**Cantaloupe Delicacies**

EACH year, the season for cantaloupes seems to begin earlier and end later. But it still doesn't appear to satisfy the cantaloupe fans who wait impatiently for their favorite to appear at market.

So here are some delicious cantaloupe recipes, and with them, a word on how to select the fruit.

**Netting and Color**  
Maturity in cantaloupes is best determined by the condition of the skin netting and the color underneath it. A ready-to-eat melon will have coarse netting, well-defined, and the rind showing through may be lighter green or have a grayish or yellow tinge.

The scar at the stem should be slightly shrunken and calloused, showing it was harvested at a stage called "full slip" when the fruit separates readily from the stem. A cantaloupe that is heavy for the size indicates more meat and greater sugar content.

**Storage Time**  
As with most fruits, the time that a melon will keep depends on its stage of ripeness. For most purposes, it is best to choose ripe melons at the store and plan to use them within a few days. Keep refrigerated at all times. For best taste, they should be nicely chilled at time of serving.

As a treat for cantaloupe enthusiasts and pie fans, serve Cantaloupe Chiffon Pie.

**Cantaloupe Pie**  
Soften 1 envelope unflavored gelatin in  $\frac{1}{4}$  c. cold water.

Separate 4 eggs and beat yolks until thick and lemon-colored. Add  $\frac{1}{2}$  c. lemon juice,  $\frac{1}{4}$  tsp. salt and  $\frac{1}{2}$  c. sugar. Cook over hot water until thickened, stirring

constantly. Add gelatin and stir until dissolved. Chill in refrigerator until beginning to set (consistency of unbeaten egg white).

Beat 4 egg whites until stiff. Gradually beat in  $\frac{1}{2}$  c. of sugar. Fold in chilled gelatin mixture, tsp. grated lemon rind and 2 c. mashed cantaloupe pulp. Turn into a 9-in. baked pie shell and chill until firm. Top of pie may be garnished with whipped cream, if desired.

**Molded Salad**  
For a nice company luncheon notion, serve a Molded Cantaloupe Salad.

To serve 6 to 8, soften 2 pkg. unflavored gelatin in  $\frac{1}{2}$  c. fresh lime juice. Place over hot water to dissolve. Add 2 c. fresh orange juice,  $\frac{1}{4}$  c. sugar and  $\frac{1}{4}$  tsp. salt. Chill until mixture is thick, but not firm.

Beat with rotary or electric beater until light and fluffy. Fold in  $\frac{1}{2}$  c. creamy cottage cheese and 2 c. cubed ripe cantaloupe. Rinse a 6-c. mold in cold water and fill with gelatin mixture. Chill until ready to serve. Turn out onto large serving plate. Garnish with salad greens and serve with mayonnaise.

**Melba Sundae**  
Cantaloupe Melba Sundae should make a big hit just now, it is so refreshing and delicious.

For 6 servings, chill 3 ripe cantaloupes. Cut fruit in halves and scoop out seeds. Fill centers with vanilla ice cream and serve topped with crushed fresh or thawed frozen raspberries, seasoned to taste. Takes 1 qt. of ice cream and 2 c. of raspberries to do a proper job.

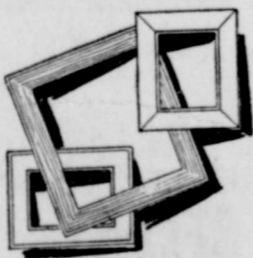

### Details On Emergency Drouth Feed Announced By Agriculture Secretary

The Secretary of Agriculture has assigned to the Farmers Home Administration responsibility for determining the eligibility of applicants for assistance under the Department's Emergency Feed Program. The basic objective of the Emergency Feed program is to assist eligible established farmers and stockmen in providing necessary feed to maintain their foundation herds of livestock and enable them to continue

their livestock operations. County Committees of the FHA are responsible for passing upon applications for assistance under the Emergency Feed Program.

Any established farmer or stockman whose principal occupation is farming or ranching and whose financial condition is such that he requires assistance under this program in order to maintain his foundation herd of livestock and continue his livestock operations, is eligible for assistance under the Emergency Feed Program. The fact that purchase of hay or other feed at regular prices may not be profitable to the applicant is not sufficient to qualify him for assistance.

The principal occupation of an applicant may be considered to be either the occupation from which he received at least one half of his net income for the calendar year next preceding the date of his application, or the occupation to which he devoted at least one half of his time during such year.

Assistance under this program will be provided only for the maintenance of foundation herds of cattle, sheep, and goats. For this purpose the foundation herd shall consist only of the breeding stock—Cows, Bulls, and Heifers or Calves retained for replacement; ewes, rams, and ewe lambs for replacement; and nannies, billies, and kids for replacement.

Assistance to any one applicant will be limited to that required for him to obtain a 60-day supply of hay or other feed for his foundation herd, after taking into consideration the feed already on hand and to be produced or otherwise acquired during that period.

Dairymen who normally purchase all of their hay or protein feeds will not qualify for assistance. Dairymen who normally produce their hay or grain may qualify for assistance, but not to exceed the amount of hay or grain normally grown on their farms and fed to the foundation herd.

Applications are being accepted now for the purchase of hay only. Applicants may secure application blanks from the local ASC office or the County Agricultural Agent.

The distribution of the hay and the freight rate paid by the Government on the share basis is handled by the State Department of Agriculture through local dealers.

on the hay program to help clarify some of the details of the program are given below:

Q—How much allotment can the farmer or stockman obtain?

A—He is limited to what the Farmers Home Administration considers a sufficient supply of hay for the next 60 days.

Q—From whom does the stockman buy his hay under this program?

A—From any dealer he desires, and any person selling hay to an eligible farmer is considered a dealer.

Q—How much is the State-Federal payment under this program?

A—The State-Federal payment is one-half (1/2) of the actual freight rate within a maximum of \$10.00 per ton. On truck shipments one-half (1/2) the actual cost shall not be more than one-half (1/2) the comparable railroad rate.

Q—How do you figure the rate for deliveries where there is no railroad in the county?

A—Figure on the basis of miles for a similar distance in same direction of the state by rail per ton.

Q—Should steers and wethers be included in this program?

A—Only foundation herds, according to Federal rules.

Q—Who must pay the freight charges?

A—Either dealer, or farmer, whoever is claiming reimbursement.

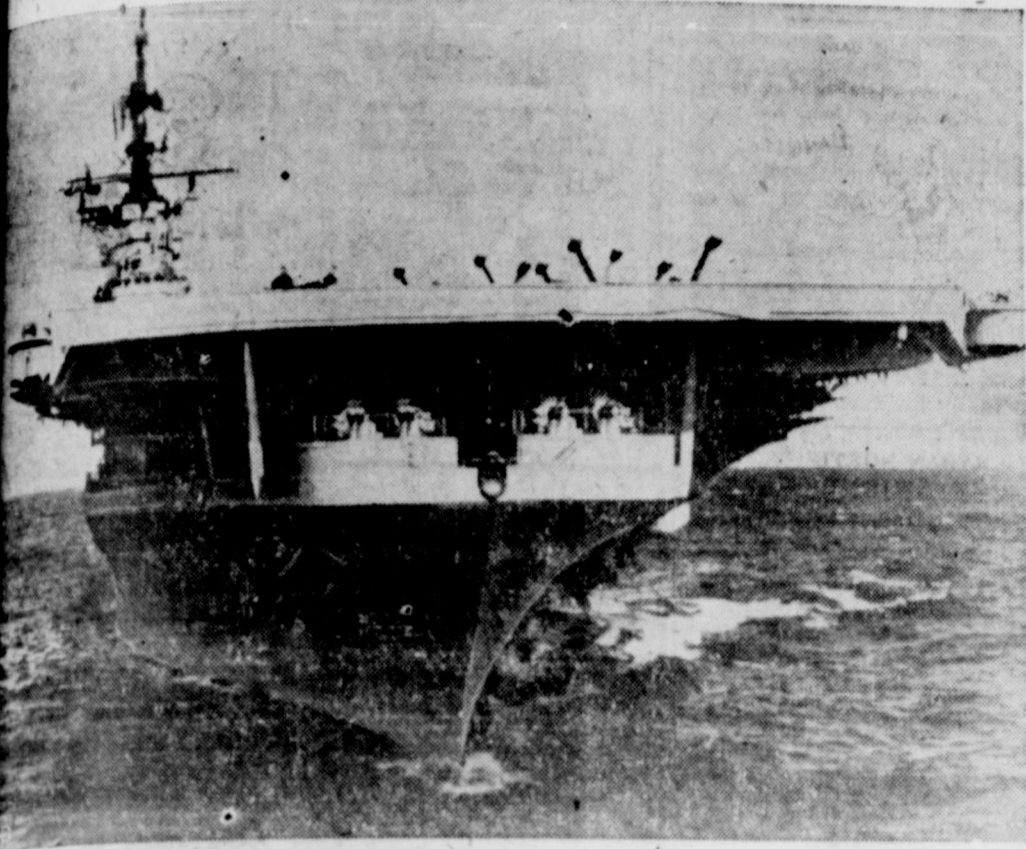

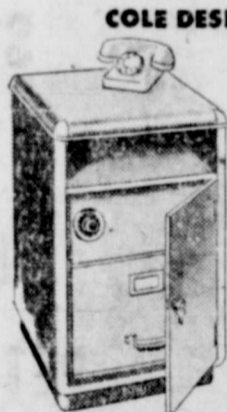

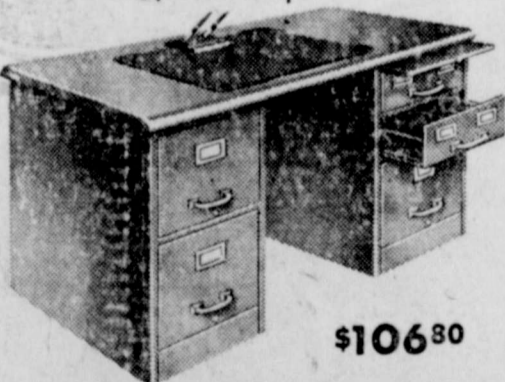

TEXAS CROP REPORT

Some 26.1 million acres of Texas land have been put into crops for harvest this year—more than any year since 1949.

Texas farmers had to shift a large number of acres of land to other crops to offset restrictions on cotton and wheat plantings this season but the crop land is still about three million acres above the twenty-three million finally harvested in 1953.

The 1954 season got off to a slow start in central, southern and southeastern counties. This was due to delayed planting, irregular germination and slow early growth brought on by critically dry conditions.

Cotton in cultivation early in July was estimated at eight million acres or sixteen percent less than the 9,568,000 acres last year. Acreage allotment restrictions accounts for some of the reduction and the extreme drouth is another factor.

Wheat production is estimated at 31,160,000 bushels with a final figure due soon. Last year's crop was 23,035,000 bushels. The 10-year average is 36,221,000 bushels.

Most recent estimate on all sorghum acreage for harvest as grain and forage was 8,661,000 acres—about 65 per cent above the 5,240,000 acres harvest last year. This is the largest acreage on record and some 31 percent above the long-term average.

First forecast of corn for the season placed this year's crop at 38,448,000 bushels which would compare with 33,874,000 bushels last year. The 10-year average is 51,266,000.

Oats production may reach

42,412,000 bushels, topping 1953's 39,150,000 bushels and far exceeding the 10-year average of 26,309,000.

Rice acreage estimated at 620,000 is a record high. It is eight percent above the 1953 record. All hay production is expected to be 1,678,000 tons or about 1.6 percent below last year with the increased acreage.

Prospective sweet potato production is at 2,475,000 bushels or three percent below 1953. Irish potatoes are predicted at 2,160,000 bushels, 13 percent below last year's 2,484,000 bushels. Peanuts are growing on about 364,000 acres, some 6 percent more than last season.

PARENT PROBLEMS Should Parents Sit Up Till Youth Comes Home? By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D. SHOULD you stay up till your teen-age son or daughter comes in at night? When this child comes home should you question and cross-question him or her? If you do stay up, what is your purpose? Do you want to ascertain the time the child comes in? Paul met the Ephesian elders on the seacoast as he was about to sail for Jerusalem. He told them he probably would never see them again, and to remember Jesus' words, "It is better to give than to receive."

The Christians in Jerusalem were in dire need, so Paul suggested to the Corinthians that on the first day of each week each one should lay aside, "as God hath prospered him," for the relief of the saints.



Although the churches in Macedonia were also very poor, they contributed more than generously to the suffering brethren in Jerusalem. Paul, disappointed with the offerings of the Corinthians, wrote them of this liberality.



The Macedonians also begged Paul to take their gifts to Jerusalem and minister to the saints himself, he wrote, "But first gave themselves to the Lord."

Varnell Wilkey Reports Activities On Trip From Seattle To Inchon

(Editor's Note: The following account was written by Varnell Wilkey, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Wilkey, Moline Route, covering their trip from Seattle, Washington to Inchon, Korea. It was mailed to his family.)

"June 30, 1954. I guess we finally got started after so long a time. We got up at 2:00 a.m. and got on ship at 9:00 a.m. and sailed at 3:00 p.m.

The chow was good today, but we had to stand in line for almost two hours before receiving it. The ship is named General McMeigs and has close to four thousand troops on it besides the regular crew. So far, unless you stand on deck you cannot tell we are moving.

July 1, 1954. I awoke this morning about 2:00 o'clock and we were really getting a rough ride. I was really sick. As far as one can see it is all water.

July 2, 1954. Nothing of importance happened today. We had to stay on deck about two hours for inspection and it sure was cold. So far we spent about six hours in the chow line and

the rest of the time sleeping and reading. We are now almost a thousand miles from the good old U. S. A.

July 3, 1954. This is one way to spend a Saturday on board a ship, can't even get a decent shower. This salt water is as bad as the dirt. The bunks are five high and so close together you can hardly walk between them.

July 4, 1954. I guess this is one Fourth of July I'll never forget. It is really bad outside. Fog is so thick you can only see about ten feet.

July 5, 1954. Not much going on around here, eating, sleeping and reading. We met another ship last night and could barely see it. We crossed the International Date Line tonight. We skip July 6 and tomorrow is July 7 and how I wish I could skip the next seventeen months that way.

July 7, 1954. We are now a little more than half way over, wish it was all over. I hope the other half does not pass so slow.

July 8, 1954. It is nice out

here today. The ship is rocking so you can hardly stay on the bunks. About one half of the troops are sea sick today. I am one of the lucky ones, able to eat and hold it down.

July 9, 1954. It is still rough and getting worse. We have changed courses twice today in order to miss the storm. At last report we were headed straight in it. We are now over two-thirds of the way with only sixteen hundred more miles to go. Will I ever be proud to get off this boat.

July 10, 1954. Sure is nice today. We have been on deck playing cards most of the day. It is the longest time I have been out of this hole since I have been aboard. It sure is not today and I guess there will not be much sleeping tonight.

July 11, 1954. We sighted land today, a little island just off the coast of Japan. We will reach Seabo Tuesday morning and are supposed to stay there about thirty hours and then go on to Inchon. I am going to whoop and holler when I get there.

July 12, 1954. Well I guess this is one birthday I will remember for a long time. It sure has been hot today and has rained most of the day. We are

Rev. Bobby Bryan is the evangelist and Rev. Jerry Griffin, pastor of the Scallorn church, is leading the singing. There is special music at each service.

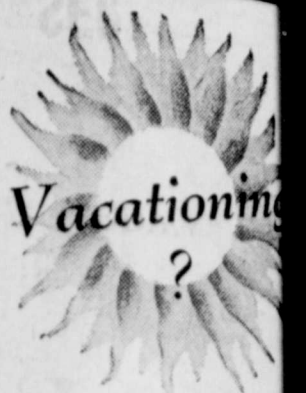
