Farm Surplus Problems Grow as Drought Ends

Farmers Now Planting Small Grains, Vegetables

Special to Central Press

WASHINGTON-With the southwestern drought broken over a wide area of the southern plains, the farm surplus problem grows bigger, because crops this year are going to be greater than was first anticipated. However, Agriculture department officials are worrying about another and little publicized aspect of the problem.

They have learned in recent weeks that farmers are planting in small grains, soy beans, and vegetables most of the 25 million acres which have been diverted this year from the growing of cotton, wheat and corn

under acreage allotment plans. This means that surpluses of oats, barley and grain sorghums are going to be bigger than if no acres had been diverted from the main staple

The government has already loaned millions of dollars on these small grains, and the prospect now is that it will have to stake out large new sums. In addition, a substantial quantity of soy beans is being grown on diverted acres, which will add to the bounty in this crop, while the prospect is that enough of the diverted acreage will be planted in lettuce, tomatoes and other vegetables to threaten a vegetable glut later on.

Moreover, some of the diverted acres are being planted in wheat outside of the commercial wheat belt and in corn outside of the commercial corn belt. It all means that the crop surplus headache is going to be bigger than was thought at first.

The administration has proposed legislation under which the government would make contracts with farmers for planting diverted acres in pasture, legumes, etc. However, there is a question as to what Congress will do about the matter. Besides, it is too late to do anything about it this year anyway.

• FARM POLITICS-For the second time in six years, farm legislation looms as a major issue in a crucial election campaign. The last time was in 1948 when many believe the defection of normally Republican farmers in the midwest swung the election to Harry S. Truman.

This autumn, Democrats will attack President Eisenhower's espousal of flexible government supports for prices of basic farm commodities. Generally, the Democrats favor rigid high supports at 90 per cent of parity.

The House has approved a modified flexible formula that would bring the level down to 821/2 per cent of parity after years of heavy production.

GOP congressional leaders proposed the compromise when it became clear Mr. Eisenhower's original proposal for a range from 75 to 90 per cent would lose a good number of Republican members to the Democratic cause.

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

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



Any established farmer or stockman whose principal occupation is farming or ranching and whose financial condition is such that he requires assistance under this program in order to maintain his foundation herd of livestock and continue his livestock operations, is eligible for assistance under the Emergency Feed Program. The principal occupation of an applicant may be consider- tain? ed to be either the occupation from which he received at least one half of his net income for the calendar year next preceding the date of his application, or the occupation to which he devoted at least one half of his time during such year.

Assistance under this program will be provided only for the maintenance of foundation herds of cattle, sheep, and goats. For this purpose the foundation herd shall consist only of the breeding stock-Cows, Bulls, and Heifers or Calves retained for replacement: ewes, rams, and ewe lambs for replacement; and nannies, billies, and kids for re-

Assistance to any one applicant will be limited to that required for him to obtain a 60day supply of hay or other feed for his foundation herd, after taking into consideration the feed already on hand and to be produced or otherwise acquired during that period.

Dairymen who normally purchase all of their hay or protein feeds will not qualify for assistance. Dairymen who normally produce their hay or grain may qualify for assistance, but not to exceed the amount of hay or grain normally grown on their farms and fed to the foundation herd.

Applications are being accepted now for the purchase of hay only. Applicants may secure application blanks from the local ASC office or the County Agricultural Agent.

The dsitribution of the hay and the freight rate paid by the Government on the share basis is handled by the State Department of Agriculture through local dealers.




