WASHINGTON-Just 118 years ago the history-making steam locomotive, Atlantic, puffed into the nation's capital from Baltimore. Today the "iron horse" is fast becoming extinct in the country's transportation service, particularly here in the east.

Ten years ago the first railroad Diesel locomotive appeared in the aational capital. Today the railroads scarcely use any other mode

of locomotion. In fact, the steam engine is disappearing so fast in all parts of the country that an organization has been formed and is fast spreading to preserve the memory of the railroad steam age.

Nicknamed the "Steam Runners' society," the club got its start among some Baltimore and Ohio railroad engineers in Newark, O. Its official title s a tongue twister: The Society for the Preservation of the Memory of Steam Locomotives and the Men Who Ran Them.

Each member of the SPMSLMWRT-and there are now well over 10,000 of them-pays a dollar registration fee and is presented a certificate for

framing to show that he once operated a steam locomotive. Here in Washington, steam locomotives are only

used in case of emergency for main line service through the local terminals. Last year there were 5,000 railroad trips through this city. Of that number 500 were steam driven. This year there are only a scattered few.

Railroad officials explain why this big change has come about very simply: efficiency. A Diesel locomotive can be expected to remain in active service 99 per cent of the time. The steam locomotive has only a 65 per cent efficiency record on this score.

Except for emergency runs, the B. & O. railroad operated its last steam locomotive through Washington last November.

• THE UN AND TREATY CURBS-Senator Price Daniel (D), Texas, disputes the view of those who say the cause of isolation will be benefited if Congress restricts presidential treaty powers. The Texan thinks a somewhat opposite result would be forthcoming. Those who believe in international co-operation, he says, will win new backing they don't now enjoy

Daniel says that United States support of the United Nations and the North Atlantic Treaty alliance has been slipping because people fear these global agencies will be used to interfere with domestic laws. Those like Senator John Bricker (R), Ohio, who propose restrictions want the President to submit all executive agreements with other countries to both houses of Congress for approval before putting them into effect.

The senator says that safeguards such as those offered by Senator Bricker and Senator Walter F. George (D), Georgia, will relieve fears of these organizations and gain new support for America's foreign policy.

• BIG CITY COMFORTS-Senator George Smathers (D), Florida, thinks small towns should have the luxuries of community facilities enjoyed by the big cities, and has introduced legislation to carry out his idea. His bill would give towns the modern sys-


tems of water and gas supply and sewage disposal that they now must do without.
