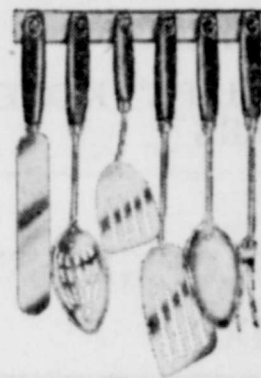

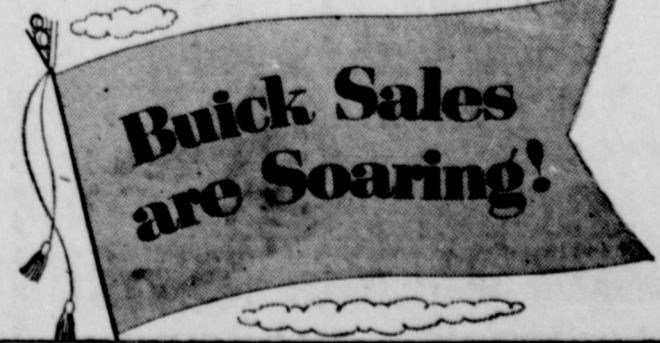

Simple Outdoor Recipes

TIME for living outdoors and
simplified cookery.

For a quick luncheon or supper
for 3 servings, make 1 c. of me-

Roquefort-type cheese, crisp ba-
con bits, sliced stuffed olives and
mayonnaisse to moisten and bind.

Fancy Ham Sandwich

A ham toastwich is prepared
by placing ham between two
bread slices that have been
spread with a blend of butter and
mustard. The sandwich is then
dipped into a French toast egg-
milk mixture and browned in hot

wiches, try this dish.

Brown 1 lb. ground beef and 1
onion, diced, in a little fat in a
skillet. Stir until meat is crumbly.
Add spaghetti and canned to-
mato sauce to fill the pan. Simmer
15 min. Serve with cucumber
salad or radishes, celery and car-
rot strips, all well crisped.

And for a good vitamin-rich
main dish, simmer slices of liver,
dredged in flour, until well

CASE HISTORY OF A DROUTH COUNTY

Scorching hot weather and diminishing soil moisture in Central Texas may result in another drouth disaster relief program for Texas this year.

Farmer groups in Central and Southern counties are petitioning state and federal authorities for aid. Many of them claim the situation is more critical than in 1953, although some sections have been benefited by recent rains.

A meeting between business men and farmers in Hamilton County recently, gives a typical picture of what many of our rural families are up against. Hamilton is a crop and livestock county in upper Central Texas. Its urban population amounts to only about 29 per cent, the rest is rural.

Rainfall in the last year varies from two to seven inches compared to a normal amount of about 31 inches. At the meeting, the new president expressed the opinion that conditions are worse now than they were at the same period last year. Some said it was worse than at any time in history. Each person present gave examples of his own plight and urged quick action on some kind of relief program.

One farmer-businessman said he had 300 acres on which he was running 20 cows now. He

is still feeding from last year, even though, in the most severe winters, ordinary feeding procedure stops about April 1. His ground tanks are dry and he made only 10 to 12 bushels of oats on his farmland this year where a normal yield is 49 bushels.

A second farmer-rancher who is considered to have the best land in Hamilton County has been feeding all year. His grass is about one-fourth gone and he made only two bushels of barley per acre on 50 acres.

Another rancher with only 25 head of cattle now, said he needs to have feed but cannot afford to buy it. His pasture is half normal but he did make fifty bushels of oats on 12 acres.

The effect of drouth on business was expressed by an insurance man. He said that for the first time in his memory, farmers were dropping their automobile, property and life insurance. He has been in Hamilton County 25 years.

Hamilton County is not an isolated example. It is no worse off than several other counties in the drouth area, and probably no better than many of them. If dry weather continues, then it is almost certain that another disaster program will be put into effect.

District-owned Soil and Water Conservation Districts are concerned with flood prevention, and treatment for soil, water, and conservation were discussed. Chairman W. M. Egger expressed the Board's appreciation to Mr. W. P. Duren, representative of the Mills County Bank, for the interest the bank has taken in the job of water and plant conservation in this area.

Supervisors of the Upper Leon District observed a field demonstration of the new Graham Hoeme Conservation Plow during a special meeting at Dublin on June 24. This special conservation plow is patterned after the Graham Hoeme plow that Clinton Harbers of West Point, Texas converted to a combination fertilizer and legume seeder with which he plants legumes on the side of his beds.

Harber was credited with the revolutionary idea of planting legumes in the April 1954 issue of Soil and Water Magazine. According to this article, Harbers increased his cotton yield from one-quarter to one and one-half bales of cotton per acre.

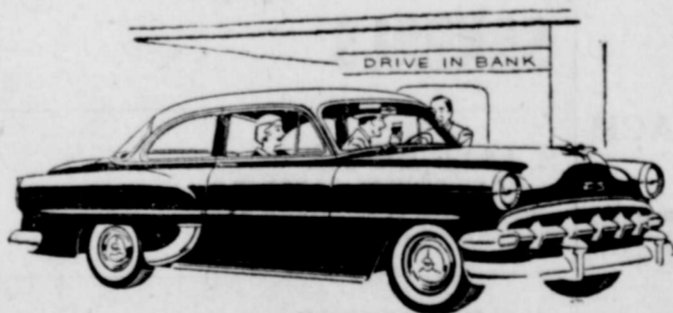
