Absentee Balloting Is Heavy As Deadline Nears For Primary Election

Absentee ballots were being cast at a rapid rate at the deadline for applications on Tuesday of this week, July 20, for the forthcoming first primary election which will be held on Saturday of this week, July 24. County Clerk R. C. Summy stated Tuesday afternoon that his office handled 187 applications for absentee ballots up to that time. Not all of these ballots had been cast at the time of his announcement. All absentee ballots must be in the hands of the County Clerk not later than noon on Saturday, election day.

Mills County voters will go to the polls this coming Saturday and cast their ballots in what has had all the earmarks of a quite political campaign. Yet, from all indication there must be considerably more activity than appears on the surface, judging from the number of applications for absentee ballots.

Local activities with respect to state and federal offices

have been light. Not too much interest has been manifested in the contests in that field.

With respect to county candidates and the offices they seek there are five offices being contested by two or more candidates. These are the offices of Sheriff-Tax Assessor and Collector, County Attorney, County District Clerk, County Commissioner for precinct one and Justice of the Peace precinct one.

Candidates for Sheriff are C. N. (Dick) Scrivner, C. F. (Stub) Stubble and W. L. Mahan. F. P. Bowman and A. M. Pridle are seeking the office of County Attorney. The office of County-District Clerk is being sought by Valeria (Stacy) Gray and Walter A. (Toby) Bryant. Candidates for commissioner in precinct one are O. H. Shaw, Woodrow W. Long, C. C. Wesson and C. S. (Dutch) Smith. Jesse Tullos and C. A. Womack are making their bid for the office of Justice of the Peace precinct one.

Offices where there is no contest this year are county Judge, county treasurer, commissioner precinct two, commissioner precinct three, commissioner precinct four, county surveyor and county chairman of the democratic committee.

Polls will open in the respective voting precinct at 7:00 o'clock Saturday morning and will remain open until 7:00 o'clock p.m.

Mills County Is Included In Area Recommended For Disaster Relief

Mills County is one of a group of counties in Central Texas that have been submitted in the recommendation for disaster designation for resumption of loan and feed program to the Department of Agriculture by Texas state director McCann, it was announced Monday by Congressman O. C. Fisher.

The area covered in the recommendation extends from Bexar County on the South through Erath County on the north and from McCulloch County on the west through Coryell County on the east.

Following is the text of Congressman Fisher's message which was received here Monday afternoon.

"Am informed today by Department of Agriculture disaster office that Texas State Director McCann has just submitted his recommendation for disaster designation of certain counties for resumption of loan and feed program. Area

recommended includes Central Texas through Bexar to Erath and McCulloch through Coryell. Department has not taken action on recommendation but is expected to do so shortly. In regard to nature and extent of aid I have urged inclusion of cottonseed cake as well as hay in relief at reduced prices and that action be expedited."

FLASH

Learn To Swim Program To Start Next Monday Morning At Local Pool

A course of "Learn To Swim" lessons will start next Monday morning at the Goldthwaite swimming pool, it was announced this week by the swimming pool committee which is sponsoring the event. Lessons will start at 8:00 o'clock and continue until 11:00 a. m. in three one hour sessions. Students can be taken in each class, or a total of three students for the three classes. The course will continue two weeks running Monday through Friday.

The committee announced this course is being offered primarily to non-swimmers five years of age and older. Non-swimmers will have a chance. If less than sixty swimmers register for the lessons then others will be accepted. They also announced there is sufficient interest another class will be conducted for swimmers immediately following this course.

These blanks must be filled out and turned in at the pool not later than 8:00 o'clock Saturday night, July 24. Those desiring to take the course are to report at the pool at 8:00 o'clock Monday morning, when instructors will form groups for the classes.

Doctors will be on hand at the pool Monday morning for physical examinations which are required. That phase of the application blank may be filled out Monday morning, although the blanks must be turned in Saturday night.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Hot Congressional Campaign Demos to Use 'Republican To Bring Charges Galore Scandals' as Ammunition

WASHINGTON—This autumn's congressional elections will definitely see the Democrats hammering away hot and heavy at what they will label "Republican scandals."

They will concentrate their attacks on the harness-racing scandals in New York state and on the posthumous revelations of embezzlement by one-time New Jersey Gov. and Congressman Harold Hoffman.

Some attention will be paid to the forced resignation of Wes Roberts as GOP national chairman after it was disclosed that he received a commission for selling the state of Kansas a building it already owned.

Other possible ammunition is the information that Internal Revenue Commissioner T. Coleman Andrews entertained Senator Joseph R. McCarthy at his home while investigating the Wisconsin Republican's income taxes. And so it will go.

The point the Democrats hope to make is that their party has no monopoly on sin or, to put it another way, that some rotten apples show up in Republican barrels, too.

WATCH GOP PRIMARIES!—Although the biggest political story of the year will probably be the November elections, and whether Republicans or Democrats control the 84th Congress, or divide the Senate and House between them, GOP primaries may prove of longer-range importance.

The conservative wing of the Republican party is making a determined bid in many states to take over, or strengthen, its hold on party machinery. In other areas, there is an equal determination by supporters of President Eisenhower to defeat isolationist forces.

Several of the primary fights, in New England and the middle west in particular, may show which direction the Republican party will go in the next few years. Senator Joseph R. McCarthy of Wisconsin, for example, will seek support in many intra-party contests for his challenge to some of the administration's policies.

What is considered by some a setback for the junior senator from Wisconsin has already taken place—in the overwhelming victory of Senator Margaret Chase Smith in the Maine primaries. The woman senator won the GOP senatorial nomination by a landslide victory over Robert L. Jones.

Senator Smith, long critical of McCarthy and his methods in hunting out Communists, claimed that Senator Joe had apparently planted Jones deliberately in the race in an effort to defeat her.

Close observers, however, are disinclined to believe McCarthy was actually an issue in the Maine primary election since Senator Smith is highly popular with citizens of the Pine Tree state, not only in the larger cities and towns but in the rural areas as well.

GOVERNMENT WITH A PAST—Do not conclude that the federal government exists only for the present and the future. An official of one tax-supported agency has just left Washington for San Diego, Calif., to bandage the head of a 1,500-year-old Peruvian skull. He is George Griffenhagen, associate curator of the Smithsonian institution. He has taken with him a quantity of Peruvian cordage and cotton gauze of the skull's approximate age.

The San Diego Museum of Man possesses the oldest Western Hemisphere example of surgical dressing known. It was taken from a prehistoric cemetery in Peru and still bears the original dressing of finely-woven gauze held in place by several strands of strong, twisted woolen cord. Part of the scalp and some of the hair are retained under the bandage and cords.

Griffenhagen's visit is to duplicate the skull and its dressing for an exhibit of surgical bandages from prehistoric times to the present. A firm which produces modern bandages is paying for the project.

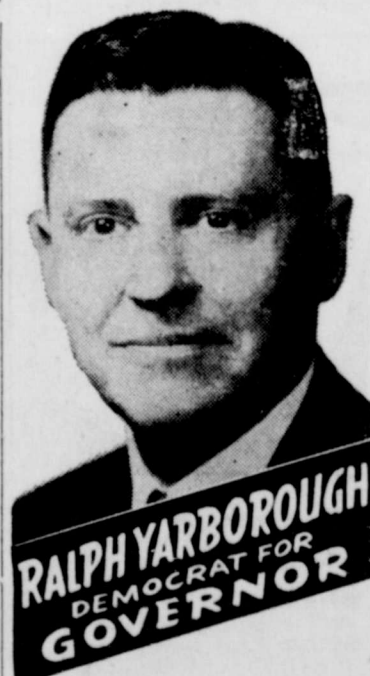

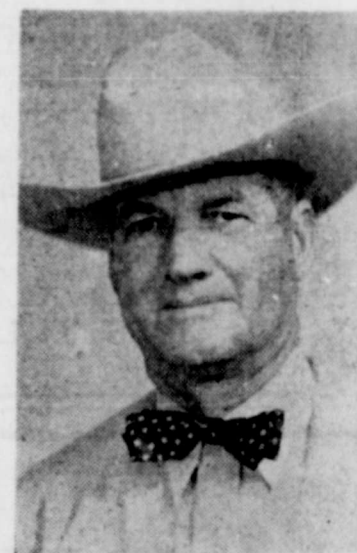

CAUSES OF CATTLE BLOAT

A clue to major ranch headache, livestock bloat, has been found in legumes.

Agricultural researchers believe they have discovered the culprit in saponins, those plant materials that produce a soapy lather. Scientists say this helps explain the steady increase of bloat in recent years as improved varieties have increased the use of legumes in pasture mixtures.

In recent tests, alfalfa saponin was fed to five yearling ewes, two goats, and one heifer. In 8 out of 10 cases, the saponin caused definite distention. Bloat was severe enough in one sheep given 55 grams of saponin that it required immediate treatment to prevent death.

Legume saponins had long been suspected as causing bloat but they had never been isolated in identifiable form and in amounts sufficient for testing until recently. Now it is possible to obtain several pounds of saponin per ton of dry alfalfa.

Proof that alfalfa saponin can cause bloat is the first big lead in the all-out effort by government and industry to find the cause of an ailment which costs millions of dollars annually. Bloat not only kills animals, it reduces milk yields and retards fattening of beef cattle.

Actually, these preliminary investigations have just scratched the surface. They will be extended to include studies of the active or toxic forms of saponins in different varieties of alfalfa, as well as in Ladino and other clovers.

The Federal Agricultural Research Service is the leader of the project. Many states, including Texas, are actively co-operating with federal agencies in a search for other possible causes of bloat. Other states are working independently on this important problem.

If bloat can be reduced only slightly, it will mean many thousands of dollars extra for Texas cattlemen.

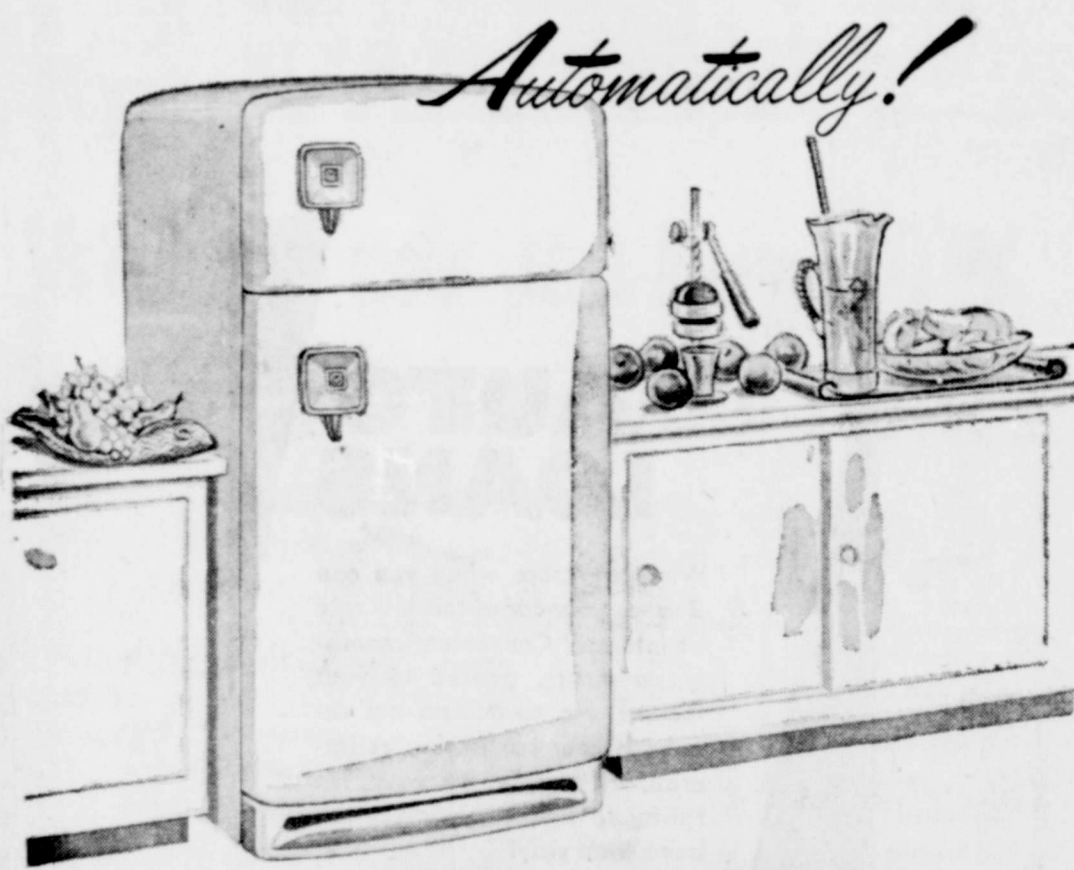

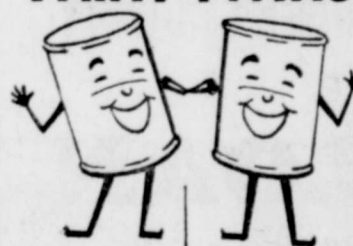

Mills County Receives \$236,853.63 for Public Education Last Year

... (Spec.)—Mills county school children are those over the state the most impressive of Texas Public Education state history, a compilation of figures from 1949-1953 in Austin this week

in 1949 to the present figure. Interviewed this week, Governor Allan Shivers noted that education funds were distributed through the Gilmer Aiken formula to a wide variety of uses. Largest amounts went for salary and operations. Fifteen thousand more teachers with average salary increases of \$1,000 in the last few years took a large percentage. Shivers also explained that last year school administrations received more money to spend for needed improvements than ever before.

Figures also showed lesser known—but important—uses for funds. These included school buses that pick up children in rural areas and transport them safely to school. Cafeterias with hot noon lunches, only recently becoming less than a luxury to public schools, received financial help also, figures showed. Shivers, who called the present school system "the best yet in Texas' bid for better education," said that the picture looked even better for future students. "With the continuance of this aggressive improvement program, Texas can expect to meet efficiently increasing demands of public education," he said.

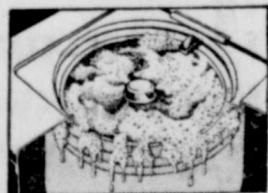

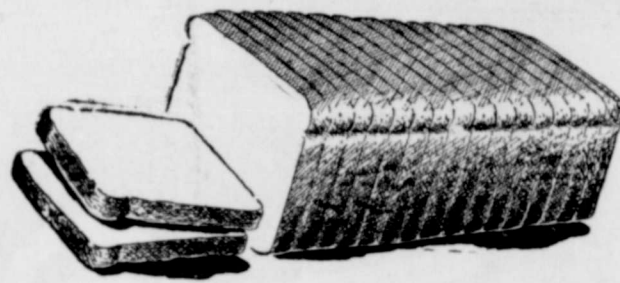

Harbers also received the \$500 Fort Worth Press award as the come-back farmer of the year. Last-year on a dry land farm, Harbers produced an average of 1 and one-half bales of cotton per acre. This production was made even under drouth conditions. Last year after he planted his cotton Harbers received only 6 inches of rain on the crop. When he first bought his farm on returning from the

armed forces, Harbers made only an average of 1/5 of a bale of cotton per acre.

Many farmers have been following the account of Harbers' farming operations as reported in "Soil and Water" magazine.

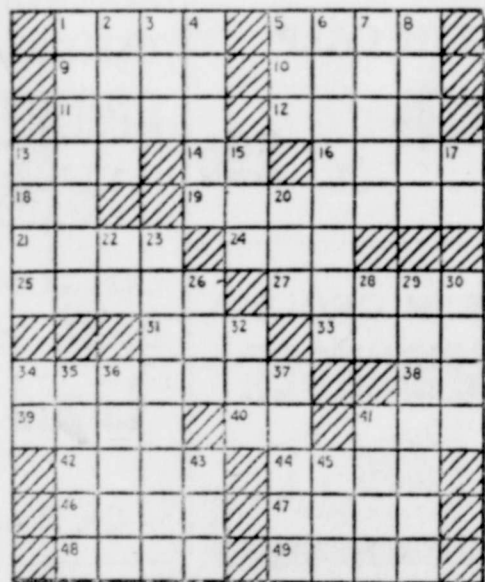

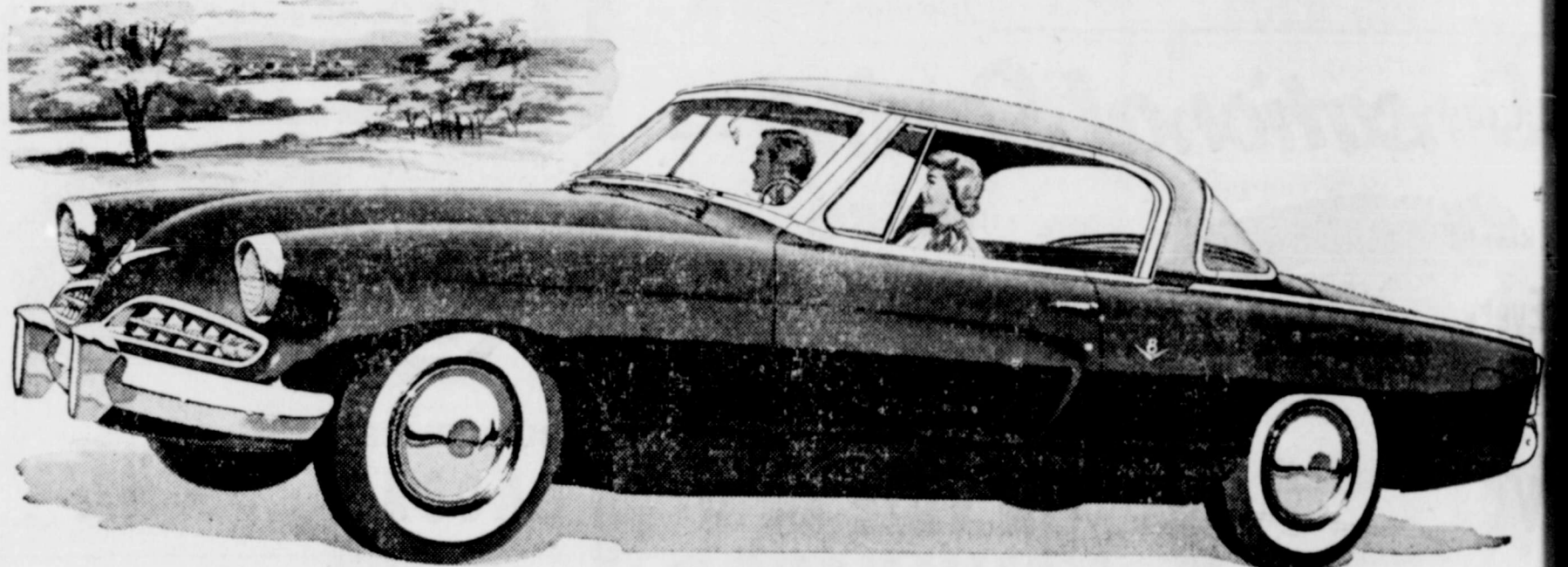

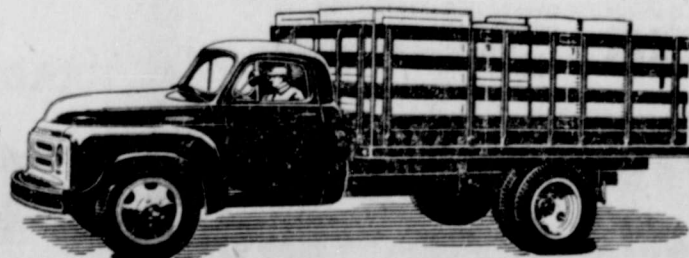

Mrs. Durham, then a widow, and her two children, Chester and Maud, lived with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Knight, in the block in front of us on Durham Street. In the early days of Brownwood, Mr. Knight kept a general store on the northwest corner of the square, now occupied by the Ball Motor Co.

We became fast friends with the Durhams. When school was out we would move back to the farm for the summer. In those days we had an abundance of peaches and plums and grapes and watermelons, and garden galore, and a river to bathe in. Mrs. Durham wanted to visit us at the farm. We dreaded it because our house was just a shack and it was very small.

But one day when my sister, Grace, and I were pulling off one of our big washings at the orchard tank, we heard the Durham buggy coming. We were all bedrabbled and dirty, and did not feel at all presentable. So when we got through we went by the house, slipped in, got us some clean clothes and went to the river for a bath before coming to dinner.

We never dreaded Mrs. Durham again. She put us perfectly at ease. She was a charming woman and how we did enjoy her. We put a wagon sheet down out in the yard, put our pallet quilts on it and all us women folk slept on a big pallet under the stars.

In those days we depended much on homemade light bread. My mother made wonderful bread, but that summer she had turned over the bread making to me.

Mr. Seitz was the baker in Brownwood. In the afternoon his bread wagon with its belled horse used to come around all over Coggin Addition. We thought it a wonderful luxury to get a loaf of bread from Mr. Seitz's wagon.

I had never thought of the bread we made at home as being as good as Mr. Seitz's. One day when I made a fresh batch of bread, Maud said, "Mama, Clemmie can make bread almost as good as Mr. Seitz can't she?"

Mrs. Durham said, "Mr. Seitz might thank his stars if he could make bread as good as Clemmie's."

If ever a little country girl got a boost, I did from that. It still makes me happy to remember it.

Mrs. Cross said Chester's widow is still Edna Durham, and she is secretary to the Radford School for Girls in El Paso.

Mrs. Cross also said that the famous Dick Selman ranch house near Rochelle was demolished during the last World War and its bricks were shipped to Fort Worth, painted a dusty pink, and from them was erected a house in the fashionable Rivercrest Section.

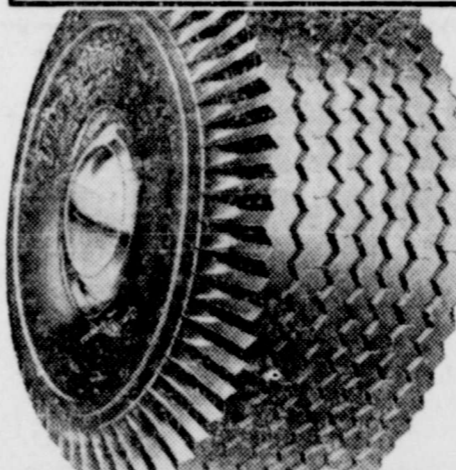

DROUGHT RELIEF: I have been working with State Agriculture Commissioner John C. White and other State officials to place before the Department of Agriculture the facts about drought conditions in a group of Central Texas counties.

As I pointed out in an address in the Senate, range conditions in these counties are extremely serious. There is practically no grass left. Cattlemen already have had to begin supplemental feeding of livestock. The harvest of oats and other small grains was very small. The corn crop is virtually a total loss. Water supplies are dangerously low at several points.

Cattlemen in these counties urgently need protein supplements and roughage or hay to sustain their breeding herds. If these cattle breeders are forced to sell their foundation stock, it will represent economic waste of the most flagrant kind.

The cutoff day for the national drought relief protein feed program was July 15. We are continuing our efforts to get special assistance for the drought-stricken counties.

REA in Texas: Rural Electrification Administration loans to electric and telephone borrowers during the 1954 fiscal year, which ended June 30, totaled \$241,800,000.

Texas led all other states in both the number of loans and total amount of loans. Thirty-one loans totaling \$13,818,000 were made to Texas electric co-ops during the year. Nine telephone loans totaling \$3,646,000 also were made.

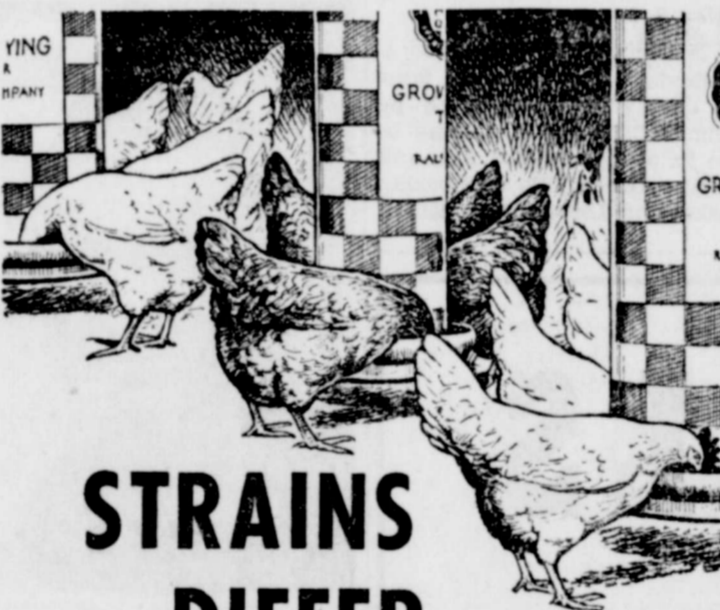

Agriculture Secretary Sets July 25 As Wheat Grower Referendum Date

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson has set July 23 as the date for a national referendum among growers on marketing quotas for the 1955 wheat crop, Chairman of the Mills County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, reminded farmers today. At least two-thirds of the growers voting must approve quotas before they may be put into effect.

"Under present supply conditions," the Chairman stated, Secretary Benson has no choice but to proclaim wheat quotas and call for a vote. Legislation directs the Secretary to proclaim wheat quotas whenever

the supply exceeds 20 percent of a 'normal'. The 'normal supply', as calculated under provisions of the controlling legislation, is a year's domestic and cents as a reserve. Actually, the export requirements plus 15 per available supply for 1954-55 is about 79 percent above normal."

"If quotas are approved, Mr. Soules explained, producers who comply with their farm wheat acreage allotments may market all the wheat they produce in any way they choose. They will also be eligible for the full level of price support which is authorized for the 1955 crop, apparently somewhere from 90

to 75 percent of parity. Producers who are subject to the marketing quotas—those with more than 15 acres of wheat—will lose their price support eligibility if they do not comply with their acreage allotments. They will also be subject to a marketing quota penalty on their excess wheat.

If quotas are disapproved, there will be no marketing quotas and no marketing penalties. Price supports would be at 50 percent of parity for those who comply with their acreage allotments—which will continue in effect even if quotas should be voted down.

Eligibility for price support, with or without marketing quotas, will also require compliance with all crop allotments established for a farm in 1955. In addition, a "total acreage allotment" will be established for all farms where more than 10 acres are diverted from production of allotment crops. A producer will have to comply with the total acreage allotment if one is established for his farm, as well as with all individual crop allotments, in order to be eligible for price support on any crop.

These cross-compliance provisions are designed to assure more balanced production, without shifting surplus problems from one crop to another.

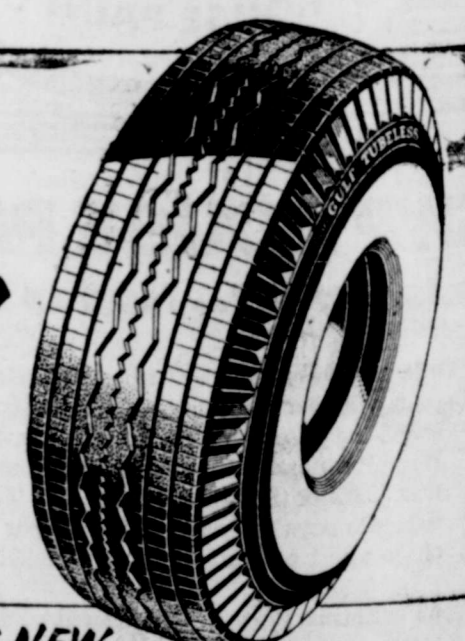
