Padre Lopez Map Tells Of Buried Treasure On Dry Pond Near C'waite

The pockmarked treasure mountain known as Dry Pond, some two miles northerly of Goldthwaite, upon the "Proc" McCullough Ranch, was found by Barry Storm, well-known writer-adventurer of such mining books as "Thunder God's Gold" and "Practical Prospecting," to be the actual discovery site of the Mendoza-Lopez Expedition of 1683, one of the first to lay official claim to West-Central Texas for the King of Spain. With it goes a harrowing tale of Indian intrigue which caused Fray Nicolas Lopez, Custodio of New Mexico Kingdom, to leave a fortune behind in golden doubloons and escudos.

How it happened, according to the centuries-old Santa Fe archives, begins with the Pueblo revolts which drove some two thousand refugees into temporary headquarters along the Rio Grande from El Paso del Norte to Rio del Sacramento and into vast unknown West Texas lands, broke Otermin's attempted reconquest of New Mexico and caused his replacement as Governor by Don Petriz de Cruzate. Meanwhile, the Juanos and their allies, seeking to entrap the Spanish into a fatal indiscretion, sent one, Juan Sabcato, to petition Padre Lopez for settlers and missionar-

ies in their West Texas country. Lopez, himself, accompanied by Fray Juan de Zavaleta, Commissary of the Inquisition, Fray Antonio de Acevedo and their retainers, trekked down the Rio Grande to turn northward toward the Conchos River. Somewhere along the way suspicions crystallized and Juan Dominguez de Mendoza with twenty-six soldiers joined them.

Many side trips were hinted at in the Mendoza reports, probably for the purpose of secreting the valuables from various mission and mining establishments along the way. And at last the joint expedition reached the junction of the Conchos with the San Clemente, the present Colorado River. Here, as promised by the Jumanos emissary, Lopez found ready for occupancy the two story Mission San Clemente built by the Indians some fifteen miles southeast of the present Ballinger.

With his suspicions allayed, on this day of March 16, 1684, Padre Lopez swallowed whole the story of the approaching chieftains of 48 Indian nations who never materialized to become Catholic converts and subjects of the King of Spain. Instead, for the next month and a half the Mendoza-Lopez journals drift off into a lot of self praise over the new mission, some suspicions of French goods found in possession of the Indians, the buffalo hunting engaged in—and vague mention of a discovery entrada further east to formally claim the land for the Spanish King.

By this time several incidents had already occurred. Lopez decided that Sabcato had not acted in good faith. A hunter had been murdered here, another there. Attitudes had become threatening at the Mission San Clemente. Perhaps Mendoza was trying to locate the French source of goods. And whether this combination spying and discovery entrada was made before or after trouble developed it not known. But the numerous Indian nations were even then plotting the destruction of every Spaniard in West Texas and northern Mexico. And the divide between the drainage into the Brazos upon the east and the Colorado upon the west turned out to be the buffalo wallow now known as Dry Pond.

Here Mendoza planted a 20-foot long cross of rocks embedded into the ground, along with documents buried in a copper box to attest his discovery claims—relics that weren't to be found again for a couple of centuries. His reports eventually wound up in the Mexican archives as No. 29 of the year 1684—and without mentioning the visita altar left by Padre Lopez. That the reports vanished mysteriously sometime after 1898 when the noted historian Dr. Herbert E. (Continued on Back Page)

Governor Shivers Speaks To Large Audience In Goldthwaite Tuesday

A Mills County audience estimated to number more than one thousand gathered on the court house square in Goldthwaite Tuesday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock to hear Governor Allan Shivers as he charged his opponent, Ralph Yarborough, in the race for the office of Governor of Texas, with making promises upon promises to the people with utter disregard about fulfillment of such promises.

After being introduced by E. B. Gilliam Jr., a long time friend from back in school days in the University of Texas, he told his listeners, including men, women, boys and girls, many of them of school age, that no one can tell the people of Texas that Governor Allan Shivers has not fulfilled the promises made during the years he has served the people of the state.

He told how he introduced the first legislation for an old

Voters Will Have Short Ballot In Run-Off Primary Election Saturday

Mills County voters will have a short ballot, one of the shortest in many years, in the forthcoming second primary, runoff election this Saturday, August 28, with only one local contest and two in state offices to be voted on.

The only local office being contested in this election is that for nominating a candidate for the office of County Commissioner in precinct one. Seeking the office are Woodrow W. Long and O. H. Shaw, who ran a close race in the first primary for the two top places in a four-way battle for nomination.

Offices being contested, other than local, are the office of Governor and that of Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, place one.

Allan Shivers of Jefferson County and Ralph W. Yarborough of Travis County are making their bid to voters for support in their battle for the Governor's office. Both have been traveling throughout the entire state in behalf of their candidacy.

Seeking place one on the Supreme Court are Few Brewster of Bell County and Alfred M. Scott of Travis County. Absentee voting in Mills County has been somewhat lighter than in the first pri-

ary pension law for the state of Texas and his efforts towards bringing the problem of an increase in pensions before the voters of the state when they will vote on the amendment for the proposed increase in the November election. In that connection he said: "It will be up to the people of Texas whether they want to increase pensions or not, their vote will decide the question."

He pledged his continued battle for the best interest of Texas as giving the people the best service possible in state government. In that connection he mentioned State Hospitals, Better Roads and Public Schools. Speaking about schools he cited his administration's accomplishments in the tidelands battle, how he fought to recover the tidelands for Texas and how in the past two years Texas schools and school children benefited by more than thirty-two million dollars as a result of recovering the tidelands for the state.

"I have only one promise to make to you in this campaign, and that is to look after the best interests of Texas," he said as he told his receptive listeners how proud he is of his neighbors and the support they gave him in the first primary on July 24.

In speaking about that support he pointed out that in his opponent's own home precinct citizens voted for Shivers by a margin of three to one. In the governor's own home precinct he received a vote of 33 to 3. Voters of the precinct where his mother lives gave him a margin of four to one and in the home precinct of his wife they voted for Shivers by a margin of six to one. The Governor said: "I am proud of my neighbors—and I am also proud of my opponent's neighbors who voted for me the way they did."

In concluding his remarks he told local citizens: "Of one thing you can be sure, the things that come first with me are my God, my country and my great state of Texas."

Required And Elective Subjects Are Listed For Goldthwaite High School

According to information furnished by Supt. J. T. Jones and compiled by High School Principal Lee Watson, the following will show the requirements for each student in Goldthwaite High School according to classification. Parents are asked to note the requirements which are those set up by the State Education Agency and local addition.

FRESHMEN
 Required—English I, Algebra I, General Science.

SOPHOMORE
 Required—English II, World History, Biology.

JUNIOR
 Required—English III, American History, Plane Geometry.

SENIOR
 Required—English IV, Civics.

Com. Bookkeeping, Band, Coral, Physics.

The schedule is so arranged that a student must spend four years before graduating with 16 credits, but, if allowed to take more than four core subjects each year, his or her requirements are raised to conform to the enrichment permitted.

Mr. Tesson, high school principal, will be on hand to answer questions when students come to register on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of next week. If you want to get an interesting story about going out into the Gulf for a bit of fishing—about five miles out—and getting caught in a light squall, just you ask Rev. James R. Hagan, pastor of the Mullin Baptist Church. He and his family were visiting down on the Gulf Coast a few days back with some of their relatives. While there he and his brother-in-law decided to go fishing. He tells how they went out about five miles and dropped their anchor to start fishing. "In a few minutes we heard a rumble of thunder" he said, "and I asked my brother-in-law, 'shall we go in? You know, after all we are in a very small motor boat and five miles from land.' He was told, 'Oh, it's all right and they went on fishing, and, by the way, they were really making a good catch too. About thirty minutes later he said they heard two more thunder claps and he was told: 'Boy, you better start pulling in that anchor. It didn't take him long to do so and they started for land. In a little while the light wind storm and rain hit them and then the fun began. He said the waves really started hitting them and he started bailing water with a bucket. Pretty soon they saw some 'litt' islands and while they were only about twenty by thirty feet in size J. R. said they looked mighty good—at least it was land to get on. That's just exactly what they did. After waiting for about an hour the wind passed by and they headed for home—with an ice chest full of nice fish. We have given you a little of the

see the new cage house he recently built and equipped with 1,320 cages. In these cages there are 1,500 white Leghorns keeping up the egg production of the McCasland place. The new house was completed about three months ago and the owners have been in their office for about that length of time. We were looking at the about two o'clock in the afternoon and it looked like egg production was going along fine. Looking down the line of cages which stretch 150 feet in length you could see the eggs as they come rolling slowly out of the cages. There were a good many in the small trough that they had been gathered there that day and would be gathered again before the day was over. Homer says the 1,500 Leghorns in that one house are producing between one thousand and eleven hundred eggs per day at the present time. They are expected to pick up considerably during the next two months. In all, his chicken population numbers about two thousand at this time and they are about that same number of turkeys also. Plans call for building a new and larger cage house in the near future. Homer: "That is one way of fighting the drought."

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Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Principles of Atlantic Charter Now Reaffirmed

WASHINGTON—President Eisenhower and Prime Minister Sir Winston Churchill reaffirmed at their recent talks the principles of the Atlantic Charter. You will recall that this vital document was devised by Churchill and President Roosevelt on Aug. 14, 1941, during a secret meeting aboard a warship off the coast of Newfoundland while German submarines infested the Atlantic.

"In intimate comradeship, we will continue our united efforts to secure world peace based upon the principles of the Atlantic Charter, which we reaffirm," asserted the Eisenhower-Churchill statement. Their declaration was immediately hailed as the "new Atlantic Charter" because of its similarity to that momentous "press release" of 13 years ago that was the first Allied statement of war and peace aims of World War II. During the dark and dismal months of war, the Atlantic Charter was a torch burning on the horizon. The United Nations Declaration signed at the White House on Jan. 1, 1942, by 26 nations—including the Soviet Union, China, France, Great Britain and the United States—was primarily an acceptance by these wartime Allies of basic principles of the Atlantic Charter.

When President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill made known to an anxious world the results of their secret meeting, the United States had not yet entered the war. Pearl Harbor was nearly four months in the future. While the Atlantic Charter meeting was going on Congress extended the draft law by a margin of only one vote.

ISOLATIONISTS IMMEDIATELY POUNCED on the Atlantic Charter with both feet. Axis propagandists ridiculed and belittled it. Far-visioned statesmen over the world, however, hailed it as setting forth peace aims that should guide the Allied Powers following the defeat of the Axis.

A perspective of 13 years gives us a better appreciation of the vision and courage of Mr. Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill in announcing the Atlantic Charter amid the dark discouragements of August, 1941.

German armies had invaded the Soviet Union. By Aug. 10, when the Atlantic Charter conference began, they were in a position to menace Leningrad, the Ukraine, and Moscow, Eastern Poland, Besarabia, and the Baltic States had fallen. German spokesmen were predicting that within two months they would defeat the Red army. Great Britain for more than a year had faced constant danger of invasion.

JAPAN, EMBOLDENED BY THE SUCCESS of its Axis partners, had massed soldiers on the border of Indochina and Thailand and was exerting pressure throughout the Far East. Talk of war with Japan already filled the air. Nearly all military victories of the war had then been won by the Axis Powers.

Yet, the American President and British prime minister issued a declaration of "common principles" they hoped would bring "a better future for the world." They expressed the hope that no territorial changes would take place "that do not accord with the freely expressed wishes of the peoples concerned."

In the Charter they wished to see all nations have equal access to the trade and raw materials of the world "needed for their economic prosperity." They wished economic, labor, and social improvement, and a peace that "will afford assurance that all the men in all the lands may live out their lives in freedom from fear and want."

The Roosevelt-Churchill declaration also reaffirmed the old principles of freedom of the seas and expressed the conviction that "all the nations of the world, for realistic as well as spiritual reasons, must come to the abandonment of the use of force."

Atlantic Charter principles have weathered the storms of war and adverse criticism. President Eisenhower and Prime Minister Churchill have reaffirmed them as a guide to the thinking of peoples of good will who earnestly desire lasting peace in a world of law and order.

Major Fall Hunting Regulations Are Summarized For Ready Reference

MOURNING DOVES: North Zone—September 1-October 10; South Zone—October 1-November 9, noon to sunset; ten doves per day or in possession.

WATERFOWL: November 5-January 3; one half hour before sunrise to sunset except opening day when shooting begins at noon; five ducks per day, ten in possession; five geese per day or in possession in the aggregate.

DEER: November 16-December 31 under General State Law; November 20-25 West of Pecos; November 12-24 in Panhandle. Several special local seasons. Limit varies from two buck deer under General Law to one buck deer in Panhandle, West of Pecos, and in some other areas.

TURKEY: November 16-December 31 under General State Law; November 12-24 Panhandle. Limit three gobblers under General Law, two gobblers in Panhandle. Special dates and limits govern several counties.

QUAIL: December 1-January 16 under General Law; month of December for West of the Pecos; one half hour before sunrise to one half hour after sunset; twelve quail a day, not more than thirty-six in a week or in possession; Panhandle bag limit six per day or twelve in possession; special regulations in several individual counties.

SQUIRRELS: October, November, December under General Law; season open all year in sixty-nine counties; ten squirrels per day or in possession; many counties have special regulations.

WILD HOG: November 16-December 31 under General Law; limit two per season; season open all year in forty-nine

counties.

Pheasant: Limited to December 4-5 and December 12-13, four days altogether for small Panhandle area; limit two cocks per day, four in possession; may be taken only with shotguns.

IMPORTANT: Foregoing ready reference may be supplemented with detailed information from Hunting Law Digest or Waterfowl Supplement. If in doubt, make certain by checking your local game warden.

TEXAS FARMERS-RANCHERS WARNED OF CIO LABOR PLANS

AUSTIN, Tex., Farmers and ranchers of Texas were warned this week that the CIO plans to organize the farm workers of Texas if its candidate wins the Governor's race.

This warning came from Governor Allan Shivers who charged that the backers of his opponents "want to turn the state government over to the same bunch that is trying to wreck Port Arthur."

"One of the first things they would do is put one of their red-hot organizers from Port Arthur in as labor commissioner. Then every time a farmer or rancher wanted to hire someone he would have to go through the CIO."

Governor Shivers said there was no doubt in his mind that the aim of the CIO after Port Arthur and along the Gulf Coast is finished is to begin organizing farm labor in all parts of Texas.

"You can imagine what will happen when the CIO starts dictating how many laborers are needed to plow ten acres of land, refusing to allow a man to work more than thirty-five hours a week during the harvesting season and telling how much a farmer can charge for his crop," he said.

The Shivers administration, the Governor said, has worked hard to help preserve and protect the rights of the working man.

"But as long as I am Governor, the professional labor bosses who have been sent to Texas from the East — specifically those in the CIO and its Political Action Committee — are not going to run our State Government," Shivers promised.

Shivers said the average working man in Texas appreciated good government and that they were not going to let CIO bosses and professional organizers from the East do their thinking — and voting — for them.

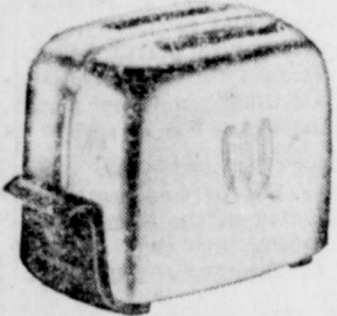

2) Authority to work on a watershed basis in watersheds of 250,000 acres or less. A number of such watersheds, when they comprise parts of a larger watershed, may be planned together if the local sponsoring organizations so desire.

3) Installation of single structures storing less than 2,500 acre-feet without specific approval by resolution of the Senate and House Committees on Agriculture. These committees must approve all plans which have single structures with a storage capacity of between 2,500 and 5,000 acre-feet before appropriation can be made.

4) Authority for the Secretary of Agriculture to contract for construction of structures (dams) until July 1, 1956, in those states in which local organizations do not have authority to enter into such contracts.

5) Local sponsoring groups to secure right-of-way, assume equitable share of cost, arrange for operation and maintenance, acquire necessary water rights and get agreements from owners of more half of the lands in watersheds above dams to carry out soil conservation programs.

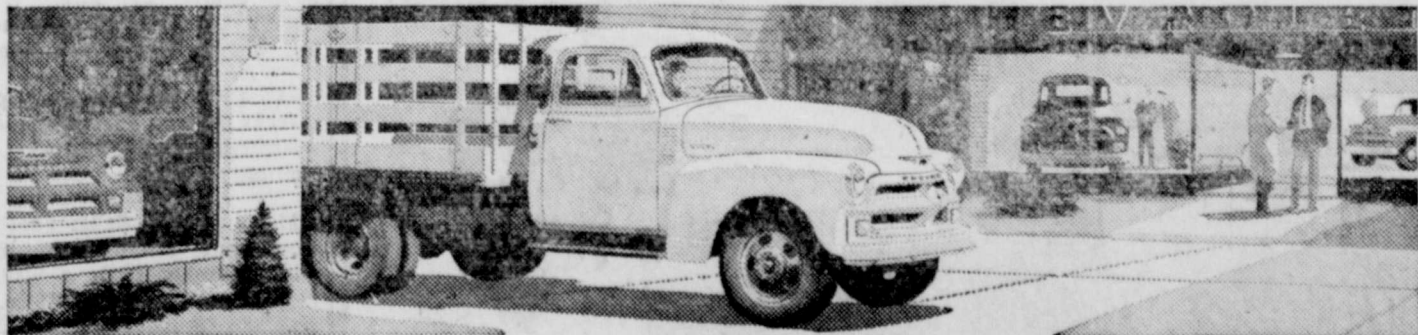

Bolton, reported their contents, may have some connection with the leathern sacks of gold coins to which Padre Lopez left his own map.

In fact, the situation must have become so desperate at the time that Lopez thought it best to leave even his personal belongings—his rosaries and gold crucifix. Probably it became expedient to change his character from the opulent and half-arrogant head of all he surveyed to that of a trader in buffalo hides. At least it was an excuse which not only accumulated a fortune in peltry along the way but prevented the Indians from an outright massacre. For back in El Paso eight Indian plotters had already been convicted and sentenced to execution. Only a petition to Cruzate by tense citizens, led by relatives of Mendoza's soldiers, according to official records, postponed the executions and the immediate general uprising they might have caused until the entrada returned safely.

But there were exciting skirmishes along the way. Back at the Mission San Clemente to start with Apaches from the north attacked Mendoza three times both by day and night. And along the way he records another three attacks by Salinero Indians from Nueva Vizcaya to the south. Yet they managed to ride safely through the closing jaws of the pinchers. The catastrophes of New Mexico were not to be repeated upon the divided Spanish garrison of El Paso del Norte.

For some years thereafter the records are filled with accounts of military action—a mere 20

or 30 arbusquiers assaulting a thousands or two Indians at a time, endlessly repeated, the destruction of rancherias and silver smelters, retreats and advances. And Padre Lopez' gold remained buried while he busied himself with helping hold the lonely outpost of El Paso together as the key to reconquest of New Mexico Kingdom. Perhaps he never did recover the treasure which belonged to New Mexico. At least that is what several mysterious Mexicans intimated in the 1880's as they scoured the country roundabout Dry Pond.

The most important Mexican was the one who sought employment upon nearby Bill Shultz's ranch about 1901. When he was caught up a tree and was ready to give up the search himself, he finally explained to Shultz that he was seeking a copper spike which would put him on the trail to more gold than his wagon could haul away. The spike was embedded in a sawed-off limb, and a duplicate was driven into the same tree roots. Meanwhile, another swarthy stranger had already contacted Dr. Jim Kirkpatrick of nearby Mullin with a map and another story of a copper spike. Neither one knew that a local man working

erratically for Shultz, named Holmes, had already cut down a tree in which he found one spike. Thus was the stage set for one of the most persistent treasure hunts in West Central Texas. As they say in the back-country there: "They's somethin' a-buried up yonder."

The trail to that "somethin'" wasn't picked up again until the following winter when a Mullin resident reported to Dr. Kirkpatrick that a copper spike had turned up in his fireplace. The Doctor immediately had the village woodcutter show him where the tree stump was. Probing at the foot of the stump brought to light a four foot long rock plate upon which a string of pack mules had been cut, heading for a cave. Half-moons over the cave were thought to indicate treasure. Nearby, upon the stump of another tree, which had long since sprouted into two new trees, was a muleshoe cut deeply and accurately, the sign of treasure buried below. These things promptly focused local attention upon Dry Pond — by the wrong copper spike!

During the next year other singular bits of evidence were encountered in the thick shiner brush. At the eastern foot of Dry Pond hill Kirkpatrick found an altar made of limestone blocks and crudely cemented with lime mortar complete with urns just as Padre Lopez had left a 'cept' for the brush and which had long since disintegrated. The Doctor demolished the altar to find untarnished in the cement two copper plates showing a canyon topography below a rising or setting of a virtual guarantee of the way to whatever treasure had been hidden.
