New Building And Repairs Pushed For School Opening On September 6

Repair work on the old grade school building is expected to be completed in time for opening of school September 6, according to announcement by Superintendent J. T. Jones.

Construction work on the elementary building has been delayed because of lack of brick. Delivery date of brick still needed to complete this job is still indefinite.

Brick for the new high school was delivered Tuesday and Wednesday and work on that phase of the building is being pushed for early completion.

Arrangements are being made for schools to open on September 6 under the following schedule.

Grade one, two and three will meet in the completed part of the new primary building.

Grades four, five and six will

be housed in the old high school building.

Junior High and Senior high classrooms will be ready with the exception of Agriculture, Homemaking and Science. These three subjects will be taught in the old buildings.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

A Concise Political Roundup for 1954 Here's How Parties Stand on the Issues

WASHINGTON—Republicans and Democrats are girding for one of the hardest fought congressional elections in many years.

In the past, with a few notable exceptions, the party in power has lost strength in off-year congressional elections, generally losing a few seats.

It is generally recognized that the 1952 election was a victory for President Eisenhower personally rather than for the Republican party.

All 435 House seats will be filled in the November elections. In the Senate, 36 seats are to be filled.

Many astute political strategists believe the President is the only one who can keep the House, and possibly the Senate as well, from going Democratic.

WITH THE ELECTION only a few months away, here are the main issues around which the campaign will probably revolve:

THE FARM PROGRAM—Democrats will strike back at the administration's flexible price support program.

FOREIGN POLICY—For the first time in years, this will be a major issue in an election campaign.

POSITIONS OF THE GOP AND DEMOS on the four remaining major issues will be along these lines:

COMMUNISM—This issue proved effective for the Republicans two years ago.

MCCARTHYISM—The figure of Senator Joseph R. McCarthy (R), Wisconsin, will move through the campaign.

BUSINESS CONDITIONS—The rise in unemployment in 1954 scared the Republicans and got the Democrats talking of recession and depression.

CORRUPTION IN GOVERNMENT—The Truman administration is in for another going-over by Republican orators.

An automobile stolen early last night in Goldthwaite was found abandoned on West Baker Street here today. The car police said belonged to C. F. Howard of Goldthwaite.

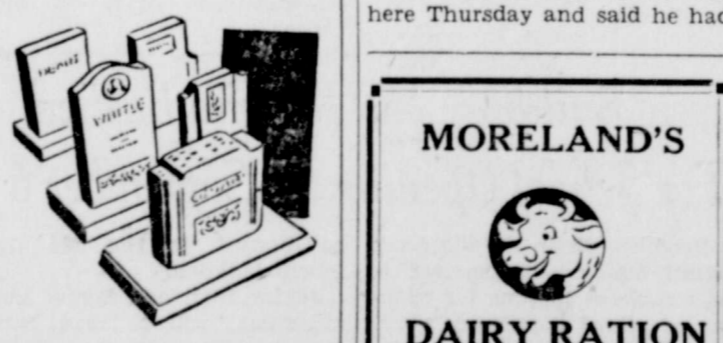

Adding Sweets To Rolls

By ALICE DENHOFF

MANY unusual and delicious sweet rolls can be quickly and easily made by using the ready-to-bake variety.

Try jelly or marmalade rolls, for example, starting by brushing the tops of ready-to-bake rolls with butter. Then, make lengthwise cuts in the tops and fill cuts with ½ tsp. jelly or marmalade in each. Bake in a shallow pan in 400° F. oven for 12 min.

Walnut-Honey Rolls

Another variation calls for putting tsp. honey, ½ tsp. butter, a dash of nutmeg and tsp. walnuts into each of 6 greased muffin cups. Place roll, topside down in each muffin cup. Bake at 400° F. for 15 min. Let rolls stand in pan 1 min. after removing from oven, then invert pan to remove rolls so that walnut mixture is up.

Pineapple and Orange

Pineapple-Orange Rolls go wonderfully with a hot beverage for dessert.

Brush butter on top of each of 9 ready-to-bake dinner rolls. Make 2 lengthwise shallow cuts in the top of each roll. Combine 6 tsp. drained, crushed pineapple, 1 tsp. grated orange rind and 1 tsp. sugar. Insert tsp. mixture in both cuts of each roll.

Bake in a greased shallow pan in 400° F. oven for 12 min.

Tropical Touch

Pineapple-Coconut Rolls are still another possibility.

Combine ¼ c. drained crushed pineapple, ¼ c. shredded coconut, ½ c. brown sugar, 2 tsp. pineapple syrup and 3 tsp. melted butter. Spread over bottom of a 1-qt. shallow loaf pan.

Place 8 rolls, with tops down, over fruit mixture. Bake at 400° F. for 15 min. Let rolls stand in pan for 1 min. after removing from oven. Invert pan to remove rolls so fruit mixture is on top. Serve at once.

Breakfast Special

For a breakfast special, try spicy Raisin Rolls.

Separate 6 ready-to-bake butterflake rolls into three equal parts and spread each section with butter. Combine ½ tsp. cinnamon and 2 tsp. sugar. Sprinkle 1 tsp. cinnamon-sugar mixture and tsp. raisins between buttered section of each roll.

Place in lightly greased muffin cups and bake at 400° F. for 12 min. Serve immediately.

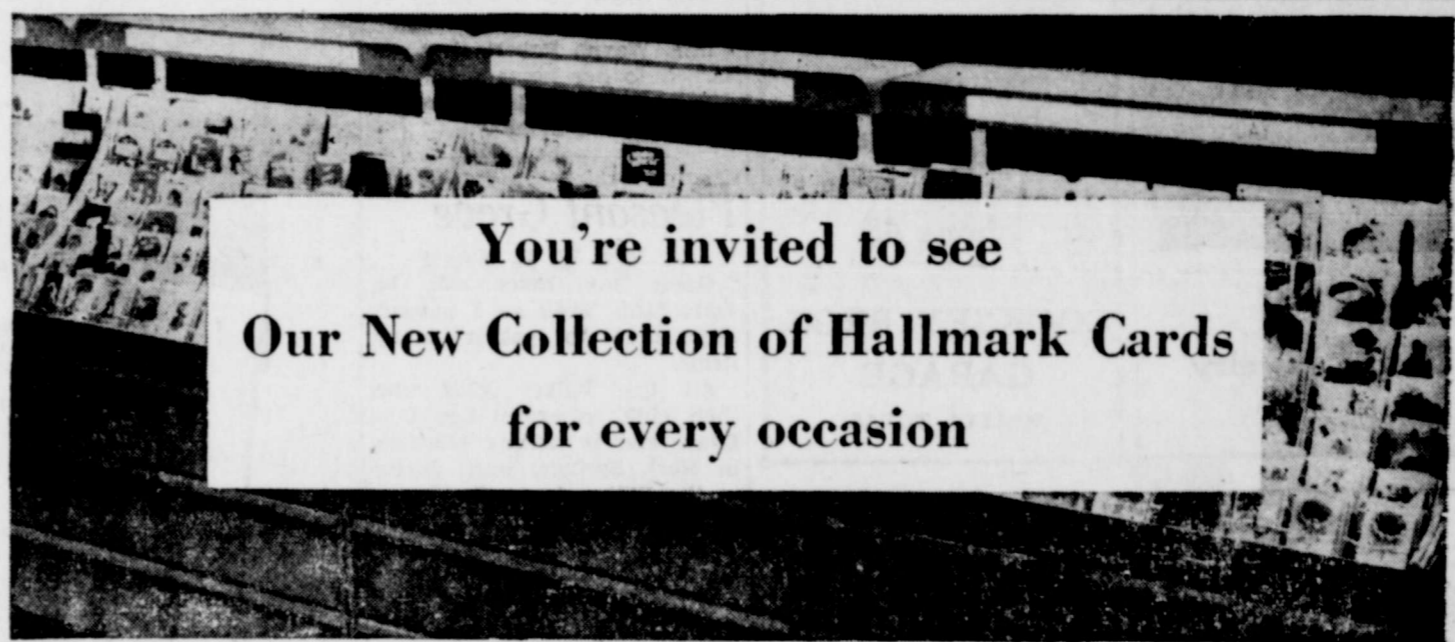

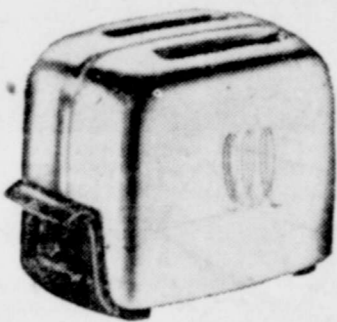

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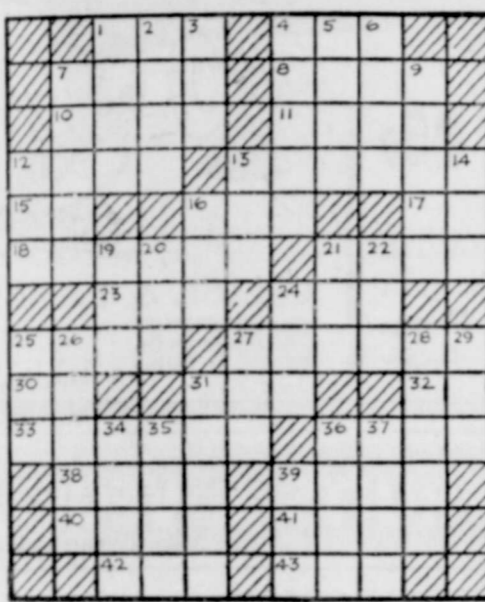

AUSTIN. (Special)—Farmers and ranchers of Texas were warned last week that the CIO plans to organize the farm workers of Texas if its candidate wins the Governor's race. This warning came from Governor Allan Shivers who charged that the backers of his opponents "want to turn the state government over to the same

bunch that is trying to wreck Port Arthur."

"One of the first things they would do is put one of their red-hot organizers from Port Arthur in as labor commissioner. Then every time a farmer wants to hire someone he would have to go through the CIO."

Governor Shivers said there was no doubt in his mind that the aim of the CIO after the job of organizing industry in Port Arthur and along the Gulf Coast is finished is to begin organizing farm labor in all parts of Texas.

"You can imagine what will happen when the CIO starts dictating how many laborers are needed to plow ten acres of land, refusing to allow a man to work more than thirty-five hours a week during the harvesting season and telling how much a farmer can charge for his crop," he said.

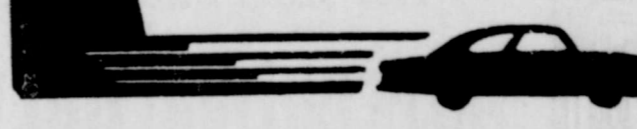

DROUGHT CROP LOSSES

A conservative estimate of losses due to the drought on only two major crops would amount to more than \$139 million thus far this year.

About 75 counties comprising the heart of Texas could be termed critical due to drought conditions. This area would follow a line from Grayson County on the Red River, south to Washington County, southwest to Wilson, northwest to Midland-Odessa and a portion of the plains.

This 75 county area generally produces approximately two million bales of Texas' annual cotton crop. About 500,000 bales in this territory has been lost to the weather this year due to lack of growth or pre-

mature openings. Figuring each bale worth about \$250.00, this means a minimum loss of \$125 million in cotton alone.

Approximately 17 million bushels of Texas' average 80 million bushel grain sorghum crop is grown in this area. But the "critical" area has lost about half that crop, or about 8 million bushels.

Using \$1.80 per bushel as a base figure, then the drought has cost us about \$14,400,000 in grain sorghum losses.

About three million head of cattle normally graze in this 75 county area. The grass and pastureland is three-quarters gone due to leak of moisture.

It is impossible to accurately estimate this loss resulting from pasture damage, pre-

ture marketing of cattle and depletion of foundation herds but the figure would be tremendous. "Little rain and no water" is becoming a familiar story to Texas. Inadequate moisture is almost a "normal" condition. Farmers and ranchers in many parts of the state are badly in need of some type of relief.

A grain and hay program has been inaugurated thus far to help combat the serious conditions.

Wilmer of the U. S. Census Bureau's district office at Dallas, Tex. The survey will be conducted in this area during this week.

The purpose of the special questions is to provide information on the number of people

who work part-time, the reasons for their short hours, and how many want and could accept full-time work. This information, along with similar data collected in previous surveys, will make possible accurate estimates of employment conditions in the Nation, indicating how many persons work part-time from choice and how many do so because of economic factors, such as slack work or material shortages.

Current Population Survey interviews in this area are conducted by Mrs. Nella P. Casbeer of Lampasas, Texas.

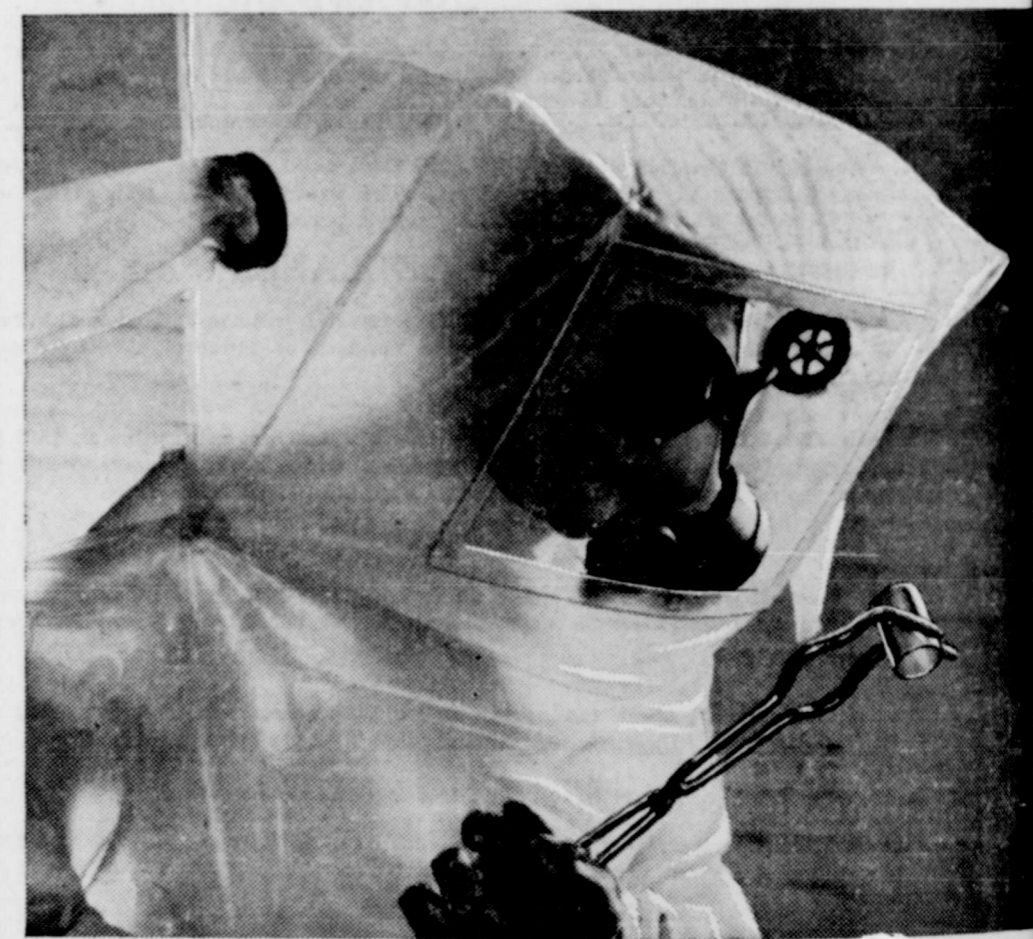

Biggest question in producing electricity with atomic energy has not been: Can it be done?—but: How can it be done economically on a full-scale basis so that many areas and many people can benefit?

America is now very close to a practical answer.

We already know the kinds of plants which will be feasible, how they will operate, and we can estimate what their expenses will be. In five years—certainly within ten—a number of them will be operating at about the same cost as those using coal. They will be privately financed, built without government subsidy.

Developing the right fuel element is still a problem, but the Atomic Energy

Texas Press Association AUSTIN, Tex.—Charges and countercharges flew fast as the race for governor rounded the turn for the final lap.

Judge Ralph W. Yarborough, quick to accuse Allan Shivers of misdeeds, found fault with state printing contracts awarded to the Times Printing Company of Mission because Shivers had been a stockholder in the company in 1946.

From Attorney General John Ben Shepperd came the retort that "I have investigated the whole transaction and there is nothing wrong with it." The contracts, Shepperd said, amounted to only about one percent of the state's printing business and it went to the Mission firm on the basis of low bids.

Another Yarborough charge was that Shivers had withdrawn the Rangers from politi-

cally-hot Duval County.

This statement, said Ranger Captain Alfred Y. Allee, was "utterly untrue." Captain Allee testified that the Rangers are still in Duval County.

And Colonel Homer Garrison, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, asserted that no request had been made to pull the law officials out of George Parr's domain.

Yarborough's political promises, came in for attack. When he pledged himself, if elected, to support a Galveston County project—a \$5 million bridge across San Luis Pass—a statement came from John S. Redditt of Lufkin.

Redditt, former chairman of the state highway commission, former state senator, and former president of the Texas Good Roads Association, said:

"In all my experience the Texas Highway Department has operated without this kind of political interference from the governor, the Legislature, or any other source. This policy has given Texas the nation's finest roads per dollar expended."

Otherwise, in his campaign speeches, Yarborough: Promised to build 40 new dams in South Texas.

Charged that a "vast army of state employees" had been forced to leave their jobs and campaign for Shivers.

Proposed the creation of a new Texas water board and advocated the investment by the state of \$400 million in water conservation projects.

Charged that Shivers spent \$2 million in his first primary campaign.

In his campaign appearances, Shivers:

Rapped Yarborough for being "the only man I know of in Texas who has cast doubt on Texas' tidelands claim to the 10 1/2 mile limit."

Charged that Yarborough misled Negro voters in the first primary by announcing that he was for segregation and then later stating his opposition to the U. S. Supreme Court's segregation decision.

Told Port Arthur listeners in public rally that people who represent Communist-dominated unions and opposed the present state law outlawing the Communist Party are supporting Yarborough.

Received praise from B. A. Stufflebeme, Grand Prairie member of the State Prison Board, for cooperating to make the system "one of the best."

BIG VOTE ANTICIPATED

Absentee balloting reports from over the state indicate a good possibility of the August 28th Democratic run-off primary bringing a heavier turnout than did the first primary, according to various county clerks.

Absentee Voting Started Last Week For Run-Off Primary August 28th

Absentee voting began last week for the Democratic run-off election, and vacationing Texans and invalids who will be unable to go to the polls August 28 have begun requesting absentee ballots from their County Clerk's office.

Voters have from now until August 24 to cast absentee ballots.

According to the Secretary of State's office, those eligible to vote absentee are those who are ill or disabled, or who expect to be out of town on election day. There is no fee for voting absentee.

Persons entitled to vote absentee may do so either by going in person to the County

Clerk's office or by mailing their request to the County Clerk.

In both instances the application for a ballot must be in writing and signed by the voter. If the voter is physically unable to write, the application may be signed by someone else at the voter's request.

A written request for an absentee ballot must be accompanied by the voter's poll tax receipt or exemption certificate, or by a sworn statement witnessed by a notary public that he has lost or mislaid his receipt or certificate.

In voting by mail, the ballot must be marked in the presence of a notary public.

Absentee voters who are ill or physically disabled must accompany their application for a ballot with a statement from a physician certifying to their sickness or physical disability.

Voters who were 60 years of age prior to January 1, 1953, and who do not live in a city of 10,000 inhabitants or more are not required to have either a poll tax receipt or an exemption certificate. Such persons should state in their applications for a ballot that they are exempt due to their age.
